





LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

TRADE-LAYERS has begun on the Red River Railroad, and will be continued at the rate of a mile and a half a day.

The New York Legislature has passed a bill substituting electricity for the gas as a means of capital punishment.

The newspapers from the Northwest Territories are almost unanimous in urging the appointment of Mr. Dewdney as Minister of the Interior.

EX-CONFESSOR BUREAU, the last of the trio of Grand Trunk robbers at Montreal, was, on the 11th inst., sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

A DRINK of gold, weighing 106 ounces, was taken from the Egeon gold mines to New Glasgow, N.S., a few days ago. It was valued at \$2,100 and was the product of three weeks' work.

The recent severe fire in Hull, Quebec, is supposed to have been caused from the stamp of a burning cigar which some thoughtful person threw among a lot of waste paper under the stairs of the city hall.

CAPTAIN STRATTON, of the brig W. S. Hunt, of Lunenburg, has received from the United States government, a gold medal, in recognition of his bravery in rescuing the crew of the U. S. schooner Sophia Winslow.

Two Geological parties have started from Ottawa for the Maritime Provinces. Professor Bailey will explore northern New Brunswick, and Professor Macoun will make a botanical and geological collection in Prince Edward Island.

The schooner Blanche, of Colborne, Ont., left Oswego on the 28th ult. with a cargo of coal for Brighton. Nothing has been heard from her since, and it is believed that she sunk with all on board. She carried a crew of four men and a female cook.

DR. DAVEN WILSON, president of Toronto University, has declined the honor of knighthood recently conferred upon him by Her Majesty the Queen. He declines to give his reasons, but thinks Professor of Toronto University a greater title than that of Knight.

A SPECIAL cablegram to the Toronto Mail says that a portrait of Robert Burns, which was bought in a pawnbroker's shop in Toronto and taken to London by Mr. Pichet, turns out to be a genuine painting by Falburn, dated 1790, and is valued at \$10,000.

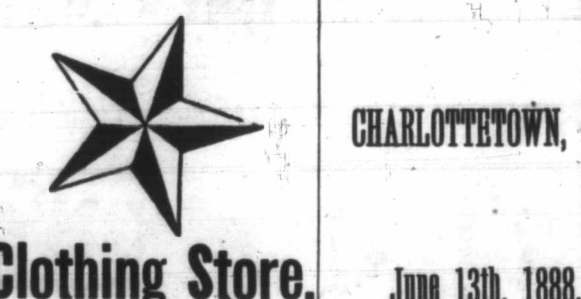
