

ICEBOATS BEFORE A BREEZE.

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THE LEGAL CRISIS.

Garbutt's Extradition Case—Mr. Ingram Abandons His Appeal—A Batch of West and Ontario Cases.

The private prosecutors who are pressing for the extradition of Henry Garbutt, the alleged forger from Wingham, who is wanted in Van Alstyne, Texas, U.S.A., tried to accelerate the extradition machinery of the Court of Appeal by bringing forward a motion to speed the hearing of the prisoner's appeal. Mr. Garbutt, who appeared for the City Bank of Van Alstyne, pointed out that the prisoner had been remanded for extradition on three successive occasions; that no court judge in passing upon cases had held forth any hope or promise of setting the prisoner at liberty; but, to the contrary, all the prima facie cases which were established against the prisoner were directed to the effect of extradition. In view of this Mr. Garbutt contended to be only fair to the prosecution to hasten the appeal.

Garbutt's case was shown to be No. 78 on the list and is proceeded by Mr. Garbutt and his counsel. The number of dollars earned on Tuesday is equal to the number of dollars earned on Monday, added to the amount earned on Wednesday. It will be compelled to stand over until the Eastern time.

After considering the application to speed the hearing of the appeal at length the court decided unanimously not to interfere and ordered that Garbutt's case must take the ordinary course of other cases on the list.

This judgment gives the prisoner the benefit of the delay, and as the case cannot be reached this sitting Garbutt will remain in Canada at least until the 21st inst. It is upon Monday, 21st on Tuesday (being Monday's plus 1/2 of Wednesday), and 3/4 on Wednesday. There are the amounts earned in three days is \$40.

THE WORLD'S LETTER BAG

Attributes of a Judge and Gospel Preacher.

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WAS IT SOMNAMBULISM?

Some Further Particulars Respecting the Case of the Man Who Walked on the Streets in his Sleep.

In respect to William D. Scriven, whose unconventional priggism of the streets at an early hour last Saturday morning has been previously detailed, the World has since ascertained some interesting facts.

The young man, so his foster father, R. B. Scriven, who lives in Hawthorn-street, St. Thomas, says in a state of somnambulism on the occasion referred to and would probably have returned to his boarding house had not been interfered with.

The policeman, of course, could not be aware of the man's walk, and in this case it is evident that the man was in a somnambulic state at the time he was walking on the streets.

In a previous issue it required four men to hold him, and his foster father was able, however, to manage him. This is attributed to the power of magnetism.

The young man has always been subject to nervous depression, and is now, as usual, accompanied with his life, sometimes miraculously, for 7 years ago, company with Frank Parsons, he climbed up a dry stub and when he was at a height of 81 feet the stub broke off 10 feet from the ground, and he fell 71 feet from the top of the stub.

It is a well-known fact that the man was with the breaking of both bones of one arm at the wrist, and the cracking of one of the joints of the other.

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
