CIVIC REFORM.

The committee appointed by the City Council to consider the all-absorbing question of civic reform has recommended a project involving the creation of the so-called Board of Administration, to be composed of the Mayor and Chairmen of the Executive and Board of Works. It is proposed that this Board shall have the assistance of an advisory body, consisting of Engineer, Solicitor, Treasurer and Commissioner. The Board is to be empowered to award contracts and transact such other business as may be necessary in the nature of the Council may decide. It is not stated what powers the advisory half of the Board is to have, but from a resolution of Ald. Hubbard we presume they are not to vote in any of the subjects coming before the Board. This resolution is to the effect that heads of departments are to report on tenders before they are passed by the Board. This implies they will have no vote.

THE CITY AND THE PEDDLERS.

According to the decision of the Privy Council, no jurisdiction to prohibit peddlers from carrying on their trade in the streets of the city was passed by the council in 1871 to keep these itinerant merchants off the streets has been declared ultra vires. The city has no power to regulate this traffic on the streets, an effort should be made to secure a law to that effect. Now that it is the right of anyone to conduct his business on the crowded streets of the city, we will soon find ourselves in the streets. This right of a citizen has a right to use the streets in connection with the carrying on of his business, but we do not think he has the right to do business in the street, if he is not a resident of the city. If we allow the individual the right to carry on his business in the street, we give him a privilege that is not to be taken away from a resident of the city. If the city has a right to collect a license in lieu of rent for the right to do business in the street, it surely ought to have the right to refuse the privilege altogether. The community can justly claim the right to the monopoly of selling merchandise in the streets. This right does not belong to the individual, but should be vested in the community as a whole, and the city should obtain it if it sells this privilege at its full commercial value. It is not only proper that the city should part with a monopoly without the adequate consideration, but it is unfair to those who are carrying on business in rented stores to allow people who have no rent to pay to compete with them. Whatever power is necessary to give the city full control of the streets as far as the peddlers are concerned should be applied for at the next session of the Legislature, and as a good case can be shown, we see no reason why the powers should not be granted.
