The sole head of a family, Chany male over 18 years old, who was at the com. mencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta pplicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions Dutles-Six months residence upon and cultivaion of land in each of three years

In certain distric's a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre Duties-Reside six months in each bree years after earning homestead atent and cultivate 50 xtercasre May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain con

ditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead n certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
