Town and County News

BUSINESS on the market was brisk this morning. SLEIGHING is now pretty good, and our streets are made lively by the arrival and departure of the linking teams.

THE Vescelius sisters give their concert to-night. We hope these popular and excellent vocalists will have a good house.

THE funeral of the late Mr. Coyne, M. P., last week was the largest ever known in the County of Peel, there being, it was estimated, nearly one thousand persons present.

THE Young Ladies' Journal has reached us from John Anderson. Its supplement teems with fashions, patterns and designs to employ busy feminine eyes and fingers, and contains also a large fashion plate.

THE Union printers of Pittsburgh are on a strike. The telegraph cable steamer Robert Lowe has been wrecked.

Navigation on the New York State canal is effectually closed by snow and ice. It is understood that Capt. Curtis continues with the new Lieut.-Governor of Ontario as aide-de-camp.

Sleighs are now crossing the Ottawa River. This is the earliest season ever known, and looks like a long winter.

Alfred Blondin, aged 19, laborer, was almost instantly killed in Montreal on Saturday by a brick which fell from a chimney in course of erection.

A young man named S. J. Brady, aged 26 years, poisoned himself at his residence on Ontario street, Montreal, on Saturday evening. He was in low spirits, and was afflicted with constitutional disease.

A contemporary says that the faith of those antiquated Tories who believe the grass will not grow, nor the crops ripen, unless John A. Macdonald is permitted to save the country by a Pacific Scandal now and then, is tottering in the extreme.

On Thursday about noon, a serious collision occurred on the railway a short distance from Southampton, between two engines belonging to the gravel train. Through some carelessness or want of forethought on the part of those on the engines the larger one was allowed to overtake and run into the other, and the result was a general smash-up.

Several persons were severely injured. One man named McNeil, of Paisley, had a number of his ribs broken, and another received a fearful gash on the head. The engines are wrecked almost beyond recovery.

Local and Other Items

PROHIBITION.—On Monday the by-law was voted on in the village of Georgetown to suppress licences for the sale of liquors in stores and shops.

SMALL-POX has made its appearance in the township of Amaranth, having been introduced there by Mr. James Rentoul, of lot 21, concession 4, who caught the infection while on a visit to Toronto.

SMALL-POX IN TORONTO.—Almost daily new cases of small-pox are reported, and notwithstanding the efforts of medical men to keep the matter quiet, not a few are suffering from its effects.

THE Halifax correspondent of the Globe says:—The Opposition are trying to induce Hon. Charles J. Campbell, member of the Legislative Council, to oppose Ross in Victoria.

WELCOME to the New General Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. On Monday evening, after the work of the regular business meeting had been gone through, the members present of the Y. M. C. A. adjourned to Mr. Waldron's, where an Oyster Supper was spread in good style.

MR. FERGUSON'S CLAIM. The letter of Messrs. Hodgins & Black was referred to the chairman. The Board then adjourned.

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School Board.

The usual meeting of the School Board was held on Monday night. Mr. Knowles occupied the chair, and there were also present Messrs. Kennedy, Harvey, MacKenzie, Raymond, Stevenson, Bell, and Dr. McGuire.

A letter was read from A. Simpson, caretaker, resigning his situation, the resignation to take place forthwith.

Also from Messrs. Hodgins & Black, solicitors, in reference to the claim of Mr. Ferguson Black for payment of salary for the summer vacation, pointing out that this salary was due under Con. Stat. U. C. Sec. 119, and under the regulations of the Council of Public Instruction.

On motion of Mr. Stevenson, seconded by Mr. Kennedy, the resignation of the caretaker was accepted, and the chairman of the School Property Committee was empowered to employ a person to take care of the schools. A caretaker is to be advertised for immediately.

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BY TELEGRAPH.

Plot Failed Completely. The Virginias and the Trent. Two More Vessels Seized. Railway Work Stopped. Accident at Birmingham.

London, Nov. 24, p.m.—Erie, 857. The rate of discount in the open market for three months bills is 5 1/2 per cent., or 2 1/2 per cent. below the Bank of England rate. The general impression on the Stock Exchange is that the bank rate will be lowered on Thursday next, or perhaps before that day. Consols for money, 92 1/2 to 93; for account, 93 to 94 1/2.

A special despatch to the Times reports that the plot for the surrender of Cartagena proved a complete failure. Contreras has since been arrested by the insurgents on suspicion of connivance with the conspirators.

A railroad accident is reported at Birmingham, and many persons injured. No details have been received.

Berlin, Nov. 24.—Two additional ironclads are to be sent to the German fleet in Spanish waters.

London, Nov. 24.—The Times today says that a demand for the surrender of the Virginias could not with justice be maintained, but the other demands reported to have been made on Spain by the United States are such that England might well join in.

London, Nov. 25 a.m.—The Daily Telegraph compares the Virginias with the Trent affair, although it fears that the rumored ultimatum of the American Government would be fatal to peace; still it thinks that President Castelar, in view of any international trouble with Spain, could honorably follow the examples of Presidents Lincoln and Grant in the demands of the United States.

San Francisco, Nov. 24.—The steamer Great Republic brings the following intelligence from China:—Steamer Zeipka brought to Hong Kong news of the seizure of the German vessels Maria Louise and Gazelle by a Spanish man-of-war off Soe Loo. The vessels were brought to Manila, when the crew of the Gazelle were liberated. The captain and the super-cargo of the Maria Louise managed to escape, and the Spaniards declare that they will be treated as spies if caught outside of their respective consulates. The super-cargo claims the protection of the British Consul and the captain that of Germany. The latter states that the vessels were 18 miles off Soe Loo when captured, and that according to law the blockade extends only 9 miles, and further that the Spanish authorities had not declared any blockade.

New York, Nov. 25.—All work on the New York, Boston & Montreal Railroad has ceased, in consequence of contractors being unable to get money to pay the men. Several hundred are thrown out of employment.

Melancholy Accident on the Eramosa Road. A Man Killed in a Gravel Pit.

A melancholy accident, which was attended with fatal results, occurred on Monday afternoon at the gravel pit on the Eramosa Road, near the Race Course Farm. It appears that a poor labouring man named John Irvine was employed in the gravel pit filling the waggons, which were employed in gravelling a part of the road. They had undermined the bank for some little distance, and thinking the mass of earth and stone overhead was sufficiently frozen and solid, did not fear any untoward result. They were mistaken however, for shortly after dinner the bank above caved in, burying the poor man Irvine in the mass of stuff that fell. Mr. Powell, who was getting out the gravel, immediately after the accident, ran to Mr. West's place close by and Mr. West and he returned to the pit and succeeded in getting the earth off the body. The unfortunate man must have been killed almost instantly, for he never spoke, but groaned once or twice. When extricated from the debris he was found to be terribly bruised and crushed, his entrails protruding through the lower portion of the body. The body was conveyed to deceased's house, near Mathew's Tavern, Eramosa Road, and Dr. Herod was sent for, but on viewing the body and hearing the facts relating to the accident, he did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest, the cause of death being so palpable and apparent. Irvine is a married man, and leaves a widow and five children to mourn his untimely end, and the loss of the head of the house, who was the only one they have to look to for support. Their case is a very sad one, and appeals to the sympathies of the benevolent.

Unsuccessful Thieves. On Monday Charles Campbell and Charles Phillips were up before the Hamilton Police Magistrate charged with assaulting and robbing George White, on Saturday night about eleven o'clock. He was knocked down by the prisoners, who tore open his pants and rifled his pocket of 85 cents. In the other pocket he had \$74, but this they did not succeed in getting, as he struggled desperately. They made violent attempts to get a diamond ring from his finger, having and grasping his hand in a fearful manner. The prisoners were committed for trial; bail refused.

The first reception by the Lieut.-Governor and Mrs. Crawford took place on Monday afternoon at three o'clock. The attendance was large.

Advices from Lennox indicate a majority for Mr. Cartwright as great, if not greater, than what he had at last election.

Mr. O'Reilly, M. P. for Renfrew, has announced his intention of giving the new Government a free, manly support.

The Tory papers state that there are now 700 signatures to the petition against Mr. Glass, and that the recent meeting which got up the memorial comprised thirty persons. The *Globe's* London correspondent says the memorial lists numbered sixteen only.

The new Tory Association just established in London does not appear to be a very successful institution. The *London Advertiser* says:—

"Most noticeable is the absence from the reports of the two meetings of the names of many leading Tories who worked with Sir John A. Macdonald up to the time of the Pacific Scandal developments. Making the perpetrator of the Pacific Scandal the chief corner-stone of the organization, instead of repudiating both the crime and the criminal, the organizers are driving honest and intelligent Conservatives from the ranks. Having re-drawn party lines and re-boasted the tarnished flag of Toryism, the old Hinckley and Baldwin elements refuse to march under any such banner. Toryism will not save itself by adopting a *nom de plume* so contradictory as 'Liberal Conservative.' It is a compliment to Liberal principles that the Tories should be compelled to rig themselves partially out in the clothes of their opponents, their own having become soiled and shabby. We are reminded of the famous saying, anent the English Reform Bill, the Tories caught the Liberals bathing and stole their clothes."

Is there any Danger of a Revulsion in Canada?

The *Monetary Times*, one of those papers which "ought to know," has the following:—

"The panic in New York has set many persons thinking whether matters in Canada are in a sound position, and whether there is any danger of commercial disasters here. There cannot be a more practical subject to think about, and to assist them we propose to notice a few points which bear directly upon it."

"1. Panics and revulsions invariably follow an abuse of credit; widespread credit transactions, inflated credit business, inflated style of living, extravagant expenditure, extravagant speculation, enormous borrowing, are all necessary beforehand."

"2. In Canada we have had our transactions on a gold basis. We have at present no heavy railway expenditure going on; no unusually heavy credit transactions; no heavy borrowing operations; no extraordinary expenditure, nor more than ordinary speculation. We have had trading by individuals and more than enough of it, now as at all times: had borrowing now as in former years, and there are traders now as at all other times that are doing business on far too slender a basis of capital. But there are not many more of these than ordinary. We have no great mania afloat. People are not crazy with any notion of getting up companies, or working mines, or felling forests. In the last it is true, there has been a remarkable activity, followed by a remarkable dullness. But it is a natural reaction, nothing more. Even in the lumber trade there have been few failures affecting Canada, and the trade now is no worse than it has been before, when nobody dreamed of revulsion or anything worse than losing profits."

"3. The country, as a whole, is curtailing expenditures and increasing income. We have been favored by Providence with a good harvest; all our farm products are realizing very good prices. Barley, our poorest crop, is actually bringing us more money than the fair crop of last year, owing to enhanced prices. We have shipped 600,000 bushels less to Oswego alone, and have received \$400,000 more for it. Wheat is a very fair price, so are butter, cheese, wool, and peas, and we have very large quantities of them all. On the other hand, we are buying less; consequently we must be owing less, and reducing the debt we owe abroad. These are not the precursors of a revulsion, but the reverse. If the harvest had been bad, as was feared, doubtless we should have had severe troubles to individuals this winter. But even then, our traders were generally forewarned, were curtailing business, and we should have probably gone through without any national calamity. But, as it is, we believe the country is sound on the whole, though there are plenty of unsound people in it; and there is no reason why we should not continue sound, if we are economical, reasonable, and prudent in our modes of doing business."
