The plan is explained as follows: sia recognizes that Japan now has two distinct moves. First, urgent efforts will be made to have a naval concentration at Port Arthur, the Baltia Ba tration at Port Arthur, the Baltic, Red Sea and Vladivostock fleets joining Vice-Admiral Makaroff's command, if possible, and thus giving the combined fleets preponderance over Vice-Admiral Togo's. Second, it is foreseen that it will be difficult, and probably impossible to effect this concentration, as Admiral Togo may intercept the Baltic fleet before its arrival at Port Arthur. In that event, the Baltic fleet, which is comparatively small, will ttempt the perilous task of engaging disabing some of the Japanese ships and thus reducing the Japanese effective. According to the Russian calculations, Baitic fleet may suffer annihilation in such an unequal combat, but it will ave served a valuable end if it is able cripple a sufficient number of the Japanese ships to reduce Admiral Togo's naval strength below that of Admiral The foregoing information is not part of current speculative report, but comes from creditable official sources



## The License Problem.

Premier Ross' reply to the deputation, composed mainly of Methodist and Baptist ministers, which waited upon Railway Men and the Income Tax. him on Monday, to urge the abolition of the bars, confirms the opinion that there will be no license legislation this session. Mr. Ross expresses his concurrence in the view "that nothing short of the prohibition of the sale of liquors in hotels, and the strictest control over sales for purposes generally recognized in as proper and legitimate would fully tion. Mr. protect society from the evil effects of excessive drinking, so far as legislation can be invoked for that purpose." He understands that the members of the deputation and those for whom they spoke do not favor at present any other form of temperance legislation. "If the Government are unable to give the measure desired this session," adds the Premier, "it will be our duty to consider what means are available for further action."

His political opponents and probably a section of the prohibition party will accuse the Premier of temporizing. His position is a very difficult one, and the /prohibitionists should consider whether they will be promoting the temperance cause by increasing his difficulties at this juncture. A radical measure, such as the Manitoba act, or the system of state control proposed by the Premier, is not acceptable to the majority of the present Legislature, and would be rejected if introduced by the Government. There can be no doubt of that, as the Premier has sounded his supporters. Another difficulty is the division of opinion among the temperance people. On Tuesday, a deputation of Presbyterian clergymen waited upon the Premier and represented that there were many members of that denomination who would not vote the whole prohibition ticket, but wanted the element of private gain taken out of the liquor traffic. They urged him, therefore, to bring forward the measure - i.e., state control-which he first presented to the


