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THE DIAMOND JUBILEE

Proposed Invitation of Colonial Premiers Approved.

Each Premier Will Be Privileged to Bring His Wife and a Boy Guard Along, and Thus Add to the Grandeur of the Parade—South African Affairs and Mr. Chamberlain's Speech.

New York, Jan. 31.—Mr. Isaac N. Ford, in his special cable to the Queen, says: "The Queen is credited with the project of inviting the Colonial Premiers to London to take part in the year's festivities, but Mr. Chamberlain is probably the real author of the scheme. This is the first proposal for making the celebration a unique event and meets at once with popular approval, especially as detachments of colonial troops will accompany the Premiers and supply material for a grand show. All other plans have been abandoned, and the Queen has accepted the proposal."

ROYAL FRIENDLY relations between the British and the Colonies have been maintained during the reign, but never before have self-governing colonies been represented by their Premiers and the Queen's commissioners at the same time.

Mr. Chamberlain's plan of inviting, on behalf of the Queen, all the self-governing colonies to come to England and take part in the Imperial jubilee, is looked upon as a very clever move, and since the invitation has been extended to wives of the Premiers, it is thought that the Queen's visit will return to their posts duly impressed by the social fascinations of the British court.

Popular enthusiasm, though somewhat damped by the Queen's refusal to accept the invitation, is still strong in the colonies. There can even be found ardent newsmongers who prophesy a royal jubilee in London, and that the Queen's visit will be a grand success.

When the court opened this morning the Queen was accompanied by the Duke of Devonshire, who is expected to be in London on the 10th inst.

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AN EYE FOR AN EYE

If the United States Continues Its Crusade

Against Canadian Workmen Mr. Laurier Introduces a Law to Shut United States Wage Earners Out of This Country—The Immigration Policy Will be to Bring Good Settlers Here

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—(Special.)—Ottawa workmen are getting restive about the American alien labor law. The contract for a new opera house has gone to an American citizen, and with the prospect of many United States citizens working on the job the outlook is certainly not a pleasant one for organized labor in the capital.

This morning, therefore, a deputation of labor men waited upon the Premier to present to him their views on the alien labor question and immigration. They urged upon him the settlement of the question of the cities and towns on the vacant lands of the Dominion. They also pointed out the relations between Canada and the United States, but wanted Canadian labor protection from the Canadian government.

They desired no immigration from Europe until the Canadian unemployed were paid in full. Mr. Laurier replied that he had had conversations with several American gentlemen on the question of their alien labor law. They had all stated that they had never intended to enforce it over a Canadian laborer, but its enforcement against Canadians was most galling and unbearable. If his colleagues found it impossible to have the law removed, he would have to advise the government to take steps to protect the Canadian unemployed.

On the question of immigration it was the intention of the government to use every means in their power to protect the Canadian laborer. He would advise every agency to bring settlers to this country. He was, however, free to inform them that it was only farmers and those willing to become immigrants to this country. The only class of immigrants wanted were men who could work upon our farms, and who would be employed in seven well-kept cities and towns, and who would be able to support their families in Great Britain, Norway and Germany would be encouraged to come to Canada.

In closing his remarks the Premier stated that he would be pleased to receive any suggestions from the labor organizations throughout Canada who would offer him.

THE TRACHEROUS ICE

Henry Trippe Lost His Son and Had a Narrow Escape Himself.

Ridgeway, Ont., Jan. 28.—A distressing accident occurred at Ridgeway, Ont., on Wednesday afternoon, when a young boy named Henry Trippe, aged 10 years, was drowned in the ice of the Rideau river.

The boy was playing with a group of other children on the ice when he fell through. He was unable to get up, and his cries for help were heard by a group of men who were passing by.

The men tried to pull him up, but the ice was too thin. They were forced to wait until a group of men who were passing by could help.

The boy was pulled up, but he was already dead. His father, Henry Trippe, was informed of the accident and came to the scene.

The boy's body was recovered and buried in the cemetery. His father is very grieved by the loss of his son.

The accident is a warning to parents to be careful of their children when they are playing on the ice.
