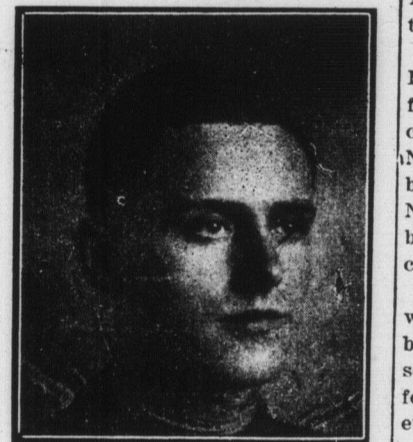
REPRESENTED IN NOVA SCOTIA

The MONITOR received a pleasant call last week from Mr. W. Albert Spurr, who recently arrived from London, England.

Mr. Spurr will begin at once, or in fact has already started, a campaign among the fruit growers of Nova Scotia in the interest of Geo Monro, Ltd. London and Manchester, one of the largest and best known firms in England.

Mr. Spurr comes directly from England with all the information concerning the apple market on the other side. He quotes a well known expert who has recently been investigating conditions in England and other European Countries who says, "The Nova Scotia farmers and fruit growers will have to keep their eyes open if they desire to compete in the English market with British Columbia and American growers."

Another thing our shippers will have to learn, if they expect to hold their own with British Columbia fruit growers, is to improve on the present system of packing. At present there is a wide field for improvement in this regard. We are pleased to report that this enterprising young man is a native of Deep Brook, N. S., being a son of Mr. and Mrs. Shippey Spurr, of that village. After a successful war record overseas, he accepted a responsible position with this London and Manchester firm.

He now returns full of enthusiasm and with a keen desire to place on the English market Nova Scotia apples. He knows, as all Canadians with common sense do, that in quality, flavor and the like the Nova Scotia apple has no equal in any part of the civilized world. The difficulty is to get Nova Scotians to realize this fact and to make a strong move to live up to the big idea. Unless we are mistaken, Mr. Spurr will do something worth while to assist the local growers to overcome any prejudice that may exist "over there" re our faulty system of packing, etc.

AN ENJOYABLE MONTH'S OUTING

A Trip to the "Hub" Will Arouse Even Those Who on Daylight Saving Time.

A month's outing from the hum drum monotony of daily life under favorable circumstances is always fraught with pleasure, more especially so in the sunny June days when Nature's garb is at its best.

Nova Scotia is a good place in which to live and our fair valley has few peers. But just to move on a little faster than even "Daylight Saving" demands, a trip to the "Hub" will arouse and awaken even "Solomon Slow" and bid him move on a bit more quickly.

One of the features of Uncle Sam's domain which might well be copied in our fair Province, is the perfect road bed extending from Boston to New York, and th'out all adjacent towns.

At one auto outing after visiting Belmont and Cambridge, twelve different townships were touched, including Watertown, Newton, Wellesly, Natick, Framingham, Holliston, Sherborn, Medfield, Walpole, Foxboro, Norfolk. All of these towns can boast of a "humane institution" excepting one (Walpole).

Another trip much enjoyed by motor was from Belmont to "Marlboro", a beautiful town with picturesque scenery, enroute visiting "Long-fellow's Wayside Inn" which recalls every detail of a much loved familiar poem.

Another trip through Lexington toward "Arlington Heights" brings forcibly to mind Paul Revere's hasty midnight ride. Many quaint old buildings are shown and explained. The "Munro House" stands as a memorial of past glory where many curious and relics of war time with deeds of the brave are preserved. Back to Belmont, a ten minutes' walk, brings us to Mt. Auburn "City of the dead" where the great leveler leaves all men equal. A glance at a costly monument donated by herself marks the final resting place of the founder of "Christian Science" One cannot but feel a thrill at what might have been done to the worthy needy poor with the millions thus spent. The best theatres are closed. A visit to Keith's gives variety, "Pops", at Symphony Hall is a treat to the music lover. "The Exhibit", the place where spirits are said to have talked to the living, is now fitted up for real life "Movies" which are an educator when rightly displayed.

St. Paul's Cathedral celebrated its centennial on June 17th, when many distinguished Bishops and clergy were present. Bishop Barry, of Europe, being one of the preachers on the preceding Sunday.

At each service the Union Jack and Stars and Stripes were displayed and a fitting tribute made by Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts that as mother and daughter they might ever stand united for "right against might."

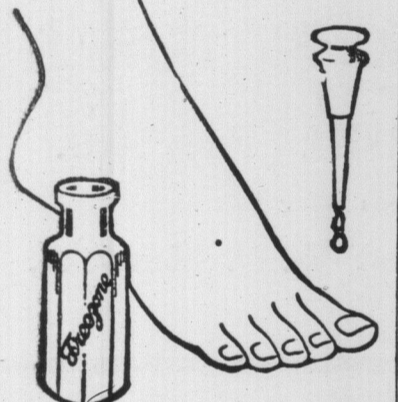

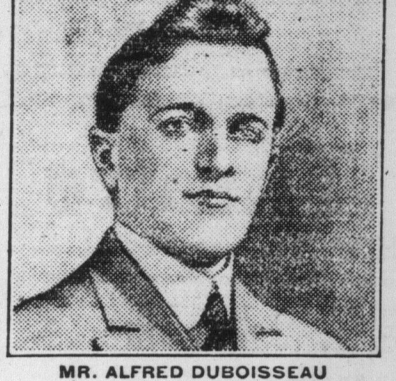

HOW TO CARE FOR BOOTS AND SHOES

After boots and shoes have been wet it is difficult to secure a good polish. To overcome this trouble it is only needful to rub a little kerosene over the boot or shoe before applying the polishing material. It is best to keep boots and shoes on "trees" and the footwear should be placed on these as soon as it is removed. If there is no time to clean the boots or shoes this is not a matter of great moment provided they are put on the "trees" at once. Where trees are not available stuff the boots or shoes with soft paper. If this is pressed in properly, the shape of the shoe will be preserved. Shoe trees can be purchased at shoe stores at a reasonable price.

Sometimes even a good fitting shoe will pinch somewhere. This is usually due to an irregularity of the foot. To remedy this place a small cloth that has been wrung out of hot water over the spot and leave for a few minutes. This should be done while the shoe is on the foot. The heat expands the leather and it becomes shaped to fit the foot.—Ex.

\$45,000,000 THEFTS FROM CARS SHOWN.

Booty Double That in Any Pre-War Year.

Wholesale looting of merchandise in transit on the railroads of the United States caused a loss of approximately \$45,000,000 in 1919, according to United States Railroad Administration statistics made public recently.

This is estimated to be more than double the losses sustained in any pre-war year, but it is pointed out that the increased cost of the commodities stolen, roughly estimated to average 85 per cent, must be taken into consideration when comparing the losses in the days of low prices with losses now.

A technique of robbery has been developed so highly that the methods of "master thieves" are similar in the United States, England, France, Italy and Argentina, according to a recent report of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Argentina.

Substitution is the usual method used by the thieves. Sometimes boxes supposed to contain velvets are found at their destination to be filled with calico or other cheaper grades of cloth, but as a rule, waste paper is found. These are referred to as "concealed losses" by railway men, and are especially difficult to trace, as the shipment leaves and arrives apparently in good condition, and it is almost impossible to discover at what point the theft occurred.

The silk industry has been one of the most severely hit in the last year, and so great has the risk become that the Railroad Administration has been considering excluding raw silks from the privilege of freight transportation by rail. The Merchants' Association of New York, through its traffic bureau, has protested against such an exclusion, advocating some less radical measure to minimize or prevent the theft of silk in transit.

BY AEROPLANE TO PARIS.

A distinctly novel attraction has now been provided in the C.P.R. office windows at Charing Cross, an attraction which has been much admired by the crowds who have gathered to make inspection. The fine windows usually devoted to the exhibition of things Canadian is being occupied by an excellent model aeroplane of the Aircraft Transport and Travel, Limited, at Hendon, together with scientifically accurate models of various types of aeroplanes and airships.

Such a display in a railway and shipping office may seem rather unusual at first sight, but is really a sign of the times, also marking much surprise on the part of the Dominion Express Company of Canada. Realising the importance of maintaining a really "Express" service, if its name is still to be justified, the Dominion Express Company, the Premier Express Company in Canada, made arrangements to act as Passenger and Parcels Agents for the Aircraft Transport and Travel Limited on their London-Paris daily air service.

It is thus possible for either passengers or parcels to be booked for conveyance by aeroplane or from London and Paris through any of the Dominion Express Company's offices in Europe and these, in addition to London are to be found in important cities such as Liverpool, Glasgow, Manchester, Birmingham, Bristol and Paris.

The advantages of this arrangement are many, for the Dominion Express, holding as it does the exclusive right of shipping Express parcels over the entire C.P.R. system, as agents for the Aeroplane Service can ensure that an Express package scheduled to catch a certain ship actually reached its destination in Canada in the shortest possible space of time. As time is money nowadays, more than ever it was, it is easy to realise what an important adjunct an Air Service is to an Express Company.

The time-table shows that only 24 hours is occupied on the journey to or from London and Paris—urgent letters are carried at 2 shillings and 6 pence per ounce over the ordinary letter rate.

Parcels for delivery in Paris on the same day have to be handed in at the London office of the Dominion Express Company, 62-65, Charing Cross, London, S.W., before 10.30 a.m. The parcel rates range from 1s. 6d. to 2s. 6d. per lb. according to quantity, while special rates are quoted for large and regular consignments. The single fare for passengers is 15 guineas which includes a car to convey the passenger to Hounslow, the starting point. The Dominion Express Company's officials at Charing Cross have every reason to believe that a large proportion of Canadian visitors to Europe this year will take advantage of the ease with which it is now possible to book seats for a real flying visit to the continent through their office. In fact, if they so wish, a motor car can pick them up in Trafalgar Square, and in under three hours they can be walking along the Champs Elysees.

CANADIAN NEWS IN BRIEF

(By C.P.R. Telegraph)

Ottawa, Ont.—The Soldiers' Settlement Board announces that action is being taken to dispose of 75,000 acres of Hudson's Bay reserve land in Saskatchewan and Alberta, which have been cancelled by the Crown, also 10,400 acres of Doukhobor reserve lands near Kamack, Saskatchewan. Another 30,000 acres of grazing land will also be opened up. The whole 115,000 acres will be available for soldier settlement after April 30th.

Ottawa, Ont.—A return brought down in Parliament places the total enlistments in Canada for the Canadian Expeditionary Force at 590,572. By provinces the number was as follows: Ontario, 243,577; Quebec, 82,793; New Brunswick, 25,864; Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, 33,342; Manitoba, 66,319; Saskatchewan, 31,846; Alberta, 45,145; British Columbia, 51,438; Yukon, 2,227.

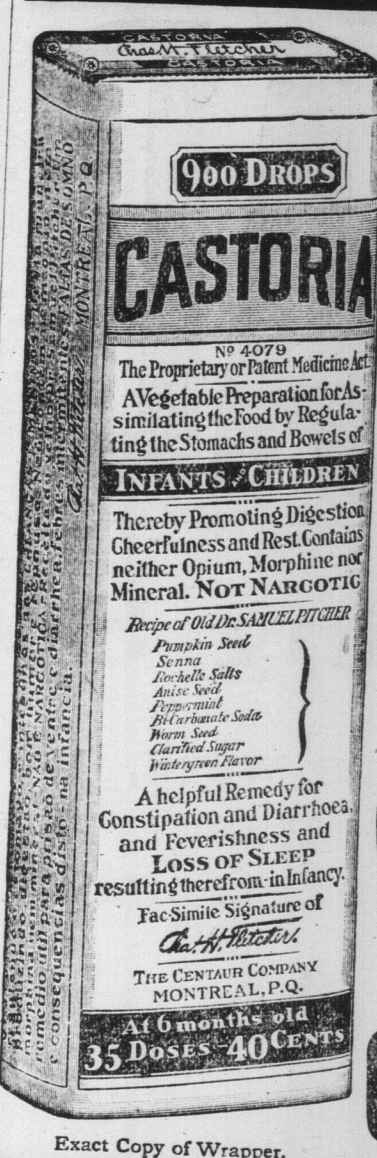
Ottawa, Ont.—The applications of over 100 Imperial veterans who desire to take advantage of the Soldier Land Settlement scheme, have been approved. These veterans will be required to spend at least one year on farms in Canada to become familiar with Canadian methods. The others will be absorbed into the Board's training establishments and will be required to spend at least two years farming in Canada before becoming eligible for the loan benefits of the Act.

Quebec, P.Q.—During the last 13 years the Province of Quebec has spent \$22,000,000 on highways. In 1920 the ordinary annual provincial grants for education are \$2,000,000. The capital invested in pulp and paper plants within the province is \$84,000,000 and the number of mill employes about 10,000.

Sherbrooke, P.Q.—The Campbell-Howard Machine Company, formerly the Sherbrooke Iron Works Ltd., have sold their business to G. L. Bourne and F. A. Schaff, of New York. These gentlemen are respectively president and vice-president of the Locomotive Superheater Co. of New York, railway supply people, and it is the intention to manufacture railway supplies for Canada, also to carry on a general foundry and machine business.

Vancouver, B.C.—According to announcement made by R. J. Lyclett, vice-president of the Trans-Canada Theatres, Ltd., this company will shortly start the construction of a new theatre to be erected close to the C. P. R. Vancouver Hotel, which will have a seating capacity of about 600 and cost \$100,000; construction which will start shortly.

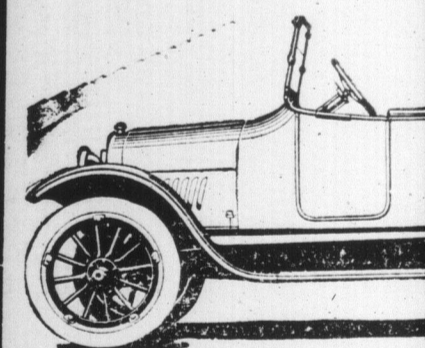
