



The Sales Tax in Operation.

In another column on this

page, to-day, will be found a special despatch from Channel, showing the results of the Sales Tax in operation. Yesterday we published a communication from Ramea (Burgeo and LaPoile) dealing with this tax also. There can be no doubt but that everywhere people view it with disfavor and repugnance, and it would not be surprising if scenes similar to those described by our Channel correspondent were to become the rule rather than the exception. It is bad enough in all conscience to add from forty-five to fifty cents extra duty on flour, but when it comes to imposing the Sales Tax, or extra importation tax on coal, hitherto admitted duty free in the outports, the Government is driving the knife of taxation into the very vitals of the fishermen, particularly those of the South West Coast, who have to depend entirely for fuel on coal imported from Cape Breton, wood being so scarce that the most rigid economy has to be practised in its use for kindling purposes only. The fishermen therefore are the prime sufferers, as with coal at its present price at the mines, and transportation charges pretty stiff as well, the tacking on of at least fifty five cents duty per ton-euphemistically known as a Sales Tax—is an unendur- trate had orders to postpone the case able hardship, and brings the already high cost of that article still further up, taking anywhere from five to six dollars extra on the winter supply out of the pockets of each fisherman of family.

We do not condone lawlessness, yet while Mr. Pike had no justification for forcibly taking his flour from the custody of the Customs, he, it must be admitted, had great provocation. Still in doing so he set at naught the majesty of the law, and in failing to appeal to Caesar, he has now to face the outraged dignity of authority and order. We cannot agree that the imposition of the Sales Tax is unconstitutional. We do aver, however, that the manner of its application is decidedly crude and harsh. The method of raising revenue as illustrated by Surtaxes and Sales taxes is one that would only be adopted by a Government, whose knowledge of the rudiments of finance is appallingly microscopical, and whose ignorance of conditions outside St. John's is antitheticlly gigantic. Should the whole population of the South West Coast arise in protest against being taxed to death the posi-tion of the Government will be precarious in the extreme, and possibly the incident at Channel

So much confusion has resulted from conflicting statements as to what has really taken place in connection with the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, that a statement of the precise position, gleaned from authoritative sources seems necessary Briefly the situation is as follows: Last July the British Government in ormed the League of Nations that the Treaty with Japan would be adapted to the requirements of the League That declaration appears to have been accepted by the Dominions, and indeed by the Britsh Foreign Office as a Denunciation of the Alliance. It was with this understanding that Hon. Arthur Meighen, Premier of Canada, entered the Conference and made his case against any renewal of the Treaty. He was under the impression that unless the Alliance was re newed it would lapse on July 13. The curious thing is that Lord Curzon and right Hon. A. J. Balfour, who proceeded the Canadian Premier, in statements on the subject were under a similar impression. Premier Meighen, in fact, interrogated the British Secretary for foreign affairs, apparently having some slight doubt about the matter, but to the League of Nations constituted denunciation, and that it was wholly a question of letting the Alliance lapse or entering into a new one. 

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
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
