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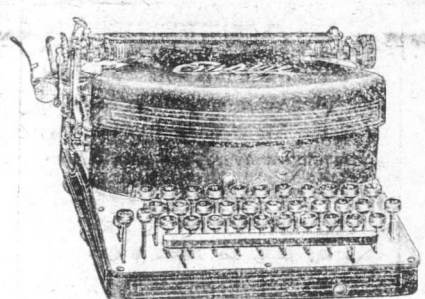

Morris's Financial Dope

In 1897 the present Premier declared that, with few exceptions, the members of the Tory party were "not competent to conduct a bull's eye shop." We now ask those who have read the part of Sir Edward's speech at Burin, which relates to the financing of the Branch Railway Schemes, whether they think the Tory party has increased its financial competency by placing Sir Edward at the head of the aggregation. It will be remembered that the new chief was hailed by the Tory party as "the brains of the Liberal party." How perplexed the members of the Tory party must feel to-day when they find the country gradually but surely becoming involved in the financial obligations which are ensuing from the building of the branch lines which can be built under the authority of the Railway Extension Act, 1910, and the financial obligations which will ensue from the building of the other extensions to which the Premier has pledged the Tory party.

A perusal of the speech we have under reference, will show that all the extensions are mentioned with the exception of the branch from Stephenville Crossing to Port au Port.

In regard to these, Sir Edward made the amazing and absurd statement which we quoted yesterday, and which we again repeat, as the most flagrant financial misrepresentation which we have heard of, proceeding, as it did, from the mouth of one, occupying the responsible position of Premier, and who in addition had taken personal charge of the railway policy and conducted the negotiations for the 1910 Railway loan.

Here it is:—
"By a successful loan of four million dollars at three and a half per cent, which I raised last year in London, at ninety-seven and a half, the highest rate ever obtained by the Colony before, we have been able to build all these railway branches, and pay the interest on them out of our regular revenue, and after all this we still have a surplus left, which we have

given back to the people in the shape of all the public utilities which I have named."

Not only did this tissue of flat misrepresentation and false suggestion proceed from the Premier by word of mouth, but it was afterwards written out, printed some days after revision, published in a newspaper in a form which shows the printed speech is to be circulated widely as a pamphlet.

Why then all this trouble been taken to send forth broadcast such a false statement in reference to the financial results of the Premier's railway policy. Can any thoughtful person regard such a statement as an honest declaration of the financial obligations resulting from this policy? Or is he forced to the conclusion that it is a financial dope administered to the electors to render them unconscious of where they are tending?

It must be evident to all thinking minds, working on the basis of the financial statement, tabled in the House of Assembly last spring, which set forth very plainly that more than one third of the loan had already been expended on work done and rights of way bought up to December 31st last, that little of the loan will be left when payment has been made for all the railway work that has been done, for lands bought, and services rendered, up to December 31st next. This year it must be remembered that work has been proceeding on three branch lines, viz., the Bonavista Branch, the Trepassey Branch, and the Heart's Content Branch.

Moreover it is doubtful whether all the work contemplated in connection with the Bonavista Branch will even be done or paid for next January. In this connection there will be the building of the Trinity Spur line and station in Ryan's field and the railway pier at Bonavista to give Bonavista a harbour which will not be paid for at that time, even if all the other extras are disposed of. There will be left also the completion of the Trepassey branch and the Heart's Content branch, the commencement of the work to Fortune Bay, and to Bonne Bay. The application to the Legislature for power to build (1) a line along the Bay de Verde shores; (2) a line to St. Mary's; and (3) a line to Port au Port must come on later.

Next Spring, the Opposition will insist on learning how many hundreds of thousands of dollars will be available for work next summer. We venture to predict that the Colony must be saddled with another loan for many millions before this work, contracted for or contemplated, can be done.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—At a recent meeting of the Municipal Council a note was read from a legal gentleman on behalf of a Councillor who owns some property asking for permission to make some repairs to it. The request was discussed in the usual way. The decision arrived at was that the matter be deferred for the present as in a year or so, if finances permit, the Council might see their way fit to take over the property for widening purposes. The Mayor intimating that for the present nothing could be done as there were too many things more necessary, and the revenue was not sufficient to provide the required sewerage, etc., in places where it is badly needed. The consensus of opinion seemed to favour the Mayor's remark. Before the next meeting took place the Mayor was taken ill. In the meantime the Councillor despatched an official to report the property, who valued it at \$1,300. A Councillor at the next meeting introduced a proposition that the City buy out the property at the above mentioned figure, and strange to relate another member of the Council seconded his measure. Another Councillor at this juncture objected to the proposition, asked by whose authority was the valuation made, and denounced the proceedings in strong language stating that they were taking an unfair advantage of the Mayor, and that the buying of the property would be manifestly unjust to taxpayers generally. His remarks were supported by another Councillor. The movers then withdrew their proposition until the Mayor is able to resume his duties. As the matter has not been finalized it would be perhaps rather premature and unfair to pass any remarks, but it will be interesting to read the reports of the Council meetings during the next few weeks. However, it is clearly apparent that there is room for civic reform not alone in the city proper, but, in its controllers. More anon.

PEKIN, To-day.
The Foreign Legation have received no despatches from Hankow since 6 o'clock last evening. The last message from the American Consul General stated that fighting had begun. It is believed that the concessions at Hankow are safe, that 10 or 12 foreign cruisers are in the harbor, and that there is ample protection even from the joint Chinese army and navy. The German Legation at Pekin made denial of the report that German troops had been engaged in fighting in the streets at Hankow.

Building Big Store.

The firm of Bowring Bros. are erecting at Mudge's premises by far the largest fish store in the city. It is being built with the very best of material, the beams, girders, &c., being imported from New York, and when finished will be up to date style of elevators will be installed with modern fish screws and presses, and the whole will be run by gas. The building is three storied and will be capable of holding an immense quantity of fish. The firm are taking in more fish than for years before and are using their central South Side premises for this purpose, which they have rarely done heretofore.

A Narrow Escape.

Mr. Jonas Barter, truckman, had a narrow escape yesterday at 1 p.m. while taking a load of furniture off his cart at Mr. J. Gibb's house at Bell Street. Carman Galloway was at the head of the street with his horse and long cart, drawing a cask of kero oil. It fell off and rolled down the hill at great speed towards the spot where Mr. Barter was standing. He jumped out of the way, but realizing that the cask might break his horse's legs, made a dart and caught it, turning it course into the side drain. He sprained his wrist in doing so but saved his horse and probably the lives of the little children who were playing in the street below him.

A Contemptible Act.

James Blandford, returned at 6 o'clock this morning from Fort Churchill, Hudson Bay, having left there on the 23rd September, calling at Sedelick Bay, Domino and Battle Harbor on the way up. The Erik was employed by the Canadian Government to take down coal to the survey ship s.s. Minto, operating in Hudson Bay. Capt. Blandford first called at Fort Nelson and then went on to Churchill, where she met the Minto and transferred the coal to her. The return trip of the Erik was very stormy up to Battle Harbor. Coming out of Hudson Straits the drift ice was met. The survey schr. Christie Thomey would have been caught for the winter most likely only that the Erik took her in tow and brought her 570 miles, from Fort Churchill to Cape Digs, at the entrance to Hudson Straits. The ice was rafting down through Fox Channel early in September. Mr. Greeley, who came up in the Erik to Battle Harbor, was there transferred to the Minto. The Erik also brought up the wreck crew of Mr. Dunn's schooner, Harbor Grace, Capt. Samuel Antle, of Briggs, who was in the schooner Jeanie, lost last fall at Cape Fullerton, came up passenger by the Erik. The rest of the crew, it will be remembered, travelled to Quebec, 900 miles, but he decided to stay. He is in good health and spent a good winter with the N.W.M. Police at Fort Churchill.



Something About the Unknown Man in Borden's Cabinet

With the announcement of the personnel and allotment of portfolios in the Borden Cabinet comes to an end the speculation which has filled the mind of the public for the past three weeks, but it provides the people of Canada with one conspicuous example of the vagaries of political fortune. The elevation of one man from political

obscurity in the Liberal party to a position subordinate only to that of Prime Minister in the Conservative Cabinet after the probation of a few weeks, is the political sensation of the hour, and is causing grave and disconcerted rumors in the Tory camp.

Hon. W. T. White, formerly General Manager and until yesterday Vice-President of the National Trust Company, is now Finance Minister of Canada, with the seal and woe of the trade policy in his keeping. For the past ten days Mr. White's name

has been canvassed along with others in the Borden line-up, but the actual announcement came yesterday with striking force.

Clerk Twelve Years Ago.
Twelve years ago Mr. White, three months a graduate in law and a clerk in the civic assessment department, was selected by Mr. E. R. Wood to become Manager of the National Trust Company, then under organization. That announcement, when made was hardly less sensation-al than the one of yesterday. Mr. White undertook the management of the National Trust Company at a salary of \$3,000 per year. At the end of the first year he received a bonus of \$1,000 and his salary was increased to \$4,000 per year. Figures stop here, but it is a fair estimate that on his recent retirement from active participation in the management of the National Trust Company his income would not be far short of five times that amount.

Protest From Conservatives.
Mr. White's appointment has not been made without some friction within the Conservative party. Probably no Prime Minister has ever been inducted by so many aspirants for office and a share in the spoils of victory as Mr. Borden. One who has seen the House of Commons at close

range can recall the hungry, reaching look of men who are in the Cabinet and without it. The proposal to include Mr. White raised a storm of protest, and loudest from those who were ready to decapitate the Conser-

Miss Sarah Washington, aged 19 years. It is believed that Miss Beatrice Stuart, aged 18 years, who was shot in the chest by Carlisle, could not survive her wounds. With Carlisle, who received a shot in the leg from the troopers who captured him, she was taken to the post hospital at Fort Ethan Allen for treatment.

Trooper Fox, who is understood to have caused Carlisle's arrest early today for not reporting for morning fatigue duty, was apparently the object of the attack.

Deceased was born in Devonshire and came to Newfoundland when a young man and settled down at Carbonear where he later carried on business with the late Mr. John J. Ansey for a short time. When they dissolved the partnership Mr. Hawker obtained a responsible position with the well-known firm of John Rorke & Sons. In 1859 on December 22nd, Mr. Hawker was married to Miss Pearce, of Carbonear, who survives him. Two years ago the firm of Rorke & Sons presented the deceased with an address of congratulation in honour of his Golden Jubilee; he was also made a Justice of Peace on that occasion. Throughout his life Mr. Hawker was a consistent Churchman and cheerfully did what he could to help his neighbors in spiritual and temporal matters. He was a deeply religious man, and who was slow to think evil of his neighbor much less do him an injury. He was of a very cheerful disposition and helped to make the evils of life light for all with whom he had social and business relations. He will be greatly missed by all his acquaintances. He came home from Labrador last July hoping that his health would improve but Providence had willed otherwise and he gradually declined. Deceased leaves a widow and an only son, Mr. M. J. Hawker, Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Assembly, to mourn their loss. The Telegram extends to them its sincere sympathy.

They remained ashore till about 1 a.m. Saturday, and again boarded the vessel and spent a most anxious time of it until after daylight. So close was the vessel drawn to the cliff that the back wash of the seas receding from it several times came on board. They were delighted later when the storm abated and they could get an opportunity to leave the place.

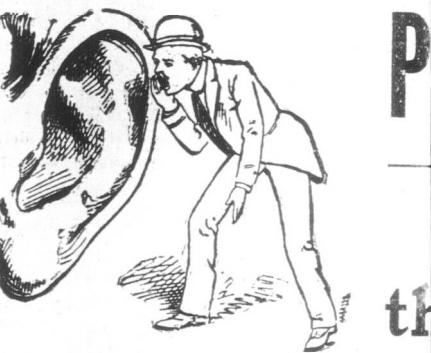

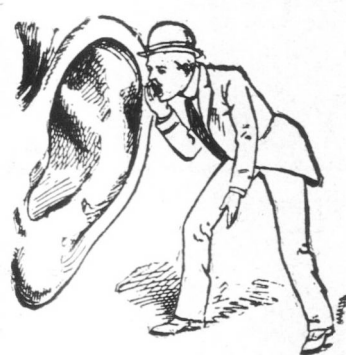

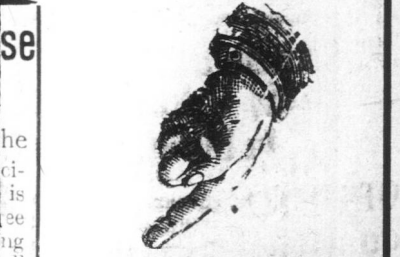

Fish Steamer.**


Yesterday we referred to the fact

inland sea.




