Provincial Politics.

The rumor that the Provincial Government will go to the country within two months is generally credited. The majority of Liberals with whom The Advertiser has conversed think it would The Government, with a majority of only three, pulled through the last session, and placed on the statute book a mass of useful and progressive legislation, making a record to be proud of: but the Liberal party cannot expect its leaders to maintain the same uphill fight during the two remaining sessions of the present Legislature. Bye-elections would hold out little prospect of relief, as the Liberals would have to win either Dufferin or North Renfrew to increase their lead. A general election would probably clear the air, by giving a safe majority to one side or the other, and insuring stable government for at least four years.

While the Administration has been fighting for its life, it has not been free to develop its policy in every respect. This has been particularly the case with liquor license legislation. The Government is pledged to make some response to the expression of public opinion brought out by the referendum. and the Province will look for a pronouncement from the Premier on this question, if he dissolves the House. He will be expected to define the measure which he will lay before the Legislature if his Government is sustained. Absolute prohibition is impracticable, and lute prohibition is impracticable, and was put up by Mayor Urquhart against England. It is an accusation which members of the Opposition take good care to make only under the shelter of parliamentary privilege. No government has done s much toward punishing bribery and election offenses, and making the election law a terror to evildoers. If there is corruption in the Liberal party there is a moral sensitiveness also that will correct it without calling in the assistance of those who never resented the corruption which smelt to heaven under the old Tory regime at Ottawa.




