Japs Several Times Get Into Port Arthur, Only To Be Driven Out by Defenders.

MANY RUSSIANS DESERTING AND SURRENDERING

London, Monday, Nov. 7.—Special dispatches from Che Foo and Tien Tsin report that the defenders of Port Arthur have retired to the Liao Tsi Hill forts, where they are holding out desperately, entrenched, and with ten guns of large caliber. Many Russians

the correspondents asleep, are deserting and surrendering. The Japanese, however, are not admitting this, and are expending all their resources in order to conserve energy. More reliable reports do not confirm these statements, but the Russian radio reports the capture of Wantai, the last remaining fort within twenty miles of the railway terminus, where the Japanese are making rapid retreat. According to the Japanese Telegraph's correspondent, reports from Che Foo that there was no fighting tonight, and that the Japanese of the Mikado, he says, have frequently stolen into the native town of Port Arthur, but invariably were driven out. He adds that the Japanese and the Japanese have four large forts facing the Russian works on Rihlung Mountain, and that the Japanese are aware that they are mounting naval guns on stone foundations. Mukden dispatches to Berlin state that the Russian command is preparing their men to meet the fall of Port Arthur.

Montreal, Nov. 7.—Hon. E. J. Flynn, leader of the Conservative Opposition in the Quebec Legislature, was in

Montreal yesterday in conference with local members of the Legislature and prominent Conservatives, and it was announced that the Conservatives will not put any candidates in the field for the Quebec Legislature at the election to be held Nov. 25.

Hon. Mr. Flynn issued a manifesto

to the electors of the Province, in the course of which, referring to the action of the Parent Government, he announced it as an attempt to stifle discussion, and as showing that the Provincial Government seeks to identify its cause with that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and to receive a verdict reflecting the vote for Sir Wilfrid. Mr. Flynn also denounces the action as unwarranted and unjustified.

They have been furnished with names and addresses from the county registry and are directed to attempt to vote under these names. Guard the deputies with reliable men, and use force if necessary to prevent the fraud."

The committee claim that plans were made to colonize the towns of Lawrenceville and Ogdensburg, all in New York State.
