



ATHLETICS FOR ALL THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

New Movement Has a Successful Inauguration - Organization Meeting.

When efficiency has been attaine ! n any branch of sport, a bronze bar s qualified for, and various bars obtained can be formed into a belt of honor. The awards divided according to the sections.

Standard efficiency consists of efficiency in running, jumping, throwing and swimming, and in natation the unlimited man must be able to cover 50 yards in 35 seconds, which means he will have to travel in the water fairly fast.

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
