Serious Charge.

AGAINST U.S. STEAMER MASTER.

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—Charges of having abandoned a vessel in distress at sea, preferred against Capt. W. E. Rosamond, of the Shipping Board Steamer Nocatula, by three members of the steamer crew were investigated by steamboat inspectors yesterday. The seamen told the inspectors that on the night of October first, the ship, bound from Glasgow to Boston with coal, failed to investigate the condition of a barkentine, that was sending up flares, in a position about four hundred miles southeast of St. John's Newfoundland.

A gale was blowing at the time. Oat Olsen, one of the complainants, said that a member of the watch had sighted the flares and notified the captain. The steamer's course was changed, and she made for the barkentine, circling the craft several times. On her approach some one aboard fired three shots and members of her crew shouted to the steamer.

Olsen alleged that Capt. Rosamond declared that "he had no time to lay about," and that "probably the barkentine only wanted her position," then put the Nocatula back on her course.

The inspectors said that they would question Captain Rosamond before taking action.

Bouts in London.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—Joe Beckett, the British heavy-weight, scored a technical knockout over Frank Moran, the American heavy-weight, when the referee stopped their bout in the seventh round at the Albert Hall, here tonight.

In the fourth round Moran put Beckett down for a count of five and he repeated it in the sixth round, when Beckett stayed on the floor for seven, but the Englishman came back strong on both occasions. Previously Beckett landed a heavy punch in the pit of the stomach, for which he was cautioned, and eventually was forced to stop the bout. Moran being punished so badly that he could not continue. The bout was scheduled to go twenty rounds.

Jack Bloomfield, the British light-heavyweight champion, stopped Bombardier Wells, in the sixth round.

Soldier Jones, the heavy-weight champion of Canada, won from Englishman Arthur Townley. The referee stopped the bout in the third round, owing to an injury to one of Townley's legs.

Sending Capital Away.

(N.F. TRADE REVIEW.)

A travelling solicitor for funds to complete the erection of the new "Mount Royal Hotel" in Montreal, was in town this week raising the last 500 required to equip the hotel. It may be interesting to our people who have been talking of a large hotel for St. John's to state the fact, that this gentleman had no difficulty in raising all the capital he needed and selling the shares as easily as the proverbial bit of "falling off a log." This follows, of course, mainly from the fact that the proposition from a financial viewpoint is a most attractive one and will pay a certain and absolute eight per cent, with a profitable fat bonus on stock earnings, and offers attractions, that even the most careful investor would not care to let go by.

The point that we wish to make, however, is this: a big hotel to accommodate over 1,000 guests is a good thing for a Montreal medium in bringing in a flow of money from tourists, certainly a hotel proportionate to our own city—say one with 200 rooms, should bring to us some of the good financial results that the Montreal people anticipate—especially in tourist traffic.

We find our people are quite ready to put up money for a hotel in Quebec Province, but that they get "cold feet" when a scheme such as that is projected for St. John's, even though the local outlook for big dividends is equally as good.

It is a sad commentary on our patriotism and business intelligence that such is the case. Tourist traffic from the Canadian cities rich and prosperous. Some people think that "booze facilities" bring tourists into Canada in hundreds of thousands in the summer months. That is a mistake. The Financial Post of Toronto of September 29th, says that of the 617,000 motor cars that crossed the border from the United States into Canada this year, 537,000 registered in Ontario, which has prohibition and 43,000 registered in Quebec, and 28,000 in British Columbia, both of which are wet provinces. American tourists, says the Post, are attracted by good roads and for natural scenery.

There is a lesson for Newfoundland in this. We have the scenery; we are gradually acquiring good roads, but we have not what is most essential of all—A GOOD MODERN HOTEL.

Queer Behaviour of Air Currents.

WEATHER MEN SAY WINDS AND BAROMETER NOT ACTING RIGHT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The weather elements just aren't acting right. That is the only explanation the United States Weather Bureau can make for the protracted drought which grips a great portion of the country. Meteorologically speaking, the winds and the barometric pressures are acting contrary to nature. The air is sluggish and there is little movement in high or low strata, consequently the moisture-bearing air can not journey over the country.

With the exception of California and the Northern Pacific coast, Florida and the east gulf coast, there have been few areas where any rain to speak of has fallen for four or five weeks.

There is a "low" extending from Washington, D.C., to south of Knoxville, Tenn., which is hardly moving and which forms a barrier to moisture-bearing winds. When that moves away, and the weather bureau says, there will be some chance of a change for the weather.

Weather bureau officials can see no relief from drought and also from the general attending high temperatures in any section of the country, except where local showers are reported. From nine cities throughout the Midwest have come reports of temperatures higher than ever before recorded for this time of the year. For at least 24 hours, which is about the limit of time the forecasters will prognosticate, fair and generally warm weather is predicted. The temperature has risen in the lower lake regions and the North Atlantic States and has remained unseasonably warm from the plain States eastward.

By Air to the Pole.

PLANS FOR 700-MILE AIRSHIP VOYAGE.

Captain Charles Frobenius, who served with the R.A.F. during the war, is now in London in connection with the proposal for a flight to the North Pole by airship. The expedition is being held up for want of funds, and £20,000 is required to enable the scheme to materialize.

The flight is to commence from London, with stops at Aberdeen, Christiania, North Cape, Bear Island, and Spitzbergen, where the airship will be tested preliminary for a final dash of 700 miles to the Pole.

On the last stage of the journey, the airship, which will carry a crew of ten, is not expected to attain a high speed than fifty miles an hour. She will have powerful wireless apparatus with which it is hoped to be in constant communication with two wireless stations nearest the Pole.

It is not expected there will be any difficulty in effecting a landing if the Pole is reached.



Labrador Herring.

(Hr. Grace Standard.)

During the fall, herring in considerable quantities were to be caught at Spang Harbor and vicinity. The fish were of a large size and excellent in quality, and a few barrels that were brought home show that no fault could be found with them. The fishermen unfortunately were not provided with the means of packing what would have been a useful addition to the profit of their labors. Years ago Spang Harbor was one of the chief centres of the herring fishery, and cargoes were sent to Montreal and other markets, every fall, the fishery proving a valuable one to the fishermen and the exporters. At present there is not a ready market for this highly edible fish, as the South and West Coast fisheries more than supply the demand. The Labrador herring is in a class by itself, and were the fish caught and marketed they probably would find a market that at present is non-existent.

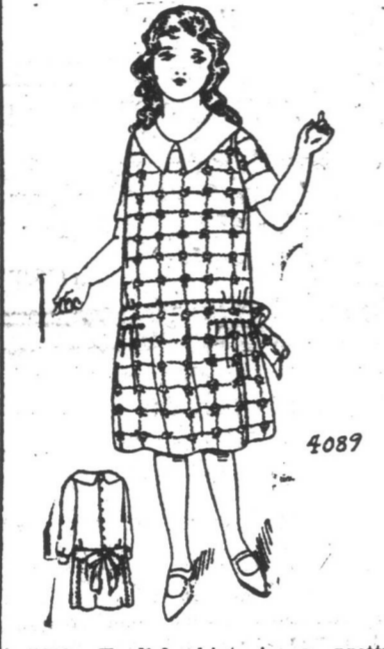

Chanak Itself an Eastern Gibraltar. BRITISH OFFICERS IN CHARGE THERE REGARD THEIR POSITIONS AS IMPREGNABLE.

CHANAK, Asia Minor, Oct. 7.—"We are only three weeks old, but already have the strength of Gibraltar, said a British Captain, who escorted the Associated Press correspondent ashore at Chanak this morning."

It is exactly three weeks since preparations for the defence of Chanak were begun, and in that time this straggling village of white-walled houses has become the centre of one of the most formidable fortresses in the world.

From the harbor, where a dozen freighters, and transports swing at anchor, there is little to be seen except a few gaunt earthworks and hospital buildings to the east of the town. Here and there along the hillside are groups of white tents, and the long white highway which connects the town and disappears among the steeply undulating hills is dotted with army trucks, mule wagons and other transport.

Lived Two Days on Fish.

YARMOUTH SCHR. CREW HAVE
STRENUOUS EXPERIENCE.

Under riding sail, foremast and jib, the Yarmouth auxiliary fresh fisherman, Lewis H. Smith, Capt. E. Nickerson, put into port yesterday afternoon with her mainmast split, short of provisions and gasoline, but with 25,000 pounds of fresh halibut in her pens, says the Morning Chronicle, Halifax, Oct. 14. For two days her crew of twenty were practically without food, as dried halibut comprised their menu for that time and their water supply was limited. The vessel will likely land her fish here and have her mainmast repaired.

It is five weeks since the Lewis H. Smith, which is a flat roofer, left her home port and during that time she has weathered almost continuous gales during the time she had been on the Banks. Twice she has put into Halifax for repairs. She arrived here on September 17 with her foremast and her foremast crossrees damaged, also foremast and jumbo torn, which occurred a few days previous when she was 25 miles off Scattered. After making repairs she left here several days later for the Banks.

Her last trip on the Banks has been the most trying Captain Nickerson and his crew had for many months. Little did they mind bad fishing in bad weather or even when the elements split her mainmast but the exhaustion of her stores hit them hard. Yesterday she arrived here with store lockers cleaned out, not an ounce of provisions being aboard the vessel. For two days her crew lived on dried halibut, they having a small supply of lard, which was also exhausted when the vessel reached port.

The vessel's mainmast was split in a gale off Sable Island on Wednesday and a trysail was immediately rigged.

A VIRTUE WITH A BAD NAME.

Give a dog a bad name and hang him.
Give a virtue a bad name and damn it.
And that I think is exactly what has happened to a certain highly honorable virtue in America.

Thrift means economy and frugality in the management of property. It is one of the essential foundations of all success. No man can keep on making a success in business unless the principle of thrift, which is avoidance of waste and careful utilization of time and money, are used in his business.

Why Not The Business of Saving.

No man means to spend money in business without getting an adequate return. And no one questions that there is an admirable attitude. But in the business of living—well somehow that is supposed to be a different thing. If a man is thrifty in his use of time and money in his private life we are inclined to look at him askance, to call him "close," to say he probably has Scotch blood in him (to my mind one could pay no greater compliment but perhaps I am a bit prejudiced for obvious reasons.)

The average American would rather be called a spendthrift than to have it said he was careful in his use of money.

What is being careful in the use of money but trying to get the most out of our life, since the money you earn represents your life that is spent in the earning of it.

Money—Time—Life.

Benjamin Franklin says we should not waste time and wish it away if we stopped to think that we were wishing away our lives. And since

money is simply time converted into the power to buy other people's time, when we waste money, do not make it yield its full purchasing power, we waste life.


In the old days thrift was recognized as one of the cardinal virtues of a woman. "Many things make the honor of a man," says an old Greek proverb, "few that of a woman. Economy, modesty and silence adorn a woman." We are inclined to laugh at that point of view now. But we do not laugh at the troubles that follow our failure to exalt that virtue. We carry them to the divorce courts when the woman of the family spends the man's money so foolishly that the home is wrecked. One is sorry for the woman whose training may have included no conception of the value of money, no teaching as to how to get the most out of it. But one is terribly sorry for the man who sees a part of his life thrown away when the woman fails to get full value for the money his time has been exchanged for.

Thrift And Generosity.

Doubtless one of the reasons we do not honor the virtue of thrift as we should is that we associate it with stinginess. Of course it can degenerate into that. But thrift does not need to be associated with meanness. On the contrary, says a certain well known Scotchman who is indignantly defending the honor of his people, "I have yet to learn that thrift and generosity cannot be twin virtues and my experience is that they are generally to be found together."

I agree with him. The most generous person I have ever met is the thriftest. Incidentally, as Mr. Lauder would be glad to hear, she is a Scotchwoman.

Presented Prizes to the Skippers.

FAREWELL BANQUET TO CAPTAINS AND CREWS OF THE RACING SCHOONERS.

"Captain Angus, you have a man's job, to defend the cup, but when it comes to doing a man's job, it is a Nova Scotian who can do it. Every where the British flag flies there are the people behind you wishing you God speed and success," said Premier Murray when speaking on behalf of the Government of Nova Scotia Green Lantern as a farewell to the Bluenose and in honor of the captains and crews of the vessels participating in the races.

Over two hundred guests sat down at the banquet board. Among those present were: Premier Murray, W. L. Hall, K.C., H. R. Silver, Hon. J. C. Tory, William Duff, M.P., Henry Bauld, M.P.P., Senator Tanner, Lieut. Clarence Jones, Commander of H.M.C.S. Patriot, the Captain of the four schooners of the race, Capt. Angus Walters, Capt. Joseph Conrad, Capt. Frank Whyndacht, and Capt. Emil Mack, Mr. Snyder of the Toronto Telegram, Mr. Davidson of Vancouver, Mr. W. H. Dennis of the Halifax Herald.

Through the efficient chairmanship of Ralph Hendry, there was a quick fire programme of short speeches. Their brevity and pointedness was a model of after dinner speaking, and under its influence enthusiasm reigned at top notch until the three rounding cheers for the Bluenose closed the function.

M. J. J. Kinley made a plea for the entertainment and care of the crews when in future they were in Halifax to race. Mr. Duff told of the national interest in the race, the unanimous attitude of Parliament in voting the financial aid, and that in the inability of Hon. Mr. Lapointe, Minister of Marine or any members of the Cabinet to attend as the official Canadian representative, that he had asked the Government to send the chief Liberal Whip, Mr. G. W. Kyte, member for South Cape Breton and Richmond.

Mr. W. H. Dennis, after expressing appreciation of the hard work which the Trustees and Committee have been giving to the race, urged the practical importance of the international event. He suggested that men such as Mr. Silver, Mr. Kinley, and Mr. Duff might be appointed by the Provincial Government as a Commission to inquire into the development of the fishing industry of Nova Scotia, the one thing he hoped the race would encourage and result.

Mr. H. R. Silver presented the prizes. That to Captain Walters of the Bluenose, the Cup of the Nova Scotia race, and a cheque for \$500. To Captain Conrad, of the Canada, a cheque for \$1,000; to Captain Mack of the Mahaska, a cheque for \$800, and a

cheque for \$700 to Captain Whyndacht of the Margaret K. Smith.

Many tributes were paid to the sportsmanship of the Captains of the vessels, and as each came forward for his prize they were given resounding ovations of applause.

A Canadian flag was presented to Captain Angus Walters, by Mr. Morton representing the Canadian Credit Men's Association—Morning Chronicle, Oct. 11.

Produce and Provisions.

(From the Newfoundland Trade Review.)

Codfish—The total exports of codfish this week were 13,435 quintals as follows:

From Outports—By schooner Edward Roy from Woods Island 1,635 quintals from Farquhar and Co. to Halifax; by schooner N. Hazen from the Labrador Export Co. Fogo, to Lisbon 2,710 quintals; By schooner Jean McKay from Burin 6,365 quintals from J. B. Patten and W. Forsey to Halifax.

From St. John's—By schooner Hazel E. Herman from A. H. Murray 1,033 quintals to Kingston Jamaica; by schooner Village Leaf from Penny & Sons, Ramea, 624 quintals to Halifax; by S.S. Sable Island from A. E. Hickman Co. J. H. Roberts 842 quintals to North Sydney and Chicago. By S.S. Belvernon from James Baird, Ltd. 426 to Boston; by S.S. Silvia to New York for transshipment to West Indies 7,316 quintals from A. E. Hickman Co., A. Hearn, T. Hallett, Monroe Export Co., C. F. Bennett, Renew's Trading Co., Tors Cove Trading Co., Job Bros & Co., A. Keen, Bowring Bros Ltd., W. & J. Moore, Williams & Co., T. H. Carter, A. H. Murray, The Kenned Co., R. F. Coppidge, James Baird Ltd., and Harvey & Co.

Opere Market—The stocks this week are 51,215 and consumption 329 quintals. The escudo is down to four cents which is about one sixteenth of pre-war value. It is therefore a marvel that the Portuguese are able to buy our fish at all and keep up the present rate of consumption.

Good shore fish is selling in the local market at 46 per quintal this week, but no Labrador is being handled pending the result of a movement of the Bonavista Bay fishermen to obtain a better price.

Cod Oil—The demand for cod oil in New York and Boston is keeping up fairly good. The S.S. Belvernon took out last trip 21,806 from A. E. Hickman Co. 1,637 from W. A. Munn and 516 for Tessier total 23,958 gallons all for Boston. The S.S. Silvia's last outward cargo included 12,714 gals. from Franklin Agency and 6,111 gals. from Mr. Ebsary, total 18,825 gals. all for New York and the S.S. Manoa 6,150 gals. from Ebsary for Kitchener Ont. Grand total 48,934 gals. The local price is \$122.50 to \$125 per ton according to quantity.

Cod Liver Oil—The market is still inactive and there are very few enquiries. Norwegian product at low prices is supplying New York and Boston requirements and till this is expected to be a substantial improvement in the enquiries for Newfoundland oil. Montreal is taking some, and this week Job Bros Ltd. sent out 3,756 gallons by the S.S. Manoa to that market.

Pork—Ham butts is scarce just now and higher prices are asked by packers. The other grades too are holding firm on an improved movement. The packers are now pretty well cleaned up and are waiting for new supplies of hogs which have not yet begun to come on the market in any quantity. The S.S. Belvernon brought in 490 barrels last week and the Sable Island 495. The present local quotations are about the same as they will be this fall viz., Fat Back \$28.75; Ham Butt \$32.50 as against \$32 last week. Grocers Family Mess \$28 and spare ribs \$24.75.

Beef—Prices are on the up grade showing small but steady advances in the New York market this week. Importers who had contracts for the last Belvernon aggregating 1,010 bris, evidently struck the bottom price of the market when ordering. Extra family and family special have advanced 25 cents per barrel this week in the local market and boneless \$1.25. Bos Flank is the same as last week. The whole situation indicates the first enduring rise for the season suggesting the wisdom of early orderings for fall and winter requirements.

Potatoes—The local crop now being harvested is a disappointment to many farmers who will not at all agree with the idea that this years crop is a re-

cord one. It is certain that the growth was arrested in many farms owing to the too long continuance of dry weather. On the whole however the crop is a good one and well above the average in quantity if not in size of tubers. The price is now \$2.50 to \$3.00 in the city and \$1.80 to \$2.00 in the outports. Home-grown are now supplying all the requirements.

Hay—The S.S. Manoa brought in 606 bales last trip from Montreal and by each boat down the river from now till navigation closes there will be large consignments coming forward. Hay is believed to have reached its lowest point in Canada and most dealers here have ordered their fall and early winter supplies. The local price is now \$39 wholesale per ton for imported and 2 and a quarter cents per pound by the single bale.

Oats—In the local market white oats are now \$3.55 per sack and mixed \$3.45. The price in Canada is now believed to have reached rock bottom and the big crop will be soon reduced by orders pouring in from both sides of the water. It is now a good time to buy for fall and winter requirements. The S.S. Manoa brought in 650 sacks last trip from Montreal.

Apples—The season for importing Gravensteins is about over. Of a shipment of 300 bats, that arrived by the S.S. Recall this week only about half were of this quality the other were Kings and Blenheim, the market for which is about one dollar per barrel higher. The balance of the Gravensteins on hand are being sold out at \$5.25 for Nos. 1 and 2 \$4.75 for Domestic and \$4.50 for No. 3. Oranges Californian brand \$13 to \$14.50, Porto Rico \$6.75 per case. Grapes, \$8 to \$6.50 a keg. Onions \$6 per case. The market here is well supplied with all these.

Propogation of the Faith

A ROMAN CATHOLIC CENTENARY.

Lord Morris, formerly Prime Minister of Newfoundland, opened yesterday afternoon the missionary exhibition which is part of the National Celebration of the Centenary of the Association for the Propagation of the Faith and of the Tercentenary of the Congregation of Propaganda and which is being held until October 23 in the precincts of Westminster Cathedral. In the chair was Monsignor Howlett, Administrator of the Cathedral, and around the platform were missionaries in the dress of various orders famed for their work all over the world. Capuchins, Carmelites, Jesuits, White Fathers, Marists, the Belgian Missionaries of Ghent, Franciscans, Oblates of Mary Immaculate, and many others, their habits striking a sombre note beside the bright purple of the Monsignor's cape and the trimmings of his cassock.

Monsignor Howlett, in explaining the meaning of the celebrations, said that since the Catholic Church first took the world for a school and man for a pupil she had been "delivering the goods." Too often the missionary work of the Church, colossal, catholic, and universal in every civilized and uncivilized part of the world, operating for the good of all classes and conditions of men, was forgotten by the laity—it was a case of out of sight, out of mind. During this year the Sovereign Pontiff had raised the Association for the Propagation of the Faith to a higher status and honored it with apostolic authority to have its headquarters in Rome. Held under the shadow of the Metropolitan Cathedral, he hoped this would be the first of a series of such exhibitions.

Lord Morris said that from the earliest times the missionary's call had been to all nations and to any one, and the exhibition showed that had been done from the early days of Paul down to those of Father Damien. Here in England, Scotland, and Ireland, they owed everything to the early missionaries who centuries ago had lifted the pall of darkness that covered everything and converted the people to Christianity. The ruined Cathedrals and Abbeys throughout the country showed how great was the catholicity of bygone times. Over fifteen hundred years ago, St. Augustine had brought the faith to England and St. Patrick to Ireland. Even in Newfoundland, where the British flag flew first outside these isles, he had heard himself, when he had penetrated among the oldest Indian tribes, traditions of the early Jesuit Fathers, who had brought the Faith in the early days—a tradition to be found in Longfellow's "Hiawatha." Nowadays the cost of training and travel had increased so much that the sinews of war were badly needed to carry on the work of the missionaries.

The exhibition was visited during the afternoon and evening by a large number of the laity and clergy, some of whom had come long distances to be present. The African village, with its huts and articles of native dress and objects of ornamentation was a great attraction, and the Shrine of Confucius, the Devil Hut, were also of interest. On the stalls, some of which were presided over by nuns, but mostly by members of the missionary orders, were native weapons of many kinds, a Burmese piano, curious dolls and native dolls, and a Chinese writing set, with which the missionary in charge was writing in native characters.

The conference in the Cathedral Hall, was opened by Rev. Francis Henry, Superior-General of St. Joseph's Foreign Missionary Society, Mill Hill. He said the Catholic missions were different from those of sects which wished to evangelize. The head of an order could not send his missionaries wherever he wished, but he had to go to Rome for direction and refer to the great Congregation of Propaganda. The Rev. T. A. Sullivan (organising secretary) said that two-fifths of the non-Christian population of the world were grouped under the British flag. The Catholic missioner had a longer and more intensive course of training than those of any other religion. The main objects of St. Joseph's Society, founded by the late Cardinal Vaughan in 1866, was the supply of missionary priests; there were about five missionary colleges with about 350 students in course of education. A cinematograph film illustrating the works of the Mill Hill Fathers in the Upper Nile district in Uganda was then shown and was said to be the only Catholic film.

To-day, at 10.30 a.m. there is the solemn opening of the Triduum and Pontifical High Mass by the Right Rev. John Lally, Bishop of Plymouth. The exhibition continues, re-opening at 11.30 a.m. Lectures will be given during the day in the Cathedral Hall, and at 8 p.m. there will be a general meeting in the Carlton Hall, with Cardinal Bourne in the Chair.—The Times, Sept. 29th.

A street frock of black tulle has pleated insets in the sleeves to match the pleated panel at one side of the skirt.

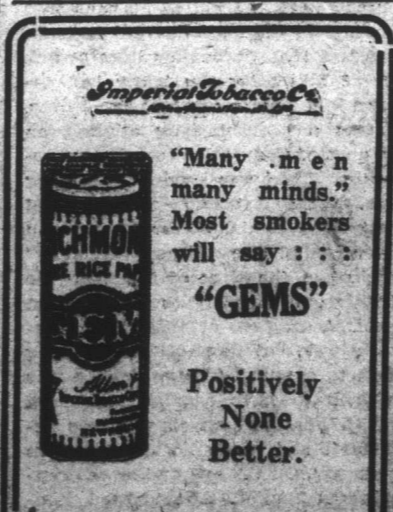

The Fish Market in Nova Scotia.

(From The Maritime Merchant.)

DRIED FISH.

It is now impossible to fairly well estimate the available supplies of dry fish. The total catches are fully up to the average of pre-war figures. This includes all fish producing countries, with the exception of Norway, where the catch was somewhat under the average. The Lunenburg catch has been the largest in the history of the trade, totalling 300,000 quintals--about 35,000 quintals over 1921. The Nova Scotia Shore catch, as dried for export, has been very disappointing--probably the smallest on record. This catch, however, in recent years is a small factor, as the bulk of the Codfish caught on our shores for some ten years has been pickle-cured and sold in a green state to the United States.

There has been much confusion in connection with the prices paid for dry fish. The Lunenburg heavy salted Bank Codfish, usually considered inferior to Newfoundland cure, have up to the present sold at prices ruling \$1.50 per qt. above St. John's. Nfld. prices on shore cure, and owing to the fact that there has been a good demand in markets requiring the heavy salted article, and also owing to bad weather conditions preventing any large supplies being put on the market at one time, exporters have been able to market practically all of the 120,000 quintals, representing the catch of the Lunenburg fleet, with a fair margin of profit. There is now left in exporters' hands about 20,000 quintals of the catches just referred to, and in the hands of the Lunenburg fish makers the entire summer catch of about 180,000 quintals. In the face of lower prices in Newfoundland, and the fact that conditions in the consuming countries of Europe and South America have gone from bad to worse, it would appear that the price of Lunenburg cure would have to materially decline. The market opened at \$8.00 delivered Lunenburg and last reported sales were at \$7.65, whereas Newfoundland bank fish is now being offered delivered Halifax at \$8.50 per qt. It is thought that the price of Lunenburg cure will have to come down to this figure, if not to \$6.00.

The Gaspe Coast catch of codfish will be a good average, estimated at 100,000 quintals, a considerable proportion of which has been marketed in Naples with a good profit. The price to the fishermen on the Gaspe Coast for good quality has been \$7.00 per qt., or 50c. to \$1.00 per qt. over Newfoundland prices. The buying price on the Gaspe Coast has recently been reduced \$1.00 per qt.

Newfoundland has had a good average catch, but the quality is much under the average owing mostly to bad weather conditions. Owing to adverse exchange and the poverty of the people in the consuming markets of Europe and South America, the outlook for Newfoundland's dried fish is decidedly discouraging. Greece, which usually takes 100,000 to 150,000 qts., is not likely to take anything. In Portugal conditions are extremely adverse. There is a big demand for Codfish, but the ruinous rate of exchange makes the business almost impossible. As a result many Oporto cargoes are being offered on the Halifax market. The very low exchange in Brazil prevents any profitable business in that country. In view of the bad outlook, prices in Newfoundland have recently fallen 50c per qt., or from \$8.00 and \$6.50 to \$5.50 and \$6.00 paid to the fishermen in the outports, with the same reduction in St. John's. Nfld. It is considered that Nova Scotia exporters are in a better position than Newfoundland, as it is thought that there will be a continued good demand in the West India markets for Lunenburg cure, as well as for large and medium Shore quality. It must be admitted that the rather encouraging outlook of last spring for a normal dry fish export trade, has quite disappeared. Very little improvement can be looked for until the extremely adverse exchanges in Portugal, Italy, Spain and South America considerably improve.

PICKLED FISH.

Never in the history of the trade has there been such a stagnation in the marketing of pickled fish as during this season. Notwithstanding extremely low prices, the West India demand is very limited. Herring are selling below the cost of production. The West Indies are being supplied with Newfoundland cure. Owing to the low value very few Herring are being packed in N.S. Prices are also low in Spring Mackerel. It would appear that consumers are giving up the use of pickled fish. This notwithstanding an improvement in packages and quality.

NEW AMERICAN TARIFF.

The new U.S. tariff imposed 1 1/2c. per lb. on dry and pickled fish not in barrels, and \$3.00 per bbl. on Mackerel, Herring, etc. It is considered that the American consumer will pay practically all of this with the exception of the duty on pickle-cured Codfish as used for the boneless fish trade, which must result in part, at least, of the duty being paid by the producer.

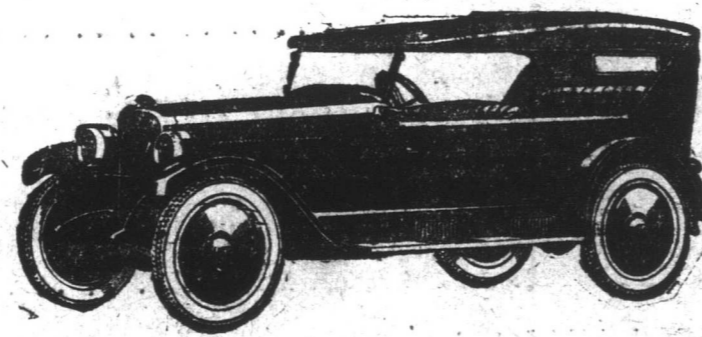
