AVIATORS FACED DEATH WHEN MACHINE DIVED TOWARDS SEA

London, June 15.—When the VickersVimy biplane driven by Capt. John
Alcock was first sighted crossing the
Irish coast, says a dispatch to the Daily
Mail from Clifden, Galway, an airplane
flew out from the Oranmore airdrome
to render assistance. This machine
landed near the Vimy, but unfortunately was wrecked, owing to the softness
of the ground.

equipment was rain-soaked by the
downpour during the journey.

London, June 16 .- On Saturday night a demonstration took place at Witley Camp, where Canadian soldiers gathered in a mass meeting to protest against delayed repatriation. A dozen shops, the garrison theatre and the Salvation Army hut were burned. Only a small proportion of the men participated in the outrage. Gen. Richard Turner visited the camp on Sunday and, addressing the men, said all wanted to get back to Canada, but they must have patience. There was sufficient shipping to take them back in a fortnight, but obstacles arose for which the authorities could not be held responsible, such as strikes. The destruction done in the camp was heart-breaking, he said. The men around him had won renown in France, but disgrace was being brought on Canada by a few blackguards,

Vickers-Vimy Aviators Hopped Off At St. Johns On Saturday Afternoon and Landed in Ireland On Sunday Morning-Trip Described As Consta nt Fight With the Elements.

LONDON, June 15 .- (By the Associated Press) .- The final goal of all the ambitions which flying men have ventured to dream since the Wright Brothers first rose from the earth in a heavierthan-air machine, was realized this morning, when two young British officers, Captain John Alcock and Lieutenant Arthur W. Brown, landed on the Irish coast after the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic ocean.

Their voyage was a straightaway clean-cut flight, achieved Union, saved Toronto the inconvenience in sixteen hours and twelve minutes from Newfoundland to Clifton, Ireland, a distance of more than 1,900 miles.

Constant Fight With Elements.

But the brief and modest description which comes from the airmen at Clifden tells of an adventurous and amazingly hazardous enterprise. Fog and mists hung over the North Atlantic and the Vickers-Vimy biplane climbed and dove, struggling to extricate herself from the folds of the airplane's worst enemies. She rose to 11,000 feet, swooped down almost to the surface of the sea, and at times the two navigators found themselves flying upside down only ten feet above the water.

Before coming to earth near the Clidfen wireless station Alcock circled the wireless towers, seeking the best spot to reach the earth. But no suitable ground was found, so he chanced it in a bog.

Dazed and Deafened.

The wireless staff rushed to the aid from the club of the aviators. They found Brown dazed and Alcock temporarily deafened by the force of the impact. As soon as arrives. they were able to be escorted to the wireless station they telegraphed the news to their friends. Then they had breakfast.
