

# Agriculture in the Eastern Town-

The most striking improvements have taken place in this division of our Province, since I saw it last. The whole style of farming seems to have undergope a transformation. Horses have taken the place of the loitering bullocks, and the rapidity of motion of the former has communiwith everything else; the use of improved implements, the ameliora-tion of berned stock, the attempt, al-most universal, to induce a regular course of ero ping, are evident throughout. I wasenchanted, though arprised, to find that there was only apprised, to the task dere was only the Journal of Agriculture. Where I dreaded to meet with sneers I met with hearty communications, and I am happy to say that I have been promised the assistance in the future of several of the most successful ag-

riculturists of the Province. On the 28th of June 1 visited the farm of Mr. J. Herowning, Longueuil, and a very pleasant day I epent with the proprietor, whose hospitality 1 have every reason to remember. Mr. Browning holds fruit, to the notion that no farmer can possibly be thorparfectly accurate account, not only of his receipts and expenditure, but ilso of the work done, the manure spent, and the produce yielded, on each field. This notion I found, by inspection, he carries completely out; and the same with the dainy, positry. and other parts of his business; so that it is visible, at even a sursory glance, what pays, and what does not pay. The root crop, principally mangolds and sugar beets, was looking well, but the seed was too lavishly sown and the thinning out segued to be rather an arduous task in consequence. As may well be congeived, Mr. Browning keeps nothing for show, the whole conduct of the farm is practical to a degree. Every thing is in its place, no tools or implements lying about, the barns, stubles, &c., all handy and convenient; conscquantly, the labor bill does pot run way with the profits of the land, but is kept within due bounds. Now the principal improvements are finished more profitable an easier and task lies before the owner; at all events, seeing that it is only three years since he brought the estate, no one can doubt that gonuine, honest work, guided by a sound head, has been bought to hear upon the land to bring it into the state of cultivation i which I found it.




