P. Fitzpatrick, of Pictou county, N. S., who is a director of the Nova Scotia Eastern Railway, stated when in Montreal last week that the when in Montreal last week that the road would certainly be started this spring. The entire length will be 190 miles. One section will run from New Glasgow to the Strait of Canso, and the other from Windsor Junction to a point on the main line this side of the Strait .-The Mayor, in his inaugural address, points out the necessity of larger water mains in the business portion of the city and of an auxiliary pumping engine to insure an adequate supply of water to the high level service of the city.—The Minister of Customs and Mr. Routhier, architect, of Ottawa, arrived in the city last week in connection with proposed im-provements in the custom house, for which \$37,000 was granted at last session of Parliament. Improvements will in-clude the introduction of electric power and a passenger elevator.—The Board of Trade is in favor of installing gas buoys along the St. Lawrence between Mon-treal and Quebec, so as to provide for treal and Quebec, so as to provide for night navigation.—The chairman of the fire committee has pointed out the necessity of immediately providing for new fire engines, new stations, hose, etc., for the fire department. It is stated that arrangements have been completed for the purchase of the property in the east end on which the new C. P. R. shops are to be built. It is understood that the expenditure will be over \$1,000,000.

TORONTO, ONT.—At the last meeting of the Senate of the University of Toronto, a resolution was passed in favor of the erection of a building to be used for the purposes of the medical faculty and the department of physiology.

He also recommends an expenditure of \$10,000 for water mains in Ward 5, also the following local improvements: phalt pavement, Alexander-street, from Church-street to McMillan-street, \$3,160;

macadam roadway, Munro-street, from Queen to Gerr. 1rd, \$8,560; Givens-street, from Argyle to Halton-street, \$2760; cedar block pavement, Concord avenue from Dewson-street to a point 180 feet south of Heptown-street, \$3,770; concrete walks, Sackville street, west side, from Carleton to Winchester-street, \$432.—The T. Eaton Company have decided to add two more stories to their factory, between Albert and Louisa streets.—It is the intention of the council to construct a tai macadam roadway on MacPherson avenue, from Avenue road to 629 feet east, at a cost of \$2,760.—Building permits have been granted as follows: N. V. Kuhlman, two storey summer residence at Kew Beach, cost \$1,000; F. Everist, residence on Concord avenue, near College street, cost \$2,500.—Kivas Tully, C. 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



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
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#### DR. MARTIN MURPHY, C. E.

DR. MARTIN MURPHY, C. E.

D M tin Murphy, C. E., Provincial Engineer of Nova Scotia and President-elect of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, is the second son of Thomas Murphy, contractor, and was born at Coolvearney, near Enniscorthy, Wexford, Ireland, November 11th, 1832. He joined the engineering staff of the late William Dargan at the age of 20, and has since been engaged without intermission as an engineer and contractor. He worked at his profession under Thomas Plunket, W. R. Lefanu, and Cotton & Fleming, all of Sir John McNeil's School of Civil Engineering. During the fifties and early in the sixties, he worked on the branches of the Midland Great Western Railway, between Mullinger and Longford, and from Athenry to Tuam; on the Great Southern and Western Railway branches, between Athlone and Tullamore, and from Mallow to Fermony, and on the Banbridge & Scarva Railway in the North of Ireland; also on the construction of Mov Bridge between Railway in the North of Ireland; also on the city of Dualin sewerage works, and on the construction of Mov Bridge hetween Charlemont and Mov. County Tyrone. On the retirement of Mr. Dargan from railway construction, he continued with his successor, Thomas Edwards, and was employed as contractor's engineer on the extension of the Dublin, Wicklow & Wexford Railway from Wicklow to Enniscorthy, and on the Shillelagh Branch. In 1862 he was appointed resident engineer of the Dublin, Wicklow & Wexford Railway and its branches, and continued in that position until he came to Canada in 1868.

Here Dr. Murphy was engineer for the city of Halifax, N. S., 1868-69, and in 1870-71 was engaged as chief engineer for the survey of projected lines of railway by the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia. In 1871 he was appointed Provincial Government Engineer for that Province, but resigned as there was no fixed salary. but resigned, as there was no fixed salary attached to the position at the time. From 1871 to 1874 he was contractor for the construction of bridges on the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, but returned to Nova Scotia in 1875, the local legislature

having then voted an annual salary and appointed him Provincial Engineer, position which he still holds.

In Nova Scotia he has built iron and steel structures over every river in the province. His plans, specifications, and methods for erecting concrete substructures are gaining favor all over Canada. He has been consulted by the Newfoundland Government respecting railways; by the Government of New Brunswick on bridge construction; and by the Colonial

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Dr. Murphy has held the presidency of the Nova Scotian Institute of Science, and the Nova Scotian Institute of Science, and contributed several important papers to its transactions. His paper, and illustratrations of bridge work in Nova Scotia, before the Engineering Congress at the World's Fair, Columbian Exposition, Chicago, 1892-93, was awarded a medal and aluminum case, "for the best and most modern designs for bridge construction." He has contributed to many professional journals and periodicals. He received the degree of D. Sc. from Kings College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, 1886. He married in 1861 Maria Agnes, youngest daughter of Cornelius Buckley, of "Banteer," Mallow, Cork, Ireland.

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
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
