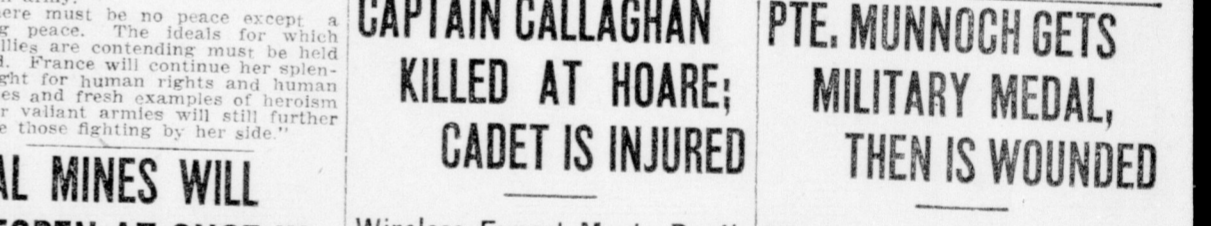

ASSESSOR GRANT AND ASSESSOR FALLOON CHARGED WITH FAVORITISM IN FIXING TAX

Head of Department Exonerates Mr. O'Sullivan as to Favoritism to Catholic Prelate—Mr. O'Sullivan Deals With Other Charges.

Assessment Commissioner Grant and Assessor Martin Falloon gave out statements this morning relative to the charges made by the special committee on assessments, the report of which was presented to the Controller on Wednesday last evening.

Mr. O'Sullivan is a lengthy one, and goes into the details of each of the charges. Mr. Grant takes all responsibility for the error in Bishop Fallon's assessment, and exonerates Mr. O'Sullivan from any blame in connection with it.

"I want it fair play," said Mr. O'Sullivan. "My work is before the council, and I am not afraid of any criticism. I have done nothing which is not right, and it cannot be shown."

Use His Judgment. Mr. Fallon is the first contribution from the bishops since Bishop Walsh's time, said Mr. Grant. "It is a money, so to speak, and in making the return I used my own judgment in the matter."

Mr. O'Sullivan was asked if he had no communication with Bishop Fallon, either as he is in the knowledge of it, or as he is in the knowledge of it. "I used my best judgment in the matter," Mr. Grant said.

Mr. Grant showed the assessment act, which places the responsibility for errors in assessments on the assessor. "Of course mistakes are liable to be made, as there is an enormous amount of detail in connection with the assessment," he declared.

Two Entries the Same. One assessment for Mr. McKenzie, that at his place of business was made by me; the other at his residence, 10 St. John's street, was made by Mr. Black. Both are as separate school supporters, with which Mr. McKenzie is content.

Case of a Greek Catholic. It seems that some of the work complained about has been done for some time. One instance is given in the case of Peter Hrisokos, a Greek. He was assessed as a separate school supporter last year, and Assessor Francis this year put him down as such.

Why He Was Not Notified. Mr. O'Sullivan was instructed by the committee not to notify Sir George. The matter is not one that concerns the separate school board, but merely this year's assessment.

Has Left the City. George Hooper, barber, 817 Dundas street, charge is that he is assessed as a separate school supporter. Mr. O'Sullivan says that he has never been notified by Alfred McCoubrey, a Protestant, on April 20, 1916, and again in the same manner on the 22nd.

SAYS NEW ACT FOR BREAD REGULATIONS IS FULL OF HOLES

City's Solicitor Unable to Convict Local Bakers. MUST WEIGH TEN LOAVES AND ALL MUST BE SHORT WEIGHT OR NO CASE CAN BE MADE OUT.

"The 1917 bread act surely has a hole in it. I don't know what the Legislature was doing when it passed that act," said R. G. Fisher, acting for the city solicitor, in police court today. Fisher said that he had handed down his decision that he could not find several local bakers guilty of selling short-weight bread, as the specific provisions stated that ten short-weight loaves must be seized and weighed before a conviction could be made.

Inspector McCallum seized the loaves but weighed them in batches of five, and could not swear that any single loaf of all of them were under weight.
