The grading of the hogs shows 331, or 20.2%, of total shipments graded Selects; 882, or 53.8%, graded Thick Smooth; 33 hogs graded Heavies; 3 hogs Heavies; 162 Shop hogs; 168 Lights and Feeders; 13 Sows No1; 42 Sows No. 2 and 4 Stag hogs.

> Canadian Coal For Ontario

The subject of Alberta coal for Ontario consumers wil not down, Premier Greenfield, of Alberta, and Premier Ferguson, of Ontario, are both working on the problem in Conjunction with Sir Henry Thornt-

Premier Armstrong, of Nova Scotia, is also taking a hand in the matter, with a view to securing an added market for Nova Scotia coal in this province.

The projects now under discuss ion contemplates the granting of a low freight rate on solid loads of coal from Nova Scotia and Alberta mines to Quebec and Ontario points. The suggestion is made that during the summer months when railway equipment is not in full use, and time is slack in the mines, unbroken trainloads of from 40 to 50 cars should be hauled at a rate of \$6 to \$7 a ton from Alberta and a proportionately lower rate from Nova Scotia; and that if a special accounting of these operations shows a loss, the loss should be met by the people of Canada as a whole.







rocation of the order-in-council took the aid away from the county main-tained institutions and not from those maintained by the cities and he could not see why there should be any difference shown.



County Road

A new motion was introduced petitioning the department of public highways to designate a provincial county road starting in Warwick as a county road, and in lieu of that the designation of the road from Rutherford north, via Petrolea to the Lon-don road highway as a provincial

county road. The farmer road paral-lels the highway and is in good shape while the north and south road was in very bad condition it was said.
