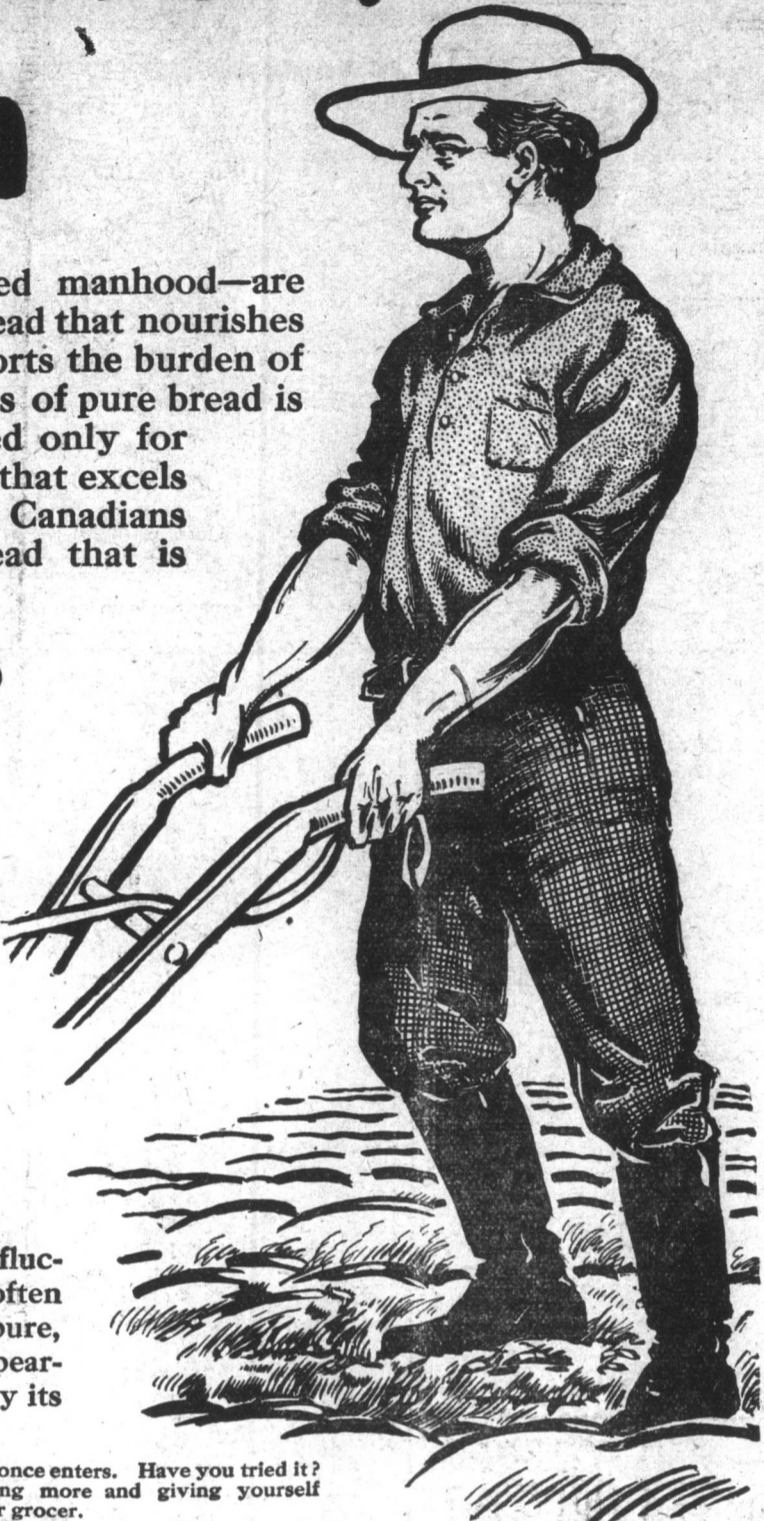

Railway News.

W. D. Reid, Esq., returned from a visit to the Branch Railway by express yesterday. Mr. Reid was well down as far as Seal Cove is favourably impressed with the agricultural conditions, the good land and comfortable houses at Goose Bay and Southward Bay. The ballasting of the track is finished to Goose Bay, and the rails have been laid down the shore of Southward Bay within five miles of Seal Cove. The grading and ballasting will be completed by Seal Cove by Saturday night next. The road comes out close to the water's side at several points in the locality where the water is deep enough for steamers to come alongside. The gangs commenced turning up the ditches at Shoal Harbor yesterday. The work on the abutments at Shoal Harbor River will be completed by Saturday next; the river there is about 50 feet wide. The foundations are in at the bridge of George's Brook, and the foundations for the bridge at Goose Bay River will be completed to-day. The grading on the road is the heaviest ever done in this country, and there has so far been more rock per mile than so far ever met with. The survey is completed to Bonavista. Cobb's headquarters are at Goose Bay, and Burton's at Seal Cove.

The Newfoundland Quarterly.

The June number of the Newfoundland Quarterly just issued is well up to its usual standard of pictorial and literary excellence. The contents include an article on "Joan of Arc" by Archbishop Howley; "Lamb and Sucking-Pig" by Mr. Ray; Poems by D. Carroll, R. G. McDonald and W. Saiter; "Tenth Sonnet of Camoens," translated by J. W. McNelly; also contributions from Messrs. F. B. Wood, J. F. Brown, F. C. Berteau and Rev. M. F. Power on the Micmacs; Judge Prowse tells old stories of wrecks and riots. On the whole the number is well worth reading.

WARSHIP DELAYED.—The French warship, Surcouf, was delayed in port owing to the fact that the anchor when being hoist unshackled and went to bottom. The ship's diver went down and secured it, and the crew of the Norwegian ship, Michel Sars, also rendered aid in getting it up. The warship sailed for St. Pierre yesterday afternoon.

ANNIVERSARY OF FIRE.—To-day is the 18th anniversary of the big fire which wiped out over half the city of St. John's and caused a property loss of \$20,000,000 and three lives. The fire started in Mr. Timothy O'Brien's stable, junction of Freshwater and Pennywell Roads, and rendered 10,000 people homeless and destroyed most of the public buildings.

CATTLE VERY SCARCE.—Cattle are at present very scarce, and it is difficult for butchers to get a supply of fresh meat for their customers. Yesterday at a sale of a few head held at Pitts' prices were high, and some animals sold for 20 cents the pound on the hoof. In the Province of Nova Scotia cattle are very scarce, and the actor, Carl E. Richards only brings a few head at a time.

The splendid silver cup put up by Mr. P. F. Collins, dry goods man, and which is now in the window of his store, was closely contested on Labour Day. The contest for the cup was keen and the Longshoremen won it with 22 points, while the Truckmen followed closely with 21 points. To be retained it must be won 3 years.

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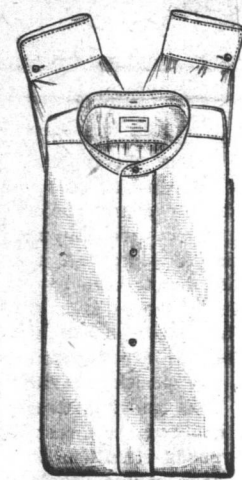
