





These say:-"As a result of a recent visit to the boundary of Northern Ireland and the Free State, and of confer-

ences with representatives of differ-ent shades of political opinion, we are nanimously agreed that:-"(1) Feeling in Ireland as a whole except among a few extremists, is strongly in favour of a settlement. "(2). That a satisfactory settlemen can best be arrived at by direct mutual agreement between the parties in

Ireland. "(3) If the negotiations are to have the best chances of success they should be entered into before any Boundary Commission is set up by the Government of Great Britain. 





### Things Good to Eat

Rhubarb Marmalade.

Four pounds rhubarb, one cup cold water, six pounds sugar (granulated), four lemons, juice and rind, one pound walnuts, broken in small Fine black lace is used for the yoke pieces. Wash, peel and cut the and skirt flounce of an evening gown rhubarb in inch lengths, add water, and cook till tender. Take the rind of the lemons, put through chopper, and cook them separately until soft. Then add the rind to the rhubarb, add sugar, lemon juice and walnuts, and cook all together for ten minutes, then bottle and seal.

### Apricot Custard.

Half pound flour, half teaspoonful salt, one-quarter pound of lard or margarine, or half of each; cold water, apricot jam, one cup of milk, (large), two eggs, sugar to taste, flavouring. Place flour, salt, and fat in a howl: cut, flake and crumble in the fat; make into a stiff paste; roll out and line a shallow dish. Lightly decorate the edges; put a layer of jam on the bottom of the pastry; beat the erg up well, add the milk sugar and flavouring, giving a final mix. Pour into the dish. Bake in a fairly hot oven. Before serving, place a paper collar round the dish.

## Cheese Fondu.

One cup of scalded milk, one cup bread crumbs, quarter of a pound of grated cheese, one tablespoon of butter, half a teaspoon of milk, yolks of three eggs, beaten. Mix crumbs. cheese, butter and salt together and add egg yolks. Beat the whites and fold into the mixture. Bake in moderate oven twenty minutes. Dish may be put into pan of water, but a longer time will be required for baking.

## French Government

BRINGS DOWN THE COST OF LIVING.

The French government at a special cabinet meeting held on September 19 for the purpose of studying the high cost of living problem decided to make the following reductions in the existing import tariff for foodstuffs:-Pork, ham, sausages and other pork products, cheese, barley and rice and preserved vegetables, 50 per cent.; butter, 50 per cent.; condensed milk, 66 per cent.

The Ministers of the Interior, Agriculture and Commerce, according to advices received by the Bankers Trust Company from its Foreign Information Service were also asked to ly drawn up by the Retailers' Federation and other representatives of the food trades, which embodies many important suggestions for combating the cost of living such as the encouragement of co-operative societies which would enable small traders to buy at lower rates, the reduction of ia: Iway rates for the transportation of necessities and the complete suspension of customs duties on same. The Retailers' Federation also advocate a suspension of the eight hour law in food trades so as to stimulate production.
