

General Proceeding to you this, our Elevench Annual Report of this Secrety, for the past year, we will endeavor to briefly show such figures as a pealar you to see our present financial starting, as well as to see the expenditure in the various departments during the year.

The Spring Show was neld in the village of Arkona, on the 24th day of April, with 21 extress in all and 19 prizes awarded, in diplomas, and was on an average with like shows in this riding, with a saving of \$33.50 in premiums awarded.

The Fall Show was held in the village of Wyoming, on the 1st and 2nd days of October, and was considered to be in all respects one of the best, if not quite the best, ever held in the Riding, there being 903 entress over 1884, and 775 over any previous year. The membeiship for the year was 302, being an increase from last year of 49 members, while the gate receipts amounting to \$323.90. On the whole your Directors have much reason to be thankful, when we consider that we started with an indebtedness of over \$320 borrowed funds, we have been able to reduce that amount by \$50 and show a balance of about \$224, the most of which will probably be utilized by the incoming Board to the reducing of our indebtedness.
