**On Saturday morning last,** there were no less than eighty-seven cases up for trial in the Toronto police court. This is the largest docket on record there.

**In various parts of China** twenty-two different societies have established more than 300 mission stations and out stations, and the number of church members is variously estimated at 6,000 to 10,000.

**Miss Hope Scott,** the great granddaughter of Sir Walter Scott, and the present mistress of Abbotford, is soon to be married to the Hon. Joseph Maxwell.

**ONE of the Swiss cantons,** it is said, compels every newly married couple to plant six trees immediately after the ceremony, and two on the birth of every child.

**It is stated that the Bishop of Orleans** has appointed an ecclesiastical commission for the purpose of taking preliminary steps toward the canonization of Joan of Arc.

**His name is Thomas M. Russell.** He has had five women and one boy arrested for picking huckleberries off a lot that was not worth enough to fence in. He lives in the township of Richmond.

**A short route has been found** between China and Australia, a survey having been made of the hitherto unknown northern eastern shores of New Guinea, by the British steamship *Danilek*.

**On Monday, 10th inst.,** a man named Jacob Linsmeyer, in the employ of Messrs. Armstrong and Corbet, had his hip dislocated by his horses running away, the wagon passing over him.

**Mr. James Barbour, of Beverly,** received serious injuries by being thrown from his horse a few days ago.

**RUTHERFORD, President** of the Consumers Gas Co. Toronto, who has been charged with embezzlement of the Company's funds, has returned \$5850 to the Company.

**Mr. Frank Black, of Galt,** was assaulted by a gang of ruffians while walking on the street on Friday evening last. The lusty shouts of his wife, who accompanied him, brought timely aid, whereupon the ruffians fled.

**A Glencoe telegraph operator** recently sent across the wires to the associated press a message, derogatory to the local schoolmaster, and to the accusation pleaded guilty, but afterwards declared his innocence, and vowed he would do it again. Then there was a row, in which the operator scolded a hatlet, but didn't do any harm. In the local court, the case was dismissed, but on a second trial in London the teacher was fined \$2 and costs.

**The Roman Catholic Bishop of Nottingham, England,** reproved a priest the other day for walking with a woman on his arm and her hand in his. The priest asked the Bishop to whom he was talking. "I am the Bishop of Nottingham," said his Lordship. "But we have no such Bishop in the English Church," replied the priest. "Oh!" exclaimed the Bishop, "then you belong to the English Church. I am delighted to hear it, and I beg your pardon with all my heart; but I do wish you would not walk about in our uniform."

### St. Andrew's Church Soiree.

St. Andrew's Church congregation held a soiree on Tuesday evening, to celebrate the completion of the handsome new School House in connection with the Church. Although this is scarcely a season of the year for soirees or tea drinking, yet the interest felt in the town, has brought from Mr. David Matheson, of Erin Township, a three-year old steer, paying the excellent price of \$100.

An excellent tea and refreshments were provided in the large and commodious school-room, and though the tables were repeatedly filled, yet the ladies were equal to the emergency, and had them loaded with all good things as fast as they were emptied. The company as they left the refreshment-room adjourned to the church, and about eight o'clock Mr. Charles Davidson, Chairman of the Building Committee, was called to the chair. After expressing his pleasure at seeing so many present on such an auspicious occasion, and extending a hearty welcome to those belonging to other churches, he referred to the greatly improved appearance of the church, to the increased accommodation, and to the marked improvement in its acoustic properties. He spoke of the need for a school-room separate from the church, and referred to the steps taken in the spring of 1873 to carry out the wishes of the congregation in this respect, and the realization of their efforts in at last having the building completed and opened for use.

In the absence of Mr. Massie, the Superintendent of the Sabbath School, he gave some statistics showing its progress in 1873. The number in the present respected pastor, Dr. Hogg, came to Guelph, there was only an attendance of 34 scholars and 6 teachers. The numbers have kept steadily increasing with the increase and prosperity of the church, and now there are 174 on the roll, and 4 teachers. In regard to the funds for the new building, he stated that none of those derivable from seat-rents, collections, &c. are applied to this object (with the exception of the collection on the last two Sabbaths). The total cost of the work, including cost of furnace &c. is \$7,474.44. Provision has been made for the payment of this, with the exception of \$1,282.27, which the chairman expects will also be cleared off as soon as the balance of the Glebe land is disposed of, thus placing the final affairs of the church in a most flourishing condition. The furnishing of the vestry was done with the proceeds of a social, and the carpeting of the aisles of the school, Bible class room, and children's gallery, have been paid for by the funds realized from the penny boxes in the Sabbath School. The seating of the school-house only requires to be paid, and the collection taken up on Sunday and the proceeds of the soiree will go far to pay for this.

Excellent and appropriate speeches were made during the evening by Rev. Messrs. Macdonnell, Mullin, Torrance, Ball, Wardrop and Howard, and at the close votes of thanks were passed to the speakers and ladies. The pleasures of the evening were greatly enhanced by the efficient services of the choir, led by Mr. Hugh Walker, Miss Gossitt playing the accompaniments. The soiree was altogether a great success, and the St. Andrew's congregation have to be congratulated on their spirit and liberality in connection with church improvements.

### Local and Other Items.

The atmosphere of London indicates the possibility that Major Walker may be unseated as the representative of that city, in the coming trial before the Judges. Should that occur, it will not be on the ground of personal bribery, and he will enter the contest again. Mr. Meredith is spoken of to oppose him, and the Reformers are confident of their ability to elect Walker by 300 majority.

Mr. SULLIVAN, the editor of the *Nation*, Dublin, intends to pay a visit to America during the approaching autumn on private business, and it is not improbable that his voice may be heard in the prominent cities of the Union, rousing the Irish population to action in favor of home rule. The probabilities are also in favor of Mr. Butt coming to this country after parliament has adjourned, for the purpose of addressing the Irish here on the right of Ireland to self-government. Mr. Butt is regarded as the ablest orator that has appeared in Ireland since the days of O'Connell.

A SECOND CROP OF POTATOES.—It is said that what has been done can be done again. One of our gardeners dug his first crop of Early Rose potatoes all up by July 17, three or four years ago, and planted the same land again with old Irish seed that had lain in his cellar. He put one eye in each hill, and when harvested, to the surprise of all, many of the potatoes weighed one pound each. Perhaps some of your readers would like to try the experiment.—C. Spratt, Utica.

Mr. JAMES LEE, Milwaukee, has secured from Congress an appropriation of \$174,000 for the manufacture of guns, on his model, for experiment in the field. The gun is so extraordinary in simplicity in construction, having only 14 pieces in its make up. These few pieces are so novel in arrangement that 17 patentable claims are made upon them. There is only one 174 on the roll, and 4 teachers. The highest number reached by any gun submitted to the small-arms board.

ONTARIO TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.—The annual session of this Association opened in Toronto on Tuesday afternoon, in the Normal School Buildings. After some preliminary business, the meeting adjourned, and met again at 7.30 p.m. in the theatre of the building. An immense throng of teachers and friends were present. Mr. J. B. Dixon, Vice-President, occupied the chair, and introduced Prof. Goldwin Smith, the President, who delivered a lengthy and able address. At its close, a vote of thanks was passed to the Professor, after which the meeting adjourned till 2 p.m. on Wednesday.

ATTEMPT TO BREAK GAOL.—A desperate effort was made on Saturday morning last by a number of the prisoners of Sandwich Gaol to make their escape. A conspiracy was formed by them to attack the Governor, Mr. Leech, led by Omand, who severely attacked him when an opportunity presented itself, and stabbed him in several places with a pair of scissors. The Governor's head was badly cut with pieces of crockery. The noise caused by the attack brought the turnkey to his assistance, who also received several wounds. None of the prisoners got away. Mr. Leech now lies in a critical condition.

Goderich Correspondence.

On Wednesday last we had a most enthusiastic public meeting called by the Mayor to consider the manner in which the Town should receive and entertain His Excellency the Governor-General on his contemplated visit. Various modes were suggested by the idea of a public reception and a ball in the evening was the favor one, and a vote being taken, it was decided to ask \$750 from the Town Council in order to carry out the programme. A large committee of our most active and influential men was appointed to carry out the measures proposed to the satisfaction and suite will take up their residence at the princely mansion of M. C. Cameron, Esq., M.P., at the same time being the guests of the Town. A letter was received by the Mayor, yesterday, from His Excellency's Secretary, stating that he would arrive in Goderich on the 29th inst. As a natural consequence our town is in a little flutter. The town fathers met on Friday last, and with their usual spirit of contradiction voted \$300 instead of \$750 as asked for by the popular vote of the ratepayers. This has caused a most important meeting of the Committee, and the Council is to be held to-night to reconsider the question, with what result will tell.

On Saturday, an unfortunate drunkard, Niel Armour, was taken, to the gaol where he died on Sabbath evening, just signing his postscript to the Committee, and the jury returned a verdict of death from prostration produced by excessive drinking. Deceased was 39 years of age and a widower.

#### Why Beecher Doesn't Speak.

Paris, Aug. 11.—There is great excitement in this city in consequence of the receipt of intelligence that Marshal Bazaine escaped from the Island of Sainte Marguerite some time during Sunday night. Nothing is known except that he used a rope ladder and got on board a vessel bound for Italy. The night was dark and stormy.

Paris, Aug. 11th.—It is reported that Bazaine landed at San Kerno and travelled via Turin to Basle. At the latter place he took the train to Brussels, where he arrived at 7 o'clock on Tuesday morning. It is believed here that the rope found on the cliff at Isle of St. Marguerite was suspended there to mislead the authorities as to the manner of the Marshal's escape, which was effected in some other way through the connivance of the guards. *Le Lois* states that Bazaine had given his parole not to leave the Island. Precautions were consequently relaxed. The sentry was withdrawn from the Terrace every morning at five, it being considered unnecessary to keep him there after daylight. Two soldiers belonging to thearrison of the fort swear they saw the Marshal on the terrace at 5.30 on Monday morning.

London, Aug. 12th.—The Times denies the report that Marshal Seiras had given notice of intended blockade of the Cantabrian coast.

London, August 11th.—The second exhibition game of base ball between the Red Stockings and Athletics was played this afternoon at the Crystal Palace grounds in the presence of a large crowd. The play of the Athletics was very fine, excelling the Boston boys in batting and in fielding. Score 19 to 8 in favor of Paris.

Paris, August 11th.—Eighty persons, formerly connected with the Commune, have been arrested in Marseilles. Among them are M. Esquiros, Ex-Prefect of Department.

Rome, August 11th.—The Prefect of Florence has issued a decree dissolving thirty-five Republican and International societies.

Philadelphia, Pa., August 11th.—J. W. Lewis, uncle of Charles Ross, telegraphs from Demington that the boy detained there is not his nephew.

London, August 12th.—The Morning Post announces that the negotiations between powers for the recognition of Spain have been completed. The consent of Great Britain has removed the last obstacle.

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 11th.—A special from Helena says that in the fight at Austin last night 8 or 10 negroes were killed. Reinforcements are coming in to the whites from the hills, and the negroes are being reinforced from surrounding country.

New York, Aug. 11th.—Moulton was briefly cross-examined last night, and he maintains the same position. He reiterates that if any attempt were made to assail his position as a friend of both parties, or to question his honour, he might be under the necessity of making a further statement.

New York, Aug. 12th.—It is conceded that Moulton's statement contained nothing new, and was merely a production of copies of letters quoted in Tilton's statement. They are not to be published till Beecher has made his explanation, which it is now said will be done this evening. Moulton says he shall make no further statement to the Committee, and any additional information he may have touching the scandal will only be drawn from him by legal process.

Rumors are rife that efforts are again being made to suppress any further publicity of the affair based on Beecher's own statement to the Committee, and any additional information he may have touching the scandal will only be drawn from him by legal process.

Mr. Shearman, one of Beecher's counsel, claims to know all the facts of Moulton's possession, and says there is nothing in them or in existence implicating Beecher one iota, and if Beecher's motives in keeping silent were known it would be seen that he was entirely blameless. Beecher had held his tongue thus far out of respect to the feelings of others; if he opened his mouth there are distinguished citizens, who have been mixed up in the matter, who would suffer, and by his silence he has spared their feelings. Shearman says that Woodhull and those acting with her have made a blackmailing business of their lives, and have ensnared well-known men and women; and that they picked at Beecher because he was a shining light. While he can make this whole matter clear as noon day, yet if he does, some persons will suffer whom he has spared for a long time at the cost of his own peace of mind, and at the expense of the dastardly attacks upon him.

Mr. Moore and His Tory Accusers.

Mr. Jacobs and his Tory friends woke up the wrong man when they meddled with Mr. George Moore, of Arthur. Backed by the Herald, they attempted to make out a strong case against him, and charged him with using his position for political purposes. In a letter which we publish to-day, he has completely turned the tables on them. The vindication of his course is as complete as any unprejudiced person would desire, and in the instances which he gives, in which attempts were made by the Tories to manufacture votes, he acted as every honest elector would do, in exposing and checkmating political rascality. He also lets us into a little secret, and exposes a despicable trick which the proprietor of the Herald tried to perpetrate, in manufacturing two votes in the Township of Luther for his Tory besom friends Messrs. Heffernan, of this town. Mr. Moore saw through the dodge, however, blocked Mr. Chadwick's little game in time, so that to use Mr. Moore's quaint but expressive language "the brothers had no inheritance in the land of promise."

After letting the light into such nefarious transactions, no one need wonder why the Tories hate Mr. Moore so cordially. As he says himself, he is a terror to these evil doers, and we only wish we had men like him in every township of this County, who would in spite of threats and intimidation do their duty as citizens, and see that right and justice is done at our Revision Courts. Had Mr. Moore winked at all these disgraceful transactions, he would have been a fine fellow; but as he is fearless, honest and determined to see fair play, he is abused, called all sorts of bad names, and attempts are made to deprive him of his office by those whose designs he frustrates.

We hope that Mr. Moore will continue to do as good service for the public in the future as he has done in the past. We have his word for it that he does not in any way allow his official position to interfere with his duty as an elector, and so long as he pursues the same course he may continue to expose wrong doing fearless of the consequences, and upheld by the conviction that he has the approbation of all right thinking men.

THE BRICK IN THE HERALD'S HAT.—The Herald flies into a furious passion because we published its insult to the Governor as a specimen brick of Tory loyalty, and in three columns of dreary verbiage, plentifully spiced with quotations, endeavors in vain to fasten the same charge on the Reformers and Reform press, because they exercised their undoubted rights to question the course and policy of His Excellency last year in the matter of proroguing the House. These extracts only serve the more to strengthen the position we assumed, that while freely commenting on his course above referred to, those who differed from him bated no jot of respect for Her Majesty's representative. The Herald's professions of respect for him come a little too late, however, for how it can reconcile these and the epithet of "bloated aristocrat" it applied to him is more than we can tell. Its clumsy amende only excites the more disgust because it is neither honest nor spontaneous.

The Monetary Times, in an article approving of the action taken by the Lumbermen's Association at Ottawa, recently, says that the main cause of the anomalous state of the lumber market now prevailing, has been over production, and continues:—We have only to mention that our exports in 1873 ran up to the value of \$28,586,816—within \$1,000,000 of our total exports of products of our farms—to prove the correctness of this statement. For years there has been a steady expansion, the amount in 1873 over 1872 being within a trifle of \$5,000,000.

The Luther Court of Revision.

MR. MOORE'S VINDICATION. To the Editor of the Mercury. DEAR SIR,—Allow me space in your valuable paper to reply to a few false charges made against me in your contemporary, the Guelph Herald, in which I am accused of divulging secrets at the Court of Revision at Luther, obtained through my official capacity as Bailiff. The two cases referred to are, 1st, That of Mr. John Jackson, whose property some time since was seized by the Sheriff, publicly sold, bought in by Mr. Thomas A. Corbett, Ferris, who subsequently sold said property to Jonathan Jackson, son of John Jackson. The year following I seized a hay stack on said lot 12, on the 4th con., on execution against J. Jackson, son. The hay was interpleaded on, the case coming on before his Honor Judge Macdonald, when the son of Jonathan swore, and proved, that the property, both land and chattels belonged to himself, and Mr. Jackson, son, was in assessed for the lot till this year. There happened to be a lot belonging to Mr. Steiner, of Toronto, which Jackson neither rented, occupied nor owned, but for which he was assessed to enable him to give a bogus vote for Mr. Drew. Mr. Steiner having sold the lot last winter to Mr. McCarthy, Mr. Jackson had no reason but to have his name enrolled with that of his son Jonathan, who had sworn publicly that the property belonged solely to himself.

The other case is that of Mr. John Church, who swore in open court that he had no more property than the law allowed; and these being the only two cases connected with my office, I consider it my duty to explain the above matter, and leave it for the public to judge whether the accusation was not a wilful fabrication.

Mr. Jacobs also contends that I was not justified in interfering with the Revision Court, when I consider as a ratepayer I had a just right, and which pri-

vilage I intend to exercise in spite of every Tory in Canada.

I must ask you, Mr. Editor, if the assessment roll was right, why (at the Court of Revision at Luther) were the ten voters' names struck off the roll and three Reformers (whose assessments were too low) inserted on the roll? Out of the fourteen struck off the roll were two Mr. Heffernans, of Guelph, Thomas and Joseph, as it was proved the lots for which they were assessed belonged, one to Mr. Donaldson, of Garafaxa, and the other to Mr. Sam. Stuckey, of Luther, so that the above brothers had no inheritance in the land of promise. Mr. Richard Cole received a letter over the signature of E. J. Chadwick, Guelph, to have the above names, Thos. and Jos. Heffernan, put on the roll for the above lots. Now, Mr. Editor, I ask you who was the most notorious scoundrel—that man who would dare to have names inserted illegally to obtain bogus votes, or that man who would publicly appear at a Court of Revision to see that every wrong should be made right?

With regard to the hatred of the Tories of Arthur, which the Herald speaks of, I am only too proud to be the terror of evil doers; and to gain the love of such creatures I would not cross my threshold. That man who has no enemies is an idiot, and all the threats that can be waged against me would not intimidate me from prosecuting the investigation and revision with more zeal and vigor.

Mr. Jacobs also accuses me of using undue influence during the late elections, by holding executions over defendants' heads till after the elections, which charge I utterly deny; and I must further state that I defy any man to come forward and accuse me of divulging the business of my office during the eleven years that I have held the office of Bailiff, (ten of which under His Honor Judge Macdonald without incurring one word of censure.)

The Herald speaks of Mr. Jacobs' praiseworthy conduct in this matter, and if report speaks truly, his friends will be able to thank him personally on Wednesday next at the Court House, Guelph, where he is summoned to appear before His Honor Judge Macdonald to give an account of his deeds, whether they be good or evil; and his non-appearance on that day might enable his friends in Guelph to claim him for a time as a citizen.

With regard to a scurrilous fabrication of the Herald, (remember no report,) as to my being acquainted with the resorts of certain poachers on the Surrey Hills, I beg to state I was never near that county, nor acquainted with any person from that locality. My native place was North Suffolk, where my father for forty-five years rented land under Sir Edward Kerrison; I learned a trade and lived for ten years with a gentleman at Framlingham, and subsequently married and rented a farm of Lord Huntingfield, where I remained until I came to Canada sixteen years ago.

I wish Mr. Jacobs to bring on his charges for my political crimes, and I wish further to know what statute I am to be tried under.
