THE C. P. R. AS A GREAT NATIONAL WORK. The Globe says that by letting in foreign

capitalists and putting the stock of the Canada Pacific railway upon the New York market the character of the concern as a great national undertaking has been destroyed. After this the possession of the stock by Canadians cannot be guaranteed for a day. As soon as the stock is made the sport of the bulls and bears of Wall street, all surety of Canadian control is gone ; and the railway ceases to be the national line which was promised to the country by Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper.

Now, we do not believe this to be the real truth of the matter, even should Vanderbilt or some other American' railway king obtain a large share of control over the Canada Pacific railway. We rather think that the peculiar relations of the company towards the Canadian government will yet be found, should a pinch come, to interfere very naterially with any project of foreign control whatever. It may be that the powers reserved to the government in the charter, as well as those which it holds over all railways in the dominion by common law and British usage from time immemorial are quite sufficient, if firmly, exercised, to defeat any such attempt as that indicated. Further, the Canada Pacific railway actually is a national work, in a sense and in a measure going beyond what we can apply to any other road owned by any company. That the road is to be built and maintained and run as a national undertaking is of the very essence of the contract. At a time when the government was engaged in building the road, it was decided to hand over the whole concern, on conditions, to a company. For what purpose, let it be asked ? We answer, in order that the company should do what the government of the country and the public generally believed it could not do with convenience and without an objectionable mingling of party politics with the business of building and running sary in New York and other cities.
