





A progressive business man has instituted an excellent system of arranging and labelling the various departments in his store.

One of the assistants in a neighbouring store pointed out the advantages of the new system to his employer and suggested that they adopt it.

The employer was horrified. Copy, his rival! Certainly not, that would never do. So he retained the old-fashioned, inadequate method rather than employ the new, efficient plan.

Do you think he was right? I don't. To my mind it is a great mistake to be afraid of copying a good thing. It is best to be able to originate good ideas and adopt and adapt them for your own use.

Incidentally I think there is altogether too much stress laid on originality. There are many people who think if a thing is new and different it is therefore better than the old. But newness in itself does not necessarily constitute an advantage. To be superior, the new way must have some other recommendation. Nor on the other hand does newness constitute a disadvantage as many people seem to think. The highest type of mind examines both the new and the old as nearly without prejudice as is possible, and then has the courage to adopt the old road or the unbroken trail, whichever seems to it best.

Do not be afraid to copy anything which your judgment tells you is an improvement. There is nothing real-

ly new under the sun, they say, and the chances are that he from whom you copy, copied in his turn from someone else.

Of course I do not mean all this advice wholly for business men. Not by any means.

At least not for business men in the accepted sense. Life is business. We are all business men or women and manage each our own life efficiently or inefficiently, as the case may be. And those who run it efficiently are those who always have their eyes and minds wide open ready to see and adopt anything worth copying.

You, Mrs. Married Woman, find housework hard. It seems to come easy to your neighbour. Why? Study her, find out, and copy her methods as far as you can.

You little lonely lady do not seem to get along with the masculine sex. If you want to change, study some of the popular girls whom you know, and in so far as you approve of them copy some of the qualities by which they seem to attract.

You, Mr. Mann, are conscious of not having a good presence. You are diffident and awkward, when you should be cordial and at ease. Pick out some man who has an unusually winning presence and copy some of his ways.

Doctor Johnson says, "No man ever became great by imitation." Doubtless that is true about people who slavishly imitate some one person. But let a man originate where he can, and where he cannot let him copy the best from many models. Like the bee calling its drop of honey from each flower, and he will be as great as it lies in him to be.

Fat.

Author of "At Good Old Swash." Fat is a bank account of flesh which Nature lays up against hard times.

Fat cannot help a man or animal do its work and in time of prosperity is entirely useless, it is a dead-head riding around on a perpetual pass. Nothing is more irritating than to hoist a hundred pounds of fat uphill and let it painfully downhill each day without being able to collect fare from it.

However, in times of famine fat comes nobly to the rescue. When a man cannot get beefsteak and bread he can live on his fat for many days, although his stomach, which isn't invited to the banquet, makes a terrible fuss over it.

However, famine is unpopular nowadays and is a great rarity, while fat keeps steadily on increasing, especially in our best society.

Working classes are not generally troubled with fat, because when a fat cell gets between two muscle cells which are working it is usually ground up. However, after a man has lived on choice food for a generation and has ridden easy chairs through life with great persistence, he usually begins to outgrow his clothes for the second time at about the age of forty. Most unfortunately the word "man" is here used as the word "voter" is in suffrage states.

Nowadays fat is a greater calamity than appendicitis or any disease which can be cut out with a carving knife. When the human body begins to put on flesh it does so with an enthusiasm which cannot be headed into more useful channels. When a man's body has decided to put on flesh he can cut his meals down to a cracker a day and can spend the time between meals running up and down stairs in a gymnasium suit for years at a time, letting out his belt regularly once a month.

The doctors have done wonderful things, but in the presence of fat and baldness they are helpless and abashed. The doctrine of predestination has now been practically abandoned except with regard to increasing flesh. Some men are born to be fat, and after starving themselves heroically for sixty years, die, and are wedged into a piano box for a coffin. Others leap through life eating meals which would make a box-constrictor blink with amazement, and walking between raindrops with the greatest ease. There is no cure for fatness, but philosophy is a great relief.

Fisheries In Jeopardy.

(From the Boston Transcript.) It is two months, if not three, since the investigators of the other trawl entered their report with the Department of Commerce. The finding on that report has been awaited for several weeks, and on it hang the futures of most of our existing fishing vessels. The study of the steam traw-

ling industry occupied more than a year. The Government investigators made repeated trips in the steamers, presumably accompanying them under all weather and season conditions under which fish would be taken in an otter trawl. These investigators were chosen with considerable care. In order that they might be acceptable to the company which owns the fishing steamers as well as to the Government.

It is probable that the sense of the report and the action which the Government does or does not take relative to it will have considerable weight with similar action by our neighbors to the north. We have received vital assurance that the use of this destructive fishing gear will be prohibited in Canada and Newfoundland if the United States Government will join in this form of protection of that inexhaustible harvest of the North Atlantic fisheries—inexhaustible so long as they are fished in the present economical way, but by no means inexhaustible if a gear is permitted which rakes and scrapes the sea-bottom, destroying the young fish and the very feeding grounds which allure the fish to places where they can be caught.—Fishing Gazette.

Factories in Japan.

There are 500,000 factory girls in Japan, and of this number 300,000 are under the age of 20 and 400,000 are employed in spinning and weaving factories, principally making cotton and silk thread and cloth. Of the latter, 70 per cent. live in dormitories, established partly with a view to their detention.

Typhoid Fever at Bonavista.

TWO DEATHS REPORTED.
A message to the Health Authorities from Bonavista yesterday states that out of three cases of typhoid, recently discovered, two had proved fatal. No further particulars were received, so it is not known if the patients belonged to one family.
Magistrate Roper, Drs. Forbes and Rutherford are taking the necessary steps to prevent a further outbreak of the disease.

What Villa is Like When Not Killing Men.

Rebel When Angered is as Feroocious as Wild Beast.

New York, April 29.—Alexander Powell, a journalist, in describing a personal visit to General Villa at Juarez, among other interesting things says:
"Villa is always grim and sullen, but when angered by anything, no matter how trivial, he becomes as ferocious as a wild beast. He has about as much regard for human life as a tiger. Here is an incident to illustrate my point:
"After a recent rebel victory in northern Chihuahua four score or so Federal prisoners were lined up in the plaza for Villa's inspection. The rebel commander, hands thrust into the pocket of his frayed coat, sombrero pulled over his eyes, strode forward and surveying the cowering captives.
"Viva Villa!" he snapped.
The shrill cheer, dominated, however, by an unmistakable note of fear, ran down the cowering line.
"You dogs!" he snarled. "You shout 'Viva Villa' to-day because I happen to be on top, but if I had lost a battle to-morrow you'd be shouting 'Viva Huerta!'"
Then turning to the commander of the guard: "Take them out and shoot them—and mind that you waste no ammunition. We've none to spare."
They were placed in groups of five or six close together as they could stand, and a soldier placed the muzzle of his Mauser against the breast of the foremost man in each group. . . . and pulled the trigger. In this way one bullet did the work of five.
A Bad Taste.
"A few more episodes like that general," I told Villa quite frankly, "and you'll lose for your cause all the sympathy that it has gained in the United States. The reports of these wholesale executions are leaving a bad taste in the mouths of Americans."
"Those that I have executed deserved all they got," said Villa, with a sudden hardening of the muscles about the mouth. "Some of them helped to betray Madero, others were prisoners whom I had paroled and whom I had caught with arms in their hands. But that stage of the campaign is now over. Hereafter we shall conduct the war along more civilized lines."
"There will be no more executions except in aggravated cases—I give you my word as to that."
Twenty-four hours later a messenger sent to Villa by Felix Diaz was taken out of that very room where we sat and shot to death beneath the very window out of which I had been looking. It made a most unpleasant mess in the little garden.
Blow Head Off.
On another occasion Villa was anxious to send reinforcements to one of his outposts, then in danger of attack from the Federals. Something went wrong with the engine, and it so angered Villa that he went to the station and, walking up to the officer in charge, shoved his revolver barrel against his face and said:
"If that train isn't out of the station in five minutes," he snarled, "I'll blow your head off."
"But, general," expostulated the trembling official, "I'm not responsible for the delay. The engine's broken down."
"That doesn't concern me," said Villa coolly. "I'm not an engineer—I'm a soldier. If that train doesn't move in five minutes you'll be dead."
The train moved.
As I rose to take my departure Villa, though obviously in considerable pain, stood up and took my hand.
"Good-bye, general," I said. "Perhaps the next time we meet it will be in the City of Mexico in the National Palace."
Avenge Madero.
His eyes flamed, "In the City of Mexico, perhaps," he answered, "if God lets me live to reach there, but in the National Palace—never. I have no wish to be president. Who am I to rule a country? I have no education for such a post. For eighteen years I was an outlaw with a price on my head. It was not until I was in prison in the capital, two years ago, that I taught myself to read and write at all. I am no politician; I am a fighting man. I am fighting to free my country from the rule of a despot and to avenge the murder of Madero, who believed in me and befriended me. And I shall never rest until I have settled that score."
"And, unless a knife or a bullet cuts short his career, I don't believe that he will."

LABOR TROUBLE. A New Enterprise.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—As there seems to be some misunderstanding in relation to the new scale of wages of the Longshoremen's Protective Union, notice of which was given by me to the employers, I desire to point out that the wages paid in this port for loading and unloading general cargo boats is eight cents an hour by day and ten cents an hour by night less than that paid in the port of Halifax. The average wages earned by the men in this port for loading and unloading a steamer of the size of the Florizel is about \$7.70; in the port of Halifax it is \$10.75 or \$2.05 more.

Now it is a well known fact that a workingman and his family can live cheaper in Halifax than they can in St. John's and in addition is paid more for his labor. A great deal is said about increased cost in labor must increase the cost of articles to people who want them; while this is true in some cases it is not true in all. We are paying more for every article we use to-day, with but a couple of exceptions, than ever before, no one will have the hardihood to say that it is due to wages paid in the city. What has wages paid in the city to do with the high prices for beef, pork, potatoes, clothing of all kinds and all household requirements. Ten years ago there was paid twenty-eight cents a ton for discharging coal and the wages then paid for an work was a dollar fifty a day; now it is two dollars and fifty a day. Wherein do the wages paid account for coal having almost doubled in price because it costs but five cents more to discharge it. Another instance is the discharging of salt beads; this work costs twenty-five cents a ton several years ago and the wages paid was \$1.80 a day, now the same work is done for three and four cents less a ton while the wages paid is \$2.00 a day. What the men are looking for is enough to live upon. For the past winter hundreds have been without the common necessities of life. The men do not ask to be paid wages that are not fair and just, and if the scale is high, surely a way to treat it is for both sides to hold a conference and seek to adjust it to suit all interests.

When drawing up the scale we did not seek advice or call the aid of any person, but dealt with the matter from the standpoint of what the home requires, if we have erred we are open to reason and argument, but the attitude of certain employers closes and throws us back upon our own resources. The men can be just as determined in their stand as the employers. We seek no labor trouble but if it comes, will let them who have always been opposed to paying a man for his work, heed the consequences.

LABOR TROUBLE. A New Enterprise.

KNOWN AS THE ST. JOHN'S FRESH FISH MARKET.

A new departure in our midst is the inauguration of a new industry to be known as the St. John's Fresh Fish Market, promoted by Messrs. George Davey and James Chalke, two of our most stirring and energetic citizens, and the tact and push in commercial affairs for which these two gentlemen are noted, is sufficient assurance that this enterprise will be a success.

Operations will commence on this day week, May 15th, in the Davey Building, situated on the east side of Job's Cove, where elaborate preparations have been going on for some time past. An up-to-date plant has been installed and all necessary arrangements completed. Special attention has been given to every detail and no trouble or expense spared by the management whose main idea is to please and satisfy, and the entire equipment is not inferior to similar markets in more pretentious towns.

Yesterday our reporter visited the place and an explanation was given him as to how the concern will be conducted. First of all the management will buy their fish, which will include all sea products, from the local fisherman, after which it will be transferred to a room in the new building, thoroughly washed and cleaned on a dressing table and then removed to a chill room which contains twelve galvanized freezing retorts each of which is 12 feet long, filled up with broken ice, which is taken from the ice-house adjoining. This room has accommodation for two tons of fish at one time. The door is identical to that of an iron safe, works automatically and is nearly always closed, thereby preventing air from getting in and keeping the fish in an excellent state of preservation.

The fish will be disposed of by retail only and telephone communication with the new market will be available to customers at all times. It is the intention of the management to ensure prompt delivery and in this connection a covered vehicle has just been constructed by Wheelwright Carnell to bring around the article purchased.

A feature of the new industry will be the absolute cleanliness in the handling of the article. There is installed two earthen sinks and other conveniences for cleansing purposes and orders can be placed for any amount of fish in any way desired and it will be cut, sliced and delivered at shortest notice by the conveyance, already referred to, which has a galvanized freezing interior and which is a capital illustration of how the fish is kept from the time it leaves the knife until it reaches the consumer.

Cod and salmon will be the principal products handled during the summer, while in the winter season, we understand, halibut and trout will be bought up and kept for sale by the St. John's Fish Firm.

"We extend our congratulations to the promoters who are most optimistic as to the outcome of their venture, and we hope that their sanguinary expectations will be realized and no doubt, they will, because the introduction of this fresh fish industry will be the filling of a long felt want and will be greatly appreciated by the community generally."

THE GREATER QUESTION.

At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are the best means to use to get the best returns from the land.

Fertilizers must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to give the best returns, and is the most reliable and economical source of Nitrogen for agricultural purposes.

For vegetables, grass, and all leafy crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant is making its growth, as well as before sowing the seed.

If a liquid manure is preferred, a oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quantity should not be exceeded.

It is a good plan to reduce the Sulphate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the mixture, which is very powerful.

For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended:—
40 lbs. Superphosphate.
26 lbs. Fine bone meal.
10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia.
15 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.
21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA.

1 cwt. Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 42 square yards.

The use of Carbonate of Magnesia, in conjunction with Sulphate of Ammonia, is of great importance in potato culture.

For turnips use the following:—
66 lbs. Superphosphate.
12 lbs. Fine bone meal.
13 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.
20 lbs. Sulphate of Ammonia.

1 cwt. Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to square yards.

Government Refund Of New Type of Submarine Farmer's Bank Loss.

Ottawa, April 24.—Depositors in the Farmers' Bank who lost their money are going to have it refunded by the Government. The Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance, has given notice that he will move the following resolution: "That it is expedient to provide that there may be paid and applied from and out of the consolidated revenue fund of Canada a sum not exceeding in the whole \$1,200,000 to pay to persons who were creditors for money on deposit in the Farmers' Bank of Canada the respective amounts standing to their credit in the books of the bank when the bank suspended payment."

The chief feature of the new submarines which the admiralty are building, and about which a great deal of secrecy is maintained, is the provision of watertight compartments which find no place in the design of previous British submarines, and of a detachable keel weighing twelve tons, which can be released by those on board should all reserve buoyancy be exhausted.

The S. S. Meigle, Capt. Gooby, sailed yesterday for Port aux Basques to await orders re the beginning of the Straits Service. Humbermouth is still blocked with ice, and it is expected that the ship will have to proceed from Port aux Basques to Bonne Bay.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.
PARIS, May 7.
A despatch today reported that the
Pratender to the Moroccan Sultanate
has been assassinated.

COPENHAGEN, May 7.
King Christopher, of Denmark, and
the Queen left 10-day for London on
a visit to King George and Queen
Mary.

ERIE, May 7.
The steamer City of Rome, from
Buffalo to Toledo, was burned to the
water's edge, ten miles off shore to-
day. The crew, after a battle with the
fire, was forced to take to the
boats to escape.

LONDON, May 7.
An international agreement provid-
ing for the infliction of special pen-
alties on ship captains and other
persons distributing false wireless re-
ports, is urged by the Japanese press
in order to prevent the occurrence of
incidents similar to that of the recent
report of the disaster to the s.s. Si-
berian.

MONTREAL, May 7.
Two hundred seals lay swimming
themselves on an icepan when the
Dominion Line's Athenian steamed
past them in the Gulf. Some of them
were only 15 or 20 feet away. Capt.
Black was a weary man when he tied
the Athenian to her wharf here this
morning. He had not been in bed
since Thursday. He cleared from the
Clyde on April 25th. Five days later
he was in the ice-track and after that
he slept only in snatches.

LONDON, May 7.
Prince Alexander, of Teck, third
son of the late Duke of Teck, is to
succeed the Duke of Connaught as
Governor-General of Canada. This
official pronouncement was made to-
day. The Prince is 40 years of age,
and was married in 1904 to H.R.H.
Princess Alice, of Albany. He has
one son and one daughter.

LONDON, May 7.
Premier Asquith announced this
afternoon that proposals for the re-
construction of the House of Lords
would be introduced by the Govern-
ment this session. This is due to the
attitude which that branch of Parlia-
ment has taken in the Home Rule
Bill. The Premier announced that on
Tuesday he will move a procedure
resolution to fix the time table for
future parliamentary action on the
Home Rule measure. This is expect-
ed to be taken up by the Lords next
week.

LONDON, May 7.
John Redmond, leader of the Na-
tionalists, in a statement issued to-
day concerning reports published re-
cently that conversations had been
renewed with reference to further
concessions for Ulster, declares that
these reports "are according to my
information, entirely incorrect." Red-
mond also declared the report that he
had been in consultation with Pre-
mier Asquith concerning such con-
cessions, was incorrect. "The posi-
tion of the Irish Party with reference
to concessions," the statement of
Redmond continues, "has undergone
no change since the second reading of
the Home Rule Bill. I am confident
that the Home Rule Bill will be pro-
ceeded with rapidly, and that it will
receive its third reading, and be sent
to the House of Lords in its present
shape, certainly before recess."

WASHINGTON, May 7.
General Carranza's attitude towards
mediation, which eliminated him from
the negotiations for the settlement of
the crisis of Mexico, was declared to
have been revealed to-day by an offi-
cial report of his vigorous rebel
military campaign, marked by victor-
ies. While Carranza parleyed with
the South American envoys over the
details of their proposals, three pow-
erful forces hurled themselves against
the federal strongholds. Following
is the summarized statement made by
a minister of the "constitutional"
cabinet now in Washington: "The
defeat of 3,000 federals near San Luis
Potosi, with the capture of 1,800 pris-
oners, arms and ammunition. The
capture of Acapulco, 1,700 men
surrendering, whilst a million rounds
of ammunition, besides arms, were
taken. The capture of field guns, ar-
tillery and ammunition from the
fleeing column which had evacuated Mon-
terrey."

World-Beaters.**

(Vancouver Province.)
Germany now lays claim to the
three biggest things of their respect-
ive kinds in the world. One is a bank
the Deutsche, of Berlin, which by
absorbing a smaller institution has
run up its capital and reserve to
\$106,250,000, and its assets to \$554,
000,000. Another is a steamship com-
pany, the Hamburg-American, with
\$62,875,000 capital and an ocean fleet
of 194 vessels and 1,307,411 tonnage.
And the third is a brewery.




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
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
