#### Open Letter by the S. C. R.

R. Matheson, Esq., Superintendent Deaf and Dur . Institute, Belleville:

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER,—It will be in your recollection that the *Monetary Times* has tried again and again to damage The Independent Order of Foresters by the publication of just such unfair articles as that which appears in its issue of the 6th June. You will also remember that after each attack of the *Monetary Times* the I. O. F. has enjoyed, if anything, more than its usual prosperity, and our old members have learned to look upon these periodic exhibitions which the *Monetary Times* makes of its

#### STUPIDITY AND MENDACITY.

with more or less satisfaction, giving us as they do, among other direct benefit, free advertising to the I. O. F. The following extract, taken from an article which appeared in an ably conducted journal published in New York, indicates the estimate in which the Monetary Times is held among people versed in the principles of insurance:

"The Monetary Times, of Toronto, Canada, claiming to be edited by gentuemen familiar with the problems of finance, want the public to believe that such institutions (as THE (NDEPENDENT Order of Foresters) will be unable to meet their current death claims; but the average business man will be easily convinced that such an editor is playing his part as a fool for pay, just as the audience in the theatre sees that the fool in the play is not, in reality, a fool at all, but is

simply making believe he is, because he is an actor, and is

PAID TO ACT LIKE AN IDIOT."

When, however, we find in the columns of our co-temporary the extract given below, published with the view of arresting the great prosperity of the I. O. F., and perchance divert the battalions of applicants who have been for months past, and still are, enrolling themselves as members of the I. O. F., and whom the Monetary Times calls "raw recruits," we find it very hard to make ourselves believe that its editor is not "in reality a fool," and that he acts as he does "because he is paid to act like an idiot":

#### THE EXTRACT.

"Every life insurance builder and every actuary condemns the attempt to make \$8.20 per annum cover the cost of paying \$1,000 at the death of a man whose age is 30 at enry. And every thoughtful person who stops to divide \$8.00 into \$1,000 can see by the product, 133, that it is utterly futile to expect any man to live long enough to pay in the \$1,000. (At age 30 the Foresters' rate for \$1.000 is 72 cents per month, or \$8.64, of which five per cent., or 44 cents. is deducted for expenses, leaving \$8.20 towards the ultimate \$1,000.) Yet in the face of the above test of the absurdity of this enterprise, thousands of raw recruits are found ready to pay admission fees and to rail against the regular life insurance companies on account of their more solid and expensive but more durable foundation. They learn in the I. O. F. Courts and through their monthly organ to speak of the best insurance or-ganizations as "old liners," as if they were becoming things of the past, whose places were to be taken by the summer garden, butterfly cheap John, canvas tents, built upon \$8.20 per annum. But summer always has been succeeded by winter, and the Foresters are just now finding out that there is some danger of an early frost blighting their hopes with chill winter yet to come This reserve was announced on the first of February last in large type as worth \$192,as the rate of very \$6,000 per month as it did last year, it actually receded to \$190,406.88 on the 1st of March, and again went backward to \$184,879.35 on the 1st of April. But as there were \$16,000 of unpaid claims standing out at that time, the real value of the reserve was only \$168.870 or " the reserve was only \$168,879.35.

You will notice that in the above "test" the effects of a medical selection is entirely ignored by the editor, nor is there any consideration given to lapses of policy-holders, nor any account taken of the influx of new blood, though all these are important factors in any

INTELLIGENT AND HONEST CONSIDERATION of the question of insurance.

No one but an editor of a journal like the *Monetary Times* would stop for a moment and divide \$8.00 into \$1,000 in order to obtain in the product of such a division the

number of years that it would take a person paying \$8.20 annually to provide himself with a \$1.000. For we do not suppose there is, outside of our asylums and the editorial rooms of the Monetary Times, an individual in Canada having enjoyed the advantages of an education in our common schools, who would not take into consideration in such a calculation the question of interest. Monetary Times' contention is, that a member of the I. O. F. joining the Order at 30 years of age would have to live 133 years before he would pay in enough to provide his family with a \$1,000. In this calculation the

#### QUESTION OF INTEREST IS UTTERLY IGNORED.

The great bulk of the funds of the I.O.F. is invested at from 5 to 6 per cent. A very large proportion of this is compounded every six months, so that we shall be quite within bounds if we compute the interest at 5 per cent. compounded annually, which would give us at age 70, or in 40 years \$1,014.72, instead of taking 133 years to provide a \$1,000, as stated by the Monetary

With regard to the question of "lapses," I cannot do better than to quote the following, which appeared in a former letter of mine written a year or so ago in reply to a similar attack made upon the I. O. F. at that time by the Monetary Times:

#### "THE QUESTION OF LAPSES

noticed in your letter is so important a factor in the business of insurance, that any conclusion which may be reached in any matter of this kind, wherein that factor has been left out of consideration, must be utterly fallacious. For not only do insurance companies make a large profit out of lapses, but what is even of greater importance to them and to the I.O.F., is the fact that by reason of lapses and the constant addition of new blood, by the admission of new members, companies and societies, practically renew their membership every eight or ten years, thus keeping down the average age of the membership, and keeping the membership always within a few years of the medical examiner's hand, thereby keeping the rate of mortality way below the figures of the Monetary Times. Notwithstanding the excathedra statements of the Monetary Times that in "ten years we will have a stiff annual deficit to meet," during the last eight years that the Order has been under the present administration there never has been a year, hardly a month, in which we did not show a substantial gain in our surplus funds. In the light of our experience, therefore, what must we conclude of the remarks of Coronany could have paid all its losses and an im-the Monetary Times that "the losses do not come mense sum for management expenses out of its up to the tabular rate, usually (sic) until the second we years is entered upon?" Why, either that our experience is unusual, which it is not, else that the writer of the Monetary Times is

#### GROSSLY IGNORAN'T

of the subject he is writing about, or he is something worse. You know that we have entered on the third period of five years, and as it usually happens to every live society or company, we are piling up the surplus faster than ever, notwithstanding the rule laid down that when the second five years is entered upon that "there and thereafter the evil effects of lapses, or selection against the society, commences to be felt, and just to the extent that this goes on does the deathrate run higher than what the American Experience Table provides tor." Our death-rate for the past seven months has been less than four in a thousand, notwithstanding the "evil effects of lapses."

How does the experience of any line Insurance Company stand with the statement that after the second period of five years is entered upon, the mortality must begin to run higher than in those laid

down in the experience table. I have just pointed out that this is

#### NOT TRUE OF THE FORESTERS.

Let us inquire if it is true of any good Live Insurance Company or Society.

Take the Ontario Mutual, which began business in 1870. In 1888, after it had passed the major portion of the third period of five years, it had 8,700 members, and 55 deaths for the year ending 1888, thus making a rate of mortality of only 5.5 in a thousand. It conjected in premiums alone \$337,214, and only paid for losses \$61,700, while its expenses were \$71,934, that is to say, that for every dollar paid to the widows, more than a dollar was disbursed for expenses. The experience of this Company, therefore, does not, by any means, bear out the statements of the Monetary Times. This Company in its 19th year could have paid all its losses and all its enormous expenses out of one-half of its premium income alone, and still have laid by \$69,946 in its reserve fund. It could, therefore, have paid all its losses and its enormous management expenses out of the rates of the Foresters.

Let us next take the Confederation Insurance Company. This Company began business in 1871, and its death rate in its 18th year was 6.9 in a thousand. Its premium income was \$510,582, and it paid in death losses, matured endowments and annuities, \$142,254. For expenses and dividends to stockholders it paid \$136,802, being nearly \$1.00 for management expenses and dividends for every dollar of losses paid. Suppose this Company had been as

#### ECONUMICAL IN MANAGEMENT

as the I. O. F. and spent only \$20,000 for management expenses instead of \$136,802, this Company could have paid all losses and expenses out of one half of its premium income alone, and have had \$182,074 left over to add to its surplus.

Now let us look at one of the older companies and see whether its experience gives any different testimony. I refer to the Canad. Life, which began business in 1847, o 42 years ago. We find that in 1888, when it had entered the ninth period of fee years each, it received in premiums alone \$1,250,729. It paid for death losses, matted endowments, and annuities the sum of \$422,347.61, and for expenses and dividends the sum of \$162,325.78, so that this Corapany, could have paid all its losses and an impremium income alone, and still have had left \$576,057 to carry to reserve. The experience of this Company also contradicts the statements of the Mon etary Times.

Let us next turn to the experience of one or two of the great American companies which are now nearly half a century old, and see what evidence their experience affords upon this question. The Equitable Life, of New York, for the ten years ending with 1887 received in premiums \$106,252,130. While it paid for death losses during the same period \$32,670,051. So that this Company could have paid all its death losses, even if it had been collecting only one-third of its premium rates and still have had lett a surplus of \$2,747,325. Take also the New York Life Insurance Company for the ten years ending with 1887, we find that its premium income was \$90,083,340, one-third of this amounts to \$30,029,780, while it paid for death losses during the same period only \$23,151,157, so that this Company if it had charged only one-third of its premium rates, would have had enough money to have paid all its death losses during the ten years and still have had left a surplus of

\$6,876,633.

Thus the experience of every live Insurance Company, whether old or young, contradicts absolutely the statements of the *Monetary Times*, and demonstrates by the inexorable legic of facts gathered from actual experience that the rates of insurance of the

Foresters are ample for all time to come.

Suppose, now, we apply to the Canada Life the tests which the Monetary Times applies to the I. O. F. and to other Fraternal Benevolent Societies. The Canada Life admits applicants up to 65 years, so that we are below the mark, if anything, when we assume that the average age of its original policy-holders must have been as high as 35 years. "Now move the hand of time twice twenty years," and the policy holder of 35 years of age has become 75 years old. The American Experience Table tells us that the rate of mortality at that age is 94.3 in a thousand, while the Dominion Superintendent of Insurance informs us that the officers of the Canada Life report that the death rate in that Company, after 41 years, is only

8.9 IN 1000,

instead of 94.3, called for by the inexorable hand of death. The same state of affairs is true of the other active Old Line Companies, viz., that the actual rate of mortality is away below that called for by the Ex-

perience Tables.

In his last report the Dominion Superintendent of Insurance states that "the death rate has been entirely re-calculated for the last four years," and "it is believed that the results arrived at represent the actual mortality among insured lives in Canada as accurately as can be gathered from the returns of the companies," and are represented to be as follows among the active companies, to wit:

1885—9.6 in 1,000. 1886—8.1 in 1,000. 1887—8.3 in 1,000. 1888—8.6 in 1,000.

There are a number of substantial reasons for believing that the rate of mortality among the Foresters will be even lower than that experienced by the insurance companies. In the first place the limit of age for admission is up to the 55th year of age in the I. O. F., and among the insurance companies it is in some, at least, as high as the 65th year of age. In the second place a large proportion of those who insure in the old line companies are men over 35 years of age, while a very large proportion of those who join the I. O. F. are young men between the ages of 18 and 30. The average age of the members of the I. O. F. to-day is

ONLY 28.67 YEARS."

The selection of lives is another important element in connection with the business of Life Insurance, and in this matter the system of the I. O. F. must be acknowledged to be far superior to that of any Old Line Insurance Company. In the first place the Medical Examination Papers of the I. O. F. are conceded to be among the most rigid and the best extant. We have a corps of Court Physicians who act as examiners, who as a rule, are the leaders in their profession in their respective localities, eminent alike for their attainments in their profession, and as honor-The result of able and high-minded citizens. the personal examinations made by our Court Physicians are submitted for review to a Medical Board, whose Secretary not only holds the degrees from Medical Colleges of this country, but who holds also the degrees of the Universities of Edinburgh, and London, England, and who has made his subject a special study. In addition to the above tests every applicant for membership in the I. O. F. must pass the scrutiny of those who know of his daily life, and in this way the selected lives of the I. O. F. are made of

#### A MUCH HIGHER GRADE

than that of any Insurance Company can possibly be.

Passing to the subject of our Reserve Fund and about which the *Monetary Times* makes the following observations:

"Sooner than anyone could have reasonably predicted, one short year ago, this so-called Life Insurance Company, (sic), conducted upon the assessment plan, has begun to trench upon its short-lived reserve fund in order to pay current death claims."

Further on the following extract is given:

"Here are the figures as they have appeared, showing the reserve f.nd on the 1st of each month for three months from February 1st, in 1889 and 1890:—

F. in the natural order of things has entered upon the period which is but the beginning of the end so often predicted by the *Monetary Times*, and that its former statements that "in ten years the I. #### Our Surplus \$204,814.86.

Soon after the close of the last Supreme Court the Supreme Chief Ranger stated that he expected to meet the next Supreme Court with at least 25,000 members, and it was said that he was altogether too sanguine. The present indications are that by the next meeting of the Supreme Court the membership will be nearer 30,000 than 25,000, and with a cash surplus in its treasury of over a quarter of a million of dollars. Truly, when we remember that the I. O. F. nine short years ago numbered less than 400 members. and that it was burdened with a debt of over \$4,000 instead of having any surplus at all, its course has been indeed steadily "Onward and Upward."

#### Capitation Tax.

The capitation tax from Subordinate Courts not under a High Court is fifty cents each half-year. From Subordinate Courts under a High Court it is only 25 cents each half-vear. Hence Subordinate Courts in California which paid 50 cents capitation tax last January paid just the amount required, and these would have to pay in July instant 25 cents capitation tax, because the High Court has been instituted between the two dates, thus reducing the amount payable to the Supreme Court by just one-half.

Every member initiated since the first incorporation of the Supreme Court, in 1881, is supposed to pay the rates laid down in the Constitution for his age at the time he joined the Order, and a dispensation to initiate at "Charter Rates" in no way affects this law.

It does not mean that a Court which avails itself of a Dispensation to initiate at "Charter Rates" is thereby relieved of paying the Certificate and Registration Fees. The Supreme Chief Ranger expects to be Courts have supposed, from their actions, that this was the meaning.

Charter members, as a rule, are called on to pay their proportion towards the Charter For instance, if 20 apply for a Charter they each pay \$5.00 towards the Charter. 25 apply for a Charter, each of them would pay \$4.00 towards the Charter, and if 50 applied, the payment of each toward the Charter would be reduced to \$2.00. whatever each does pay towards the Charter. it is returned to him from first initiation fees received by the new Court.

Then each Charter member pays his own Medical Examination fee, the Certificate fee and Registration fee, and as this is not repayed to him, these fees are termed "Charter Rates," because they are the only fees paid by the Charter members. The payments towards the Charter being regarded only as a temporary advance.

When, therefore, a Dispensation is issued to initiate at "Charter Rates" the only portion of the initiating fees which can be affected is that part which would, under ordinary circumstances, go into the treasury of the Subordinate Court, and therefore, very properly, Courts are always given the option to avail themselves or not of such Dispensation as each Court may think best.

Every Court of fifty members, or under, is entitled to two representatives, and one additional representative for every twentyfive members, or fractional part thereof above

fifty.

The headquarters of the High Standing Committee will be at the Huron House. The Committee on Credentials will meet at 11 o'clock a.m. on the 14th of August, at which time every Credential must be in.

Also find enclosed a Semi-Annual Report Form 12, and two Semi-Annual Returns, Forms 25. On Form 12 you make your report to the Supreme Court, Form 25 is for your report to the High Court. 


