Mr. F. E. Nealie has undertaken to push this great work in the Chatham District and the work of Newcastle district is being brought to a successful issue under the Chairmanship of Mayor John H. Troy.



Drastic Regulations of Food Controller

Home Made Candy has Been Forbidden and Cakes Must Not be Frosted

Ottawa, April 30—Following the announcement by the Canada Food Board that no manufacturers in Canada will be permitted to use for the manufacture of candy, more than 50 per cent of the average monthly quantity of cane sugar, and that drastic restrictions have been imposed on the use of wheat, flour, sugar and shortening in the manufacture of biscuits, cakes or sweet dough products, the Food Board issued an order that no persons shall make in Canada, for private consumptiona, French pastries, iced cakes or biscuits, or cakes at hierg sugar between the layers, or added to the exterior; and no person shall use in Canada, cane sugar for making, or private consumption, what is commonly called "candy




