

SUMMARY OF LATEST **EVENTS IN GERMANY**

By the Associated Press.] The Kapp administration of Berlin, realizing the futility of attempting to hold the reins of power, has decided to give up its short-lived dictatorship. At 1 o'clock this afternoon Chancellor Kapp decided to resign, according to official advices from the German capital from the German capital.

Expressions of confidence in the speedy restoration of the Ebert Government to complete control come from the headquarters of that Government in Stuttgart. Minister of Defence Noske is quoted as declaring he expects, with the aid of his troops, to secure the return of normal conditions in six or eight days. Meanwhile, however, the forces of extreme radicalism are asserting themselves in various German centres. There are increasing Sparta-can disorders and growing talk among the radicals of the possibility of utilizing the present disturbed conditions to establish soviet rule. The list of killed reported from numerous German towns and cities in clashes between demonstrators and troops is mounting into the hundreds.

There has been no direct con-firmation of Tuesday night's reports of 400 killed in a bombardment of Kiel by a warship, but there are apparently various reports of 100 killed and 300 wounded at Dresden, probably more than 100 killed in Berlin suburbs, and the killing of from a half dozen to a score of persons in others of the 24 or more German centres where clashes have been reported.

THREATENED WITH VIOLENCE FROM ARMED GERMAN WORKMEN, DR. KAPP DECIDES TO RELINQUISH HIS POWER

Decision of New German Dictator Is Reached After Stormy Interview With Independent Socialists — General Strike Reported To Be Effective in All Parts of German Empire.

SPARTACAN RISING FEARED.

Paris, March 17.—The news that came through during the night from Berlin and other German points, telling of sanguinary clashes at Essen, Dortmund, Leipsic, Mannheim, Frankfort and Brunswick, together with a report that a council of workmen had assumed power at Chemnitz, has given the impression here that there is more to be feared from a revival of the Spartacan movement than from the activities of the Kapp Government in Berlin.

According to the latest dispatches, the military government has resulted in bloodshed in twenty four German towns. The Spartacans are reported to have risen in Dresden, where a clash with troops is declared to have resulted in a casualty list of 100 dead and 300 wounded. Fighting in Breslau, Hamburg and Kiel also is reported.

Paris, March 17.—Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, the new German chancellor, and Gen. von. Luettwitz, his military lieutenant, have decided to retire from the direction of the German governmental affairs unconditionally, according to a dispatch received here from Frankfort, quoting advices to the Gazette of that city. It is said this decision was reached after negotiations with Independent Socialists, led by Dr. Cohn, in which the latter had threatened to attack the new government forces with armed workmen. A Wolff Bureau dispatch from Berlin states Col. Bauer. confidential adviser of Gen. Ludendorff, has been assassinated. The general strike is effective over nearly all of Germany.







THE CITY OF LONDON BILL. There is likely to be a clause in the City of London bill this year authorizing the city of London to issue debentures for \$100,000 or more, to be charged to capital account, and expended for purposes of the London and Port

Stanley Railway. In this it is quite consistent with previous legislation. It is consistent with the bill authorizing the electrification of the railway, and subsequent bills increasing the original amount. The total outstanding debentures are fast approaching double the amount originally asked for and granted, \$700,000. All these expenditures are ultra vires in the Legislature.

The British North America act, the act of Confederation, the act that defines the rights and powers of the Dominion, and of each province, places municipal law exclusively within the jurisdiction of the province.

The city of London is a municipal corporation. The Dominion Parliament incorporated the London and Port Stanley Railway and made it a Dominion railway. The Provincial Parliament can legislate within its limits for the city of London. The London and Port Stanley Railway is beyond its jurisdiction. The city of London cannot be empowered by the Provincial Legislature to issue debentures, and expend the proceeds on the railway. Debentures so issued would be illegal, and any legislation authorizing such issue would be ultra vires.

The Drury Government is starting with clean slate. We hope it will keep it clean. If there is any difference of opinion between the Attorney-General, Mr. Dewart and Mr. Ferguson regarding the illegality of the proposed bill, or those that went before it, let the question be submitted to Sir Allan Aylesworth of Toronto, or Mr. John S. Ewart of Ottawa, or both. Sir Allan Aylesworth and John S. Ewart are recognized as not lawyers merely, but constitutional lawyers and jurists.

Questions of much less importance in earlier days involving provincial rights were fought out between Sir John Mccdonald and Sir Oliver Mowat. The question does not affect the city of London and the London and Port Stanley only, but affects the legality of the hydro-radial scheme. MORE TROUBLE FOR THE ALLIES. Cables from Beirut report that Syria and Mesopotamia have declared their independence. and named kings, and that a great Arab federation is about to be formed. By some this is believed to be part of a German-born conspiracy to start a new world conflagration in the near east. It is considered significant that the revolution in Syria and Mesopotamia occurred simultaneously with the German counter revolution, the rebellious attitude of the Turks towards the supreme council's decisions and the advance on Persia of two Bolshevik armies. It is to be noted that some of the men who were amongst Germany's leaders when she plunged the world in war, are heading the counterrevolution at Berlin. They are men such as Bernstorff, junkers to the end, who will stop at no infamy if they think it will help towards restoring the old Germany. At the very moment when they are calling loudly for allied assistance against the Bolshevik, Kapp and his friends are quite capable of plotting with Lenine and Trotzky for the promotion of a new war, and the records of the Red chiefs makes it certain that they would be willing tools.





Because Mr. Elwell refused to break his word in declining to answer questions concerning the oreak his word in declining to answer questions concerning the source of a news story, put to him by a federal grand jury. Federal Judge George Carpenter fined him \$500 and ordered that he be confined in jail until he answer them. On the request of Mr. Elwell's attorney a stay order of ten days was greated to der of ten days was granted, to perfect an appeal.

"The point involved is so important to newspapers generally that we intend to carry the case to the highest court." said Roy D. Keehn. Mr. Elwell's attorney.






