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



Serious Accident on Railway.

While attempting to board a mov ing train at Kelligrews, yesterday, Mr. George T. Hudson, draper of this city, lost his grasp of the hand rail with the result that he was thrown from the train with much force and was seriously injured. He is now in hospital with his right leg broken in three places, a deep wound in his scalp, and his back badly bruised. Mr. Hudson left here by the 8.45 train yesterday morning to go as far as Whit-bourne to spend the holiday with some friends there. On reaching Kelligrews he and several other passengers detrained to speak to some friends who had assembled on the platform. When the train started to pull out there was quite a rush, and Mr. Hudson was one of the last to try and board her. He grasped the hand rail of the rear car but as the train had by this time gained speed, he was unable to hold on. He was thrown towards the platform with considerable force, which broke his pot. leg and caused him to fall backwards on some stones that lay between the track and the platform bruising his back and inflicting a deep wound in his head. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and was taken to the waiting room of the station where everything possible was done or him until the arrival of Dr. Mitchell, who went out by special train as soon as news of the accident reached the city. One of the nurses of the General Hospital staff, who happened to be spending a holiday at elligrews, rendered valuable assist-ace and volunteered her services gether with another young lady ex-erienced in First Aid coming along o town with the injured man who suffered much pain on the way. I am told that at the cabinet council next morning more than one minster broke down under the dreadful strain, and that Sir Edward Grey was among them. But, indeed, there were nore tears shed in England in those ragic days than ever before. And they were not tears of weakness, but f unspeakable grief.

If Mr. Asquith's intellectual mas-

ery of the house is supreme, Sir Edvard Grey's influence is not less remarkable as a triumph of character. n many respects his equipment is indistinguished. He has travelled ittle; it is jocularly said that he made nis first visit to Paris when he accompanied the King there a short time go. He is not a linguist: he is wholv insular in his tastes, almost un known in society, much more devoted o fishing than to politics; speaks little, and then in the plainest and nost unadorned fashion; is indifference to the currents of modern life, and turns from his literature to the quietism of Wordsworth, Walton and White's "Selborne:" is rarely seen in the house, and then seems to stray in, as it were, like a visitor from another

And in spite of all this he exercises an almost hypnotic influence on parliament! The detachment of his mind, the Olympian aloofness and serenity of his manner, the transparent honesty of his aims, his entire freedom from artifice and from appeals to the "gallery," all combine to give him a certain isolation and authority that are unique. His speech has the quality of finality. Mr. Asquith wins by sheer mental superiority; Mr. Lloyd George wins by the swiftness and suppleness of his evolutions; Sir Edward Grey wins by his mere presence, and the sense of high purpose and firmness of mind which







Torks Mutiny After Quarrel With Germans.

Forty-Five Ringleaders Sent to Constantinople in Chains.

Athens, Aug. 17 .- (Despatch to the London Chronicle)-The strained and increasingly bad relations between German and Turkish army officers has led to a serious crisis. I have it on quite indisputable authority that a few days ago a quarrel among the staff officers at the front on Gallipoli Peninsula led to a mutiny of formidable dimensions against the Germans. The latter were forced to take the strongest measures to quell the insurrection, and with considerable difficulty arrested the ringleaders and some other

officers involved. These, numbering forty-five, were sent to Constantinople in chains. where they would have been shot, but the German commander did not feel himself in a strong enough position to do so immediately. The arrests caused a great sensation throughout the ranks of the army and increased the very considerable indignation against the Germans, who now have few real friends even among the most

prominent Young Turks. I have spoken to-day with four people who have just arrived here from the Turkish capital. All agree in representing the situation that it is very perilous. One of them was told by the Sultan's physician that His Majesty was very ill and quite incapable of attending to State affairs, and is said to be in a serious state of nervous prostration. Audiences are denied even to the most prominent Germans. One of the four gentlemen is a Greek of my acquaintance, who has resided for forty years in Constantinople and whose statements can be

regarded as absolutely reliable. He tells me the greatest indignation was aroused in all circles in the Capital by the proposal of Prince Hohenlohe-Langenberg to put Germans into the administrative posts in the Capital and throughout the country. The mannerless and overbearing attitude of the Germans, meanwhile, greatly aggravates the people, and has called forth on several occasions lately vigorous protests from several of the Young Turk leaders.

As for the populace generally, my friend says, they are absolutely confused by the rosy communique which are plastered thick on every wall in Stamboul. 


