Explanations, and Principal Articles of the Calendar for 1872.

EXPLANATIONS.

All the calculations are reduced to local mean time for Charlottetown, with the exception of the Equation of Time, and the Sun's Right Ascension and Declination, which are given for apparent noon. The sun's apparent semi-diameter is inserted on the respective days of each completed second of arc. At the head of each month are given all the particulars of the Moon's Changes, the times of Moon's Perigee and Apogee—i. e., least and greatest distance from the earth,—and the days when the Moon crosses the equator, and when she reaches her greatest north and south declination, these being the points on which Saxby's system of Lunar Equinoctials is based, the principle being that on these days the Moon's influence on the atmospheric tides is most powerful; and when these times fall close upon the time of Moon's Change or Perigee, this influence is proportionally increased. These cases are marked ** or *** according as two or three of these influences combine. Where *** occur, a gale or other strong atmospheric disturbance may be expected with considerable certainty.

In addition to the general local disturbances on these days, the effect of a storm generated within the tropics is sometimes propagated so as to arrive within two or three days, it having been found the average rate at which these travel is about sixteen miles per hour.

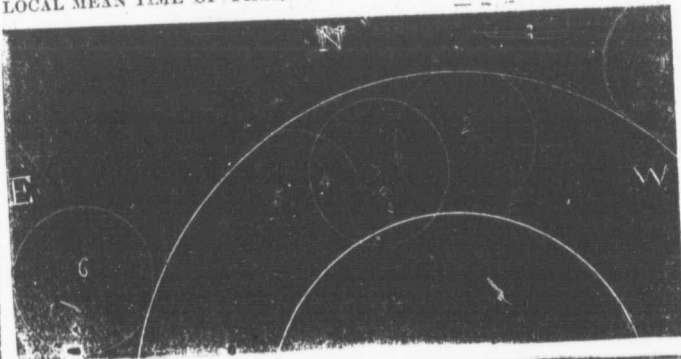

ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses during the year: two of the sun, two of the Moon; which latter will be visible in Charlottetown.

I. A partial eclipse of the Moon, May 22d. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 10h. 47m. 10.7s. At Charlottetown the middle of the eclipse will have passed before the time of moon-rising.

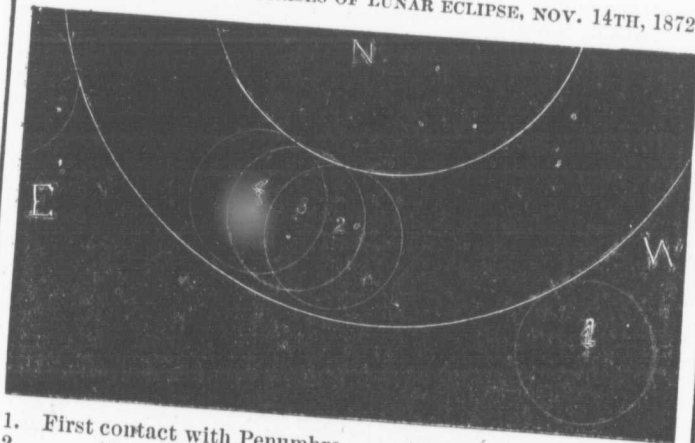

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 5th. Visible throughout Asia, with the exception of Turkey and Arabia; also, the extreme north-west of America, and the Islands of Summatra and Borneo. The line of centrality passes from the middle of the Arabian Sea, through the southern extremity of Hindostan, Bay of Bengal, Burmah, across China to the Corea, and thence to the middle of the North Pacific Ocean. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, 15h. 27m. 22s.

III. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, November 14th. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 16h. 38m. 22.7s. Visible at Charlottetown.

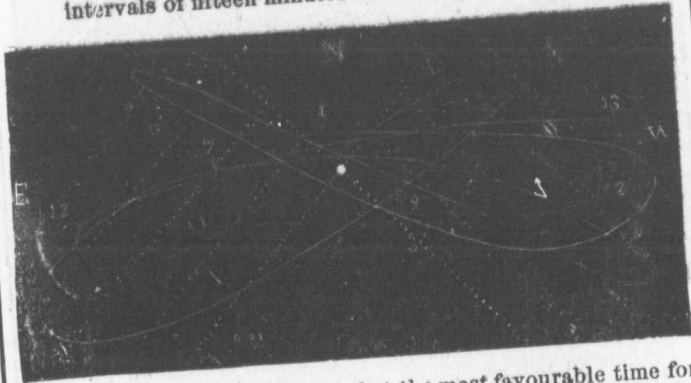

ica. The line of centrality passes from near the Friendly Islands to the Falklands. In this Eclipse the apparent diameter of the Sun and Moon are so nearly equal, that the Eclipse will be annular to places near the beginning and end of the line of centrality.

PLANETARY MOTIONS AND OCCULTATIONS.

MERCURY. The apparent motion is alternately retrograde and direct between the following dates, when he will be stationary either to the west or east of the sun:—January 13th, W.; April 14th, E.; May 7th, W.; Aug 16th, E.; September 8th, W.; December 6th, E. On account of its small size and close proximity to the sun, this exceedingly beautiful planet is not very easily found. After being once seen, it can never be mistaken, shining as it does with a bright ruby light. The subjoined diagram represents the apparent motion of the planet around the sun throughout the year. The position of Mercury on the first day of each month and on the 31st December is indicated by Nos. 1 to 13. The dotted line passing through the sun shows the position of the eastern and western horizon, according as Mercury is to the east or west of the sun. The dotted lines parallel to these represent the horizon at successive intervals of fifteen minutes before sunrise or after sunset.



From this it will be seen that the most favourable time for finding the planet will be as a morning star, towards the end of January, the middle of September, and the end of December; and as an evening star about the beginning of April, and the end of November. During May, June, July and August the twilight will be too strong, or the planet too near the horizon to be easily found. There will be an occultation of Mercury by the Moon on the first of December, but the Moon will be below the horizon.

VENUS. The apparent motion is direct throughout the year. She will be a morning star till her superior conjunction with the sun, July 14th, after which she will reappear as an evening star till the end of the year. There will be an occultation by the Moon, January 6th, but only appearing as such in the southern hemisphere. To the north of the Equator the Moon will appear to pass a little to the south of the planet.

MARS is also direct throughout the year. A morning star till his conjunction with the sun, May 17th; afterwards an evening star till the end of the year.

JUPITER. Retrograde till March 15th, and afterwards moves eastward to the end of the year. He is in opposition to the sun, January 15th; a morning star till his conjunction with the sun, August 2nd; then an evening star to the end of the year. Jupiter's range of motion during the year is about 42° of the ecliptic, from a little to the south of Castor, Geminorum, to the neighborhood of Regulus, which star he will approach, October 29th, within $20'$ (about two-thirds of the Moon's diameter.)

SATURN. Motion direct till April 30; retrograde till September 18th; after that direct till the year's end. In conjunction with the sun, January 2d; in opposition, July 9th, coming to the meridian at midnight. His extreme range of motion is about 11° in constellation Sagittarius.

URANUS will be retrograde till April 2d; direct till November 12, and retrograde to the end of the year. On the 5th of June, Uranus will be in close conjunction with Jupiter. The apparent interval between the two planets is $1'$ of arc—about equal to one thirtieth of the Moon's diameter. His range of motion about 9° in the constellation Cancer.

NEPTUNE will be direct till July 31st, and retrograde to the end of the year. In opposition to the sun, October 17th. His range of apparent motion is $4^\circ 45'$ in the constellation Pisces. His position on the line between Alpherat of Andromeda and Moira Ceti at about one third distance from the latter star.

GRAHAM BISCUIT.—Stir, with a spoon, tepid water into Graham flour until it is stiff enough to form into a dough as soft as it can be kneaded: roll out when sufficiently kneaded to be well mixed, and cut into cakes three-quarters of an inch in thickness. Lay them on baking pans, so that they will not touch each other, and bake in a quick oven, letting them remain long enough to become brown and crisp, which with a good heat, will require about twenty-five minutes, or taking them out when just done through, as one prefers: if not sufficiently baked, they will be heavy on the bottom. Put them on a grate or colander to cool, that they may not steam and become heavy.

GRAHAM DROP CAKES—Taking into account the time and labour required in making, the care and apparatus needed, and their lightness and tenderness, these cakes must be considered the best form of family bread.

Stir Graham flour into soft cold water making a batter a trifle thicker than for griddle cakes. The exact proportion cannot be given, as flour will swell more at some times than at others. Drop from a spoon into the cups of the bread pans, which are already heated, and bake in a hot oven. Take them from the pan as soon as they are done and arrange them on plates, taking care that no weight rests on them to make them heavy.

Both Graham biscuit and drop cakes, after standing two or three days are made as good as new by dipping in cold water and setting in a hot oven a few minutes, or steaming over boiling water.

As a general thing, the best time for baking all these unleavened cakes is in the morning, when the stove is just cleared of its ashes.
If one can command the time and strength, all cakes of this kind are made lighter and more delicate by beating ten or fifteen minutes while mixing the batter, but it is not necessary in order to make good bread.

GRAHAM BREAD.—Four quarts of unboiled wheat, a teacupful of good yeast, half a cup of molasses, and one tablespoonful of salt, mixed with warm water enough to make a stiff dough: let it rise six or eight hours: wet your hands in cold water to put it into the pans: let it rise an hour, or until it has risen an inch: bake it two hours.
It should be well baked.

OAT MEAL CAKES.—Now for one of the most capital articles of food ever eaten. Manage it in this way:—into a quart of cold water, stir oat meal enough to make it about as thick as hasty pudding. Be sure that the meal is sprinkled in so slowly, and that the stirring is so active that the mush will have no lumps in it. Now put it on a tin pan, where it can spread out to half the thickness of a common cracker, and smooth it down with a case-knife. Run a sharp knife across it, so as to divide it into the sized pieces you wish, and then place it into a warm oven, and bake it slowly, being careful however not to brown it. A little butter or suet rubbed over the tin pan before spreading the mush, will prevent sticking. When it is done, eat

A SHIN OF BEEF SOUP.—Have the shin cracked up well, put it to boil in five or six quarts of water: boil it five or six hours; skim it very often. Cut up very fine half a white cabbage, chop two turnips, three onions; put them into the soup, with pepper and salt, and boil it two hours; take the bone and gristle out before serving. If you have some raised dough, make up a dozen little balls the size of a nutmeg, and drop them into the soup, and boil it half-an-hour.

GRAHAM PUDDING THE STANDARD EVERYDAY PUDDING.—Stir slowly into fast-boiling water, sprinkled from the hand, sufficient Graham flour to make a thin pudding. Let it boil five or ten minutes, and it is done. If set away from the fire a few minutes before taking up, it will cleave readily from the kettle, leaving it more easily to be washed. Very much depends on the manner of making; as from the same materials a most delicious dish may be made, or one not fit to eat.

The pudding left from one meal is allowed to cool in the table pudding dish—generally an oval dish—and inverted on a platter of some form, for next meal. Any of this that may be left can be dissolved in the water in which the next pudding is to be made, and so made over, or, a better way is to brown slices of it on a griddle.

MUTTON BROTH.—Boil a shoulder of mutton, the cheapest part of the sheep, in four quarts of water two hours. Add one onion, two turnips, cut fine, one table spoonful of salt, and one cup of rice. Then boil an hour and a half longer; cut a little parsley, and put it in five minutes before dishing. Then the mutton can be served with drawn butter and capers.

BEEF STEW.—Six pounds of the flank of beef cut in pieces, boil in two quarts of water until quite tender. Then put in a dozen potatoes, a dozen of onions, four turnips, cover it so that the steam shall not escape, salt and pepper to the taste.

EXCELLENT RECEIPT FOR WHEAT AND INDIAN BREAD.—To two quarts of Indian meal add boiling water enough to wet the same; when sufficiently cooled, add one teaspoonful of salt, half a pint of yeast, one teaspoonful of saleratus, one half teacupful of molasses, and flour enough to form it into a loaf, (it should not be kneaded hard,) when light, bake two hours in a well-heated oven. (It should be baked until brown.)

BOILED INDIAN PUDDING.—Four teacups of Indian meal scalded with a quart of boiling water, two teaspoonfuls of salt, and two gills of molasses. Tie it in a cloth so as to let it swell one-third, and boil three hours.

Two cups of stewed apples will improve it.

PIG'S HEAD BOILED.—This is a more profitable dish, though not so pleasant to the palate. It should first be salted, which is usually done by the pork butcher. It should be boiled an hour and a quarter; it must be boiled gently, or the meat will be hard; serve with vegetables.

BAKED SQUASH.—Take winter squash, cut in halves, partially clean them inside, and bake slowly in an oven an hour and a half; then scrape the inner surface and remove the squash from the rind—which has served as a dish in baking—mash and serve for the table. Or, cut the squash in several pieces, take off the rind, clean inside, and bake slowly. Eat the same as bread or baked potatoes.

PIG'S HEAD BAKED.—Clean the brains, trim them, wash the brains thoroughly and some finely chop them, or brown them.

PIG'S HEAD BAKED.—Let it be divided and thoroughly cleaned; take out the brains, trim the snout and ears, bake it an hour and a half; wash the brains thoroughly, blanch them, beat them up with an egg, pepper and salt, and some finely chopped or pounded sage and a small piece of butter; fry them, or brown them before the fire; serve with the head.

GREEN BEANS.—Drop them into boiling water and cook till tender, and they are good without any seasoning. If any is desired, a little cream and sugar are admissible.

SPONGE CAKE.—Three eggs, beaten separately, one cup of sifted flour, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, half a teaspoonful of soda.

CORN MEAL GRIDDLE CAKES.—Boil one quart of milk, and scald with it as much corn meal as will make a thick mush. (Yellow meal needs more boiling than white.) When it is partially cooled, stir in a table-spoonful of dry yeast, or a half a cup of wet yeast, three well beaten eggs, a tea-spoonful of salt, and two table-spoonfuls of wheat flour. Let it stand three or four hours, and bake on a hot soapstone griddle, rubbed with salt. It will be necessary to rub the griddle with a salted rag between every griddleful of cakes, to prevent burning. Yellow meal is the best.

PARSNIPS.—Scrape or pare off the skin, or peel after they are boiled. They will cook tender in half an hour. Then set them in the oven for ten minutes, and send to the table without seasoning, or they may be pared and sliced, and partly boiled in water, which should then be poured off and milk substituted, in which they should simmer slowly until tender. They are not so strong in taste in the autumn as in the spring, hence, although they are generally left in the ground through the winter, a part may be dug in the fall and packed in the sand in the cellar for winter use. They are nice in soups, or are good to be eaten cold, or sliced and browned on a griddle or in a hot oven.

CURRENT JELLY.—Pick currants always for jam and jelly on a dry day, and before they are dead ripe; when very sweet and nice for table use, the gelatine has been converted by a process of nature into sugar. Currants must be scalded the same day they are picked, or they may not jelly: look them over, carefully removing all stems, and scald them over boiling water in an enamelled kettle, but do not allow them to reach boiling heat, and pour them in the jelly-bag, without bruising, while hot: hang the bag over an earthen dish, and let them drip, without pressing, until the next morning. Then measure the juice, and allow eight and a half pounds of sugar to eight pints of the juice: put the juice in an enamelled kettle over a clear fire,

remove all the scum that rises, and when boiling hot scatter in the sugar with one hand, and stir the jelly with the other: let the jelly become nearly boiling hot, slip in the skimmer, shake it in the cold if it appears like setting, dish it immediately into small moulds, tumblers, or jars. If the currants were in a right state, the jelly will set by the time the sugar dissolves. White currants do not make as pretty jelly as red, but equal parts of white and red make a beautiful jelly. Use only the best sugar for all jellies. Put over jelly, when cold, a tissue-paper wet in brandy and cover the jars or moulds, with paper cut to fit and notched, wet with the white of eggs beaten stiff. The jelly-bag may be pressed, and a solid but cloudy jelly

A NICE STEW.—Take five or six mutton chops, same quantity of beef in thick pieces, same quantity of veal and pork, six or eight good potatoes, peeled and divided in four, half a pound of onions, a spoonful of white pepper, about one and a half saltspoonful of salt, a pint of good broth or gravy, flavored with catsup. Cover all down closely, to prevent the escape of steam, and let the stew-pan simmer very slowly for two hours. A slice or two of dressed ham is a great improvement; but the art is in simmering slowly as possible and never allowing the simmer to go off. To prevent burning, stir the stew with a spoon every quarter of an hour.

CURRENT JAM.—Boil the currants gently one hour with the sugar, and put it in jars. This will be dark and very rich, it will not work, and can be used to advantage in large families. If boiled until very thick, it will keep years. If it candies, set the jar in boiling water until it heats through and dissolves the sugar.

STRAWBERRY JAM.—Boil the strawberries until reduced to paste; have ready as many pounds of the best sugar as there was fruit before boiling; add the sugar, stirring constantly until the jam is reduced to a stiff paste; pack it in jars while hot, and cover with naper wet with egg.

TO REMOVE PAINT AND VARNISH.—Varnish may be removed by rubbing with spirits of turpentine. Paint spots may be either softened by heat and scraped off, and rubbed with turpentine; or they may be dissolved by caustic lye, made by boiling together two ounces of washing soda and the same amount of lime in half a pint of water.

SHOULDER OF MUTTON.—A shoulder of mutton weighing about six pounds requires one hour and a half to roast; if stuffed a quarter of an hour longer. Before cooking it, take out the bone, and fill the space with a dressing of bread-crumbs, pepper, salt, parsley, sweet marjoram, one egg, and a small piece of butter, mixed together.

MILK SCONS.—Boil two pints of milk: when boiling take off the fire, and stir into the pan sufficient flour to make it into a thick paste, add a little salt roll out on a baking-board very thin, cut into small rounds like biscuits, and bake on a hot gridle for two or three minutes. They should be put at once into a warm napkin and sent to the table very hot.

STRAWBERRY SHORT CAKE.—Make your crust the same as you would your biscuit, have it about half an inch thick. When baked, split open and butter; put on a layer of berries and crust alternately. Some persons mash the berries; but I prefer stemming and sugaring an hour or so previous to using, so they will become juicy. This is excellent.

APPLE JELLY.—Select any rich juiced apple, such as Golden pippin, Newtown pippin, or bellflower, wash and wipe them, removing the stems and any imperfections of the skin. Allow one quart of water to one peck of apples, and cover the kettle tight. Be careful not to burn the fruit. When perfectly tender, pour them into a jelly-bag, without pressing, and let it drain into an earthen dish until the next morning. Measure the juice, and allow for every pint one pound of granulated sugar, place the syrup on the fire in a preserving kettle: as soon as it becomes hot, stir in the sugar; when it is melted, the jelly is ready for the moulds. It must not boil. Apple jelly can

APPLE MARMALADE.—Take either common or crab apples; after they are washed and wiped clean, steam them by placing a preserving kettle over a boiler of hot water, with a very little water, not over a pint to a peck of apples; cover tight: when perfectly cooked, pass the fruit through a sieve. Weigh the pulp: to every pound allow one pound of granulated sugar. Boil the pulp until quite thick, then add the sugar. It must be cooked until stiff enough to mould, and stirred constantly to prevent burning. The common apple can be flavored, but the crab is better without.

RASPBERRY SYRUP.—One pint of juice, two pounds of sugar. Choose the fruit, either white or red, mash it in a pan, and put it in a warm place for two or three days, or until the fermentation has commenced. All mucilaginous fruits require this, or the syrup would jelly after it is bottled. Filter the juice through a flannel bag, add the sugar in powder, and stir it until dissolved; take it off, let it get cold, take off the scum, and bottle it. The addition of a few tablespoonfuls of good fruit syrup, to a glass of iced water or soda water produces a refreshing summer beverage.

CRULLERS.—Four teaspoonfuls of powdered white sugar, one and a half tablespoonful of lard, one tablespoonful of butter, three eggs, beaten separately, half a cup of sweet milk, one teaspoonful of soda two teaspoonfuls
