IMPERIAL FEDERACION.
It must be fresh in the recollection of those who have given any attention to the subject that when the agitation, if such a term should be deemed applicable, in favor of Imperial Federation was recently revived, after eleeping for several years, Sir Chames Tupler, who attended the first meeting in Lonfon, strongly ob. jected to the language of the most improtant resolution which aflimed that Federation was necessary, in order to prevent disintegration. The oljpation was considered sound and the resolution was altered. We find in a report or a late meeting held in Liverpool to promoto Federation that Mr. Dalton McCarthy,
M.P., Who, it seems, is President of the Canadian League, expressed in the strongest terms his opinion that, unless Federation ahould be accomplished, disintegra. tion would certainly ensue. Now Mr. Dalton McCarthy is not only a member of the Dominion Parliament and a-warm supporter of the present Government, but his name has been freely used, especislly of late, in connection with a seat in the Cabinet.

It may not be uninteresting at the present time to revert to the past history of Imperial Federation. It was in October, 1874, that the Hon. Edward Blake, in a speech delivered at Aurora, startled the Canadian public by suggesting Imperial confederation as the best remedy for the defects which he conceived to exist in our political institutions. It may be safely affirmed that, while the scheme was treated by his opponents with derision, it found little favor with his own political friends. In the yenr 1879 a London merchant who adopted the nom de plume of "Empiricus" addressed a letter to the Rt. Hon. John Bright, and at the same time caused to be printed for private circulation a letter which he had written to the Hon. Edward Blake from San Francisco, in August, 1874, shortly before the delivery of his Aurora speech. The title of the brochure was "An English Zollverein-Imperial Free 'Irade," and it commences: "according to the desire you "expressed in our conversation of January " last I now put on paper my ideas in re"gard to the project I then mooted of a "closer political union between Great "Britain and her Colonies beginning with "Canada."
It is well known that the author of the scheme was Mr. William Miller of London, who at a recent meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce "remarked "on the bad effect that the tariff which "had been instituted had on his Canadian "business,"-he said that, " the purchases "in Canada were as nearly as possible "equal to those importations that were "undertaken from this country." Again,
"finally he characterized the state of " things which at present existed between
"Eugland and Canada as little short of "commercial murder." Those who have read the letters of "Empiricus" to the Rt. Hon. John Bright and to the Hon. Edward Blake will not be surprised at the foregoing language uttered at a meeting presided over by Sir Charles Tupper. - We, however, venture to point out that such are not the views of the political party to which Mr. Dalton MeCarthy belongs. There may possibly be persons in the
ranks of that party who believe in the possibility of a commercial union between Great Britain and her various dependencies involving an abandonment of free trade by the Imperial Parliament, and other consequences which it would perhaps be premature to discuss.

It is in our judguent a most unfortunate time for Mr. McCarthy to give expression on behalf of Camada to the opinions which he has uttered in Liverpool. At the present juncture a revolu-tion-a peaceable one it is true-is in progress in Great Britain. 'lhe time is approaching whon a general election will take place under the extended frunchise and redistribution of seats recently determined on. Both political parties in the United Kingdom express confidence in the result and, whatever that result may be, it will have an important bearing on the future commercial policy of the Empire. This, then, is no time for the people of Canada to make rash pledges as to their action. Moreover there is no ground whatever for assuming that the party to which Mr. McCarthy belongs is favorable to Imperial Federation. An importantsection of that party is composed of French Canadians and we feel assured is hostile to the scheme. Among the British there has been no expression of opinion on the part of those who represent the views of the party, that would lead to any other supposition than that they were unwise to pronounce hastily in opposition to a very crude scheme, and in the absence of full information as to the objects to be attained. Under these circumstances we think that.it is much to be regretted that a gentleman occupying the position of Mr. McCarthy should have committed himself as he has done.

## THE HAMILTON BOARD OF TRADE.

The annual meeting of the Hamilton Board of Trade was held on the 22nd inst., when Mr. T. H. McPherson, the President, read the annual report, which embraced a number of important topics. After referring to the abnormally low prices of manufactures, caused no doubt to a considerable extent by the over-production which was the natural consequence of the increased protection given to the manufacturing industries, it waived any expression of opinion as to the influence on prices of the increased purchasing power of gold. The fact is recognized that there is "no foreign outlet for surplus goods," and we haye not failed to notice that in the comments of the Evening Times it is said "they express a
fear that as we have established no foreign outlet for manufactures-our restricted trade policy prevents that-the revival of business can only be gradual." We presume that the Council of the Board of Trade must have been well aware that it is simply impossible that the manufuctures of a country where a protective policy prevails, can compete in neutral markets with the very articles which they have excluded from their own.

The report acknowledges the ability displayed in the prompt suppression of the rebellinn in the North-west, but rather unnecessarily intimates a doubt as to its effect on immigration. On the other haud it acknowledges that the early completion of the Pacific Railway will give facilities for the rapid development of large sections of immensely rich agri: cultural country. ' It is not surprising that the report should recommend that the members of the Board and the citizens generally, should take energetic steps to secure a connection with the Pacific railroad. We learn that the removal of the tolls on the Burlington canal has been promised by the Government, and, further, that hopes have been held out that Burlington will be made a harbor of refuge, in other words, that it will be made a Government work. The insolvency question is noticed with an expression of disappointment. It nevertheless became apparent long since, that It would have been simply impossible to deal with a question on which such wide differences of opinion prevail, during the gession which has recently closed.
The President did not touch in his remarks either on the depression and its causes, or on the insolvency question, but a discussion afterwards took place as to the expediency of noticing the anticipated falling-off of immigration to the North-West. It was argued on one side that if the report was true it was right to publish it, while on the other it was contended that it was a mere speculative opinion, and not a fact, and that it was unwise to publish what might be injurious to the country. After some controversy a change was made in the ianguage, and instead of affirming that there was " every probability of a limited immigration into the "North.Weat," it merely referred to "the possibility of a temporarily decressed immigration." It. is certainly rather inconsistent to complain of the burthen of high taxation at a time when it is admitted that, owing to the great competition, prices of commodities are abnormally low. The duties on a great many articles are ad valorem, and are therefore lower when the prices of
commodities àre generally depressed ${ }^{\circ}$ We cannot leave the toll question without a few remarks.
The Times, referring to the action of the Government regarding the tolls observes: "About the last-named matter " there has beon a great deal of red tape, " and much negotiating with the Ottawa "authorities." Indeed the experience "has been that it is more difficult to " obtain for Hamilton what she is clearly "entitled to than it is for some Quebec " oounty constituency to bag hundreds " of thousands of dollars for a railway "that will never pay runuing expensos." Now we should like very much to learn the grounds on which fiamilton is "clearly entitled" to exemption from tolls on a strictly local work, and to have the harbor placed under the Board of Works. We have more than once had to complain of the persistent opposition of the Hamilton Syectator to improvementa, not for the benafit of Montreal, but for the reduction of the cost of the St. Lawrence route, in which Ontario is much interested. The charges, the reduction of which has been sought, have to be borne by all the goods imported or exported by the St. Lawrence route, but the Spectator's designation for those who have advocated reduction is that of "sturdy beggars." We apprehond that the reduction on the Burlington Harbor will be largely for the benefit of the City of Hamilton, and not of the Western trade generally. As there was so large a consumption of red tape, and so much negotiating, we are bound to assume that there was a great deal of persuasion necessary before the consent of the Government was oblained. The thanks of the Board were said to be "specially due" to their parliamentary representatives "for their successtul aid in rela" iion to Burlington Bay Canal legislation "and other matters." We cannot be much surprised that a great deal of pressure should have been required, but it is cortainly rather ungenerous in the Spectator to designate the people of Montreal as "sturdy beggars," in the face of the admitted fact that we have just placed before our readers. 'the merite of the Montreal demands will be treated elaowhere.

## THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.

About the time when our last number was going to pross the gratifying news was received that the fifteen millions of bonds of the Canadian Pacitic Railway Co. had been successfully floated by Messrs. Baring Brothers \& Co. Under all
the circumstances known to exist, there can hardly be a second opinion as to the expediency of issuing bonds as a substitute for the unissued thirty-five millions of the capital stock which had been handed over to the Goverument. One effect of the operation has been a consid. erable advance in the market value of the stock, which, after being for a time very flat at about 38 , has advanced to upwards of 45 . We have got croakers among us, who are but too ready to predict a fulling-off in immigration to the North. West as a consequence of the rebellion, but wo think ib far more probable that a great impotus will be given to the colonization of the territories, owing to the large number of volunteers who were called out to suppress the disturbance. Those volunteers came from all parts of the Dominion, and especially from the principal cities and towns, such as Halifax, St. John, N.B., Qnebec, Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Jamilton, Port Hope, London, eto, etc. The polunteers and their friends will have a great deal to say about the North-West, and if what we have been able to learn of the impressions made on them be correct, then they will prove the most valuable immigration agenta that could have been procured. Whether such surmises should, or should not prove to be correct, we cannot conceive it possible that Canada can be injured by the rebellion. The only substantial ground for alarm was that the Indian tribes would have taken advantage of the opportunity to have made war on the whites. There can be no doubt that there was some anxiety felton the subject, but there are a considerable number of tribes, and there is no probability whatever of common action between them. Now that all is happily over, the wonder is that Poundmaker and Big Bear were the only malcontents. Canada, following in the footsteps of the Mrther Country has always treated the Indians well, and there has not been any allegation on the part of the Opposition that there was an Indiain grievance. As regarts the Half-broeds, it is clear that, even on the assumption that individuals may have been harahly dealt with, Riel personally had no grievance, and the whole question at issue was the right to certain locations. It is desirable to have it clearly understood that there was no controversy in the least justifying rebellion, because there are writers who are unpatriotic enough to try to damage the Pacific railway by representing the state e of the North-Went territories as unsatisfactory. 'The question of Half.breed claims is a large one, gnd, without enter-
ing at any length on it, we desire simply to state that we cannot admit that the Dominion Government was bound to extend to every Hall-breed in the territories those conditions which were part of a special agreement, under which certain representatives of the people of Manitoba were ompowered to treat with the Canadian Government. The Manitoba delegates were specially empowered at a meeting held for the purpose to treat with the Dominion Government, and a very important condition of the agreement was that it was strictly confined to the Province of Manitoba, the limits of which were conflued within narrow bonds. It must be sufficiently obvious that it by no means follows that every concession made by the Dominion Government to delegates from a settlement recently in rebellion should be extended to the settlers throughout the vast territories of the North-West. We have been induced to digress from the main subject under consideration, by the studious efforts made by the enemies of the Canadian Pacific Railway to represent the North-Western rebellion as likely to affect the interests of the Pacific Company injuriously. We firmly believe that the contrary will be the vesult and that the prospects of the company, and of "course the rapid colonization of the North-West, were never more satisfactory than they are at the present time.

## THE HARBOR COMMISSIONERS.

The Harbor Commissioners of Montreal proceeded on Wedneaday of last week to make their annual inspection of the works in the St. Lawrence in the steamer Cultivateur. They were accompanied by several gentlemen representing important interests, such as Senator Thibaudeau, Mr. 'Thomas, White, M.P., Mr. Curran, M.P., Mr. George Hague of the Merchants Bank, Mr. L. J. Seargeant of the Grand lrunk Railway, Mr. Joln Kerry, President Board of Trade, Mr. John Magor, President of the Corn Ex. change, Mr. Alexander Murray, Mr. C. A. Geoffrion, Mr. Guibord and others. The Harbor Engineer, Mr. Kennedy, was of the party, and the dredges in Lake St. Peter were visited; after which the steamer proceeded to the works at Cap la Roche, where the party had an opportunity of seeing the stone lifter removing boulders one of which weighed over seven tons. At lhis point a few of the parly took the Quebec boat bound to Montreal, while the others were joined by Mr. Yalin, M.P., President of the Quebec Harbor Trust, who accompanied them in an in.
spection of the works in the Harbor of Quebec, and especially the new graving dock which is approaching completion. The Commissioners and their friends were entertained at luncheon at the Isle of Orleans, and returned to Montreal on Friday morning.

We cannot discuss the sulject of the St. Lawrence improvements without a notice of the recent hostile criticism of the Hamilton Spectator on the "Unnatural Port" as it has been pleased to characterize Montreal.

It may be well to remind the Spectator of a fact which, though he must be perfectly aware of it, he is very apt to ignore. In the first Session of the first Parliament of United Canada, when a large loan of $\$ 7,500,000$ was guaranteed by the Imperial Govemment for the purpose of constructing public works, the improvement of the River St. Lawrence between Montroal and Quebec was placed in every respect on the same looting as the canals. 'The object to be attained was precisely the same, viz., to reduce the cost of transport by the $S t$ Lawrence route to the interior. 'lhere is no reason to suppose that any change in the management of the St. Jawrence river works would have been made but for a difference of opinion which arose on a question which at one lime was much disputed, between the department of Public Works and several gentlemen who were deeply interested in the St. Lawrence navigation, prominent among whom were the late Captain Armstrong and the late Hon. John Young. The question in controversy was whether the old channel through Lake St. Peter should be deepened, or whether a new one should be excavated on a straight line. The late Hon. H. II. Killaly, then at the head of the engineering departmeet of the Public Works, was a strong advocate of the straight channel, and he had the support of naval offieers of great experience. The issue of the controversy was that the completion of the work was entrusted to gentlemen connected with Montreal, but who obtained the money required for its construction from the general government. We cunnot conceive on what ground it can be maintained that the deepening of the channel of the St. Jawrence can be held to be a local work. If tolls have to be levied to meet the interest of its cost it must be obvious that they will fall on all goods imported to or exported from any part of the Dominion which pass by the St. Law" rence.

We do not propose to discuss with the Spectator, whether the St. Lawrence For-
warding Companies are or are not guilty of extortion. Those companies enjoy no monopoly, and if they are obtaining extravagant prices it might be maturally supposed that some of the enterprising Hamilton people would form a company to compete for the business. Meantime we have now two railroad companies to compete with the water, and although it is said to be "a generally accepted fact that "goods can be carried more cheaply by "water than by land carriage," it is a woll known fact that the railways have succeeded in taking a very considerable share of the traflic from Chicago to the Seaboard. The Spectator is, however, throughout inconsistent: at one time, "the natural disabilities of Montreal as an ocean port," the business incapacity and extortion of her merchants and forwarders, are responsible for what he seems to gloat over-the destruction of the St. Lawrenco trade; soon after he declares that "the enormous charges for towage and pilotage, are the chief obstacle to aniling vessels. We must console ourselves, if we cannot have sailing vessels, with the four lines of steamers that are at present doing a large share of the business of the port.
There are certain faets which we would recommend the Spectator to consider seriously: A number of Quebec mercantile houses have established agencies at Montreal, and are doing an increasing amount of their business here. It is found that in some leading articles of exportation, for instance, deals, shipments hove been made at lower rates from Montreal than could have been made from Quebec. We must not be misunderstood on the main subject of recent discussion, viz., the abrogation of certain charges on merchandize. It must be borne in mind that these are of a mixed character. Ocean fieight, internal carriage, pilot and townge charges, harbor and wharfage dues and tolls. In order to obtain traftic by the St. Lawrence route it is necessary that the aggregate charges should be as low, and if possible lower than by any competing route. There is certainly competition enough in railroad and ocean lines, and the forwarders have no monopoly. The agitation for the abolition of the canal tolls was caused solely by the action of the State of New Yorlk. The St. Lawrence river should be free, and Montreal port charges as reasonable as possible.

## TWE ST. IAWRENCE CANALS.

We regret that the Hamilton Spectator should have arrived at the conclusion
that our remarks on the forivarding busi! ness on the St. Lawrence were "unfair and unjust," although it is some consolation to receive his assurance that " the Journal is almost always fair and just." What we think unfair and unjust is for the Spectator and others to charge Montreal business men with extortion because certain forwarding companies exact raten that are considered excessive. We have not opposed the completion of the St. Lawrence Canals, and we have pointed out that if excessive rates are charged by the forwarding companies the true remedy is competition. Weapprehend, although we write with diffidence on the subject, that the real cause of high rates is the want of return cargoes. Westward bound freight is tnken very largely by the railroads, and this is the cause of high rates.

The point on which we are most at issue with the Spcetator is the improve. ment of the navigation between Montreal and Quebec. Our contemporary imagines that when the canals are completed the craft by which goods are brought to Montreal will carry them to Quebec. This, we feel assured, is a complete delu sion, and yet it is what has led to the ophosition to the deepening of the channel of the St. Lawrence, which has been long since far below the depth that the canals, even when inproved, would afford. 'Ihe truth is that the people of Montreal are as much interested in choap river freight as those in any other part of the Dominion.

## SECURITY FOR BANK CIRCU. LATION. <br> (communicated.)

In our last communication* we discursed briefly the various methods open to us for the rearrangement of our currency laws, coming to the conclusion that the National Bank system in the United States offers the most advantrges, and is most suitable for our adoption; and we endeavored to point out the present and prospective dangers of the existing system, which seem to justify and require its modification.
To this we may add some considerations as to the practical working of the National Bank system as compared with our own.

The three chief qualities which go to make a good bank note are:

## 1. Safety.

2. Convertibility, and
3. Uniformity of value throughout the country.
In other words, the holder should (1) be able to depend on getling, without fail, the amount which the bank promises to pay; (2) he should be able to get it whenever he needs and demands it; and (3) the note should possess such qualities that he can get its full faco value in any transaction anywhere in the country.
Our present issues gencrally possess the first two qualities, but they are impressed on them not by any provision of law, but by the prudent management of the ibsuing banks-a factor which camot always be relied on. 'Jhe third quality is one which they do not possess. It is manifestly of less importance than the others, but, nevertheless is of importance. I'hese three qualitios are possessed by issues under the National Bank system as fully and absolutely as is compatible with the use of a paper currency based on credit. They have at their back convertible securities specially applicable to their payment, and if these fail or shtink in value they are a claim on the remaining assets of the bank. They are receivable by all National Banks at par in payment of debls, and this secures for them uniform value throughout the country.

With regard to security, the principle is already recognised in our laws that one who is practically an involuntary creditor, through holding the circulation of a bank, is entilled to a privilege and proteclion denied to the ordinary creditors. 'The reasons for' this are well known, and need not be discussed here, but the rights of the public to special protection in this matter are of wider application.

Public policy requires and justifies the interference of the governing power for the protection of the public, wherever it in alfected by the exercise of privale rights of a general nature. laws regulating storm ongines are a familiar instance, and others will readily occur. The issue of promissory notes payable on demand, to any one who will take them and circulate them would seem in itself to be a right which any person or corposation might exercise at discretion; but experience has proved that his seemingly privato right affects in the mont vital way every department of business, and, in fact, the whole social economy.
On this ground the Government is bound to exercise due control over the isgues of currency, with the sole view of protecting the public from loss of incon-
venience. It has done so partially, but only partially, and more is required.
It has been urged that the issues are at present sufficiently secured, so much so that any further legislation in this direction is unnecessary, and therefore undesirable. But issues under the present law cannot be strictly called "secured" at all. The law provides Lhat certain assets, if they exist, shall first be applied to the payment of the notes, and thing would, no doubt, in most cases ensure ultimate payment. But there is no certainty, and at best it involves loss of another kind. Not only safety but convertibility should be provided for.
The ultimate loss is not the true measure of the idjury done. The weaker holders must realize at once, and invariably do so at a loss.
There is a minor point in this connection not unworilhy of note, which is that when a bank is in trouble the creditors near ail hand can protect themselves and socure a privileged claim by drawing bills of the Jank, when it is unable to pay a dollar of legal money. In a recent case this was done to n large extent, and it seems to be unfail to the general creditors.

The hird point, uniformity of value at all points, is of secondary importance, but it is well worth looking for. There has been but litule trouble, so far, in this respect, as Banks have been willing to bear the cost of transporting foreign bills to the points of redemption, except in the case of bills issued in the Maritime Provinces and in Manitoba and British Columbia. But this cannot continue as the country grows. There is no reason why banks in Manitoba, for example, should redeem at par bills of banks having ollices ouly in Ontario and Quebec, and they are not likely to contimue the practice.
There is one point in the National Bank system, apart from the regulations as to note issues, which may be considered here.

One of the most striking differences between this system and our own is the - very small average amount of the capital of each bank. The minimum varies from $\$ 50,000$ in towns under 6,000 inliabitants, to $\$ 200,000$ in cities of more than 50,000 inhabitants.
The merits of the two systems in this respect are dificult of comparison. A large copital gives a bank strength and prestige, ability to cope with heavy operations, and power to establish a net.
work of branches, which enable it to draw from points where capital is redundant the means of supplying the wants of places whoro capital is required. It also makes possible the employment of men of high talent and ability in the mangement.

On the other hand, the formation of small local banks undoubtedly helps forward the growth and progress of the locality. They are formed only when called for by the necessities of the place; the parties interested are usually intimately acquainted with local business men and their resources, and are therefore in a good position to julge of the prodence of assisting the various enterprises going on about them. They subserve the same ollice as branch banks in collecting and distributing capital, through their financial agents at the commercial centres, and the ollicers they employ are usually fully competent for the administration of such allairs as pass through their hands.
The great banking instiluiions which now exist will no doubt endure, but we think that, under altered regulations as to currency, the formation of small banks might be freely permition. With the security for their note issues provided for, their business would stand on a somewhat similar footing to that of private bankers at present, but wilh the great additional advantage of publicity as to their altairs, and subjection to enquiry and examination by the Government.

Such institutions would have no other effect on the financial position of the country than might be exercised by any business managed with the same amount of prudence or imprudence; while the inducements offered would draw in capital, increase competition, and extend banking facilities, to the great advantage of the mercantile community at large.

## THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The usual returns for the chartered banks will be found elsewhere. 'There is an aggregate incrense of over three millions in the liabilities, the circulation and deposits being both incrensed during the month. The Specie and Dominion notes have also been incrensed. There has been an increase of over four hundred thousand dollars in Dominion notes, party ly in the large and partly in the small denominations. On the whole, the returns do pot call for any special commont. :

## PRESENTATION TO MR. WM. M. RAMSAY

One of the most pleasing incidents for many years in tho history of life insurauce in Caunda. was the presentation made yesteriday to Mr. Wm. M. Ramsay, general manager of the Stundard Life Insurance Company. The prasentation cousisted of a haudsome portrait painting of himself, in Notman's best style, life eize, half Ligure, accompanied by an illuminated address. The presentation was made on behalf of the officers and agents of the company, acting under the Canadian Agency, by a deputation fopsisting of Ifr. Qhas. Hunter, superinten-
dent of agencies, Mr. Thos. Kerr, chief inspector; and Mr. D. M. MeGoun, chiefaccountant. It had been the intention to have the preseatation made on the oceasion of the completion of the comprany's magnificcat premises in Montreal, as a memorial of that event, but, with such wide-spread ramifications, it was fouad impossible to hear from all at an carlier date. Mr. Ramsay has long endeared himself to every agent and officer of the comprany by his uniform courtesy and kindoess, qualities which we in Montreal, who know him look, upou as a matter of course, and to which mast be attributed in a great degree that esprit de
carps which seems to belong in an eminent degree to the rank and file of this model life insurance company. The class of tonants who have secured offices in the comcompany's stately edifice is no less a testimonial to the premises thomselves than of regard for the company and its worthy manager.
Mr. Ramsay has been about 34 yenrs in the service of the Standard. Begianing, as is the custom in Scollavd, with a five yoars' apprenticeship, he was transferred at the ond of that time to the London olfice j in 1857 he came to Canada in the capacity of inspector for the company, a position for which his actuarial kuowledge eminently fitted him, and in 1862 was placod in charge of the Oanadian business. At that time the company was confined to the two Provinces of Canadr; the Canadian branch now inculdes the Maritime Provinces, Newfoundland, British Columbia, aud, to some extent, the Weat India Jblands. Mr. Ramsay's brother, Mr. A. G. Ramsay, the highly suceessful and popular general manger of tho Gauada Life Assuranco Company in Hamilton, who possessed a similar training, came to Canada, a year after his brother, to take chargo of the latter company.
Thei preseutation took place at the offices of the company this city, with a few appropriate and felicitous remarks by Mr. Chas. Hunter, the company's superintendent of ageucies, now of the Montreal office. Mr, Ramsay repliedin a feeling nanner to this evidence of the good-will of the officers and agents of the company attached to the Canadian agency, and trusted that they might long co-operate in maininining this branch of the company worthy of the name it bears.
Remarks were also made by Mesers. J. A. Gillespie, Thomas Kert; and D. M. McGoun.
The total sum assured by tho Standard is now considerably over one hundred millions of dollars; its accumulated funds invested in langland the United States and Canada ara over thirty-one railliuns; it has paid in claims in Canada alone over two millions; its Canadian deposit is nearly $\$ 200,000$; and its other Canadian iuvestments are over two millious of dollars, while its new premiges in Montreal are pointed out to strangers as one of the finest buildings in the Dominion.

The businoss of the Montreal Stock-yards Co. shows a steady increase, the total shipments in June last boing 671 carlonds (average, 20 hend per carlend), or a total of 13,420 of general stock. During the corresponding period last yenr there were 610 carloads. I'he stock come genernlly from W'eatern Ontario, and are shipped to Great Britain,-Glasgow, Liverpool, Bristol and Southmpton. On the ged iust. there were 80 catlonds, and on the 15 if 75 carlonds. The commodious yards of the company are capable of accommodating 5,000 hend of cattle, besides sheel, hoge, and horses, or a general stock of 10,000 . The tie-up stables for cattle are five, the average accommodation of which is 216 hand erch. There are 187 stalls for borses. There are not as many horses in stuck at present as there are between the spring and fitl soason trades. A new siding of receiving shoots, forty in number, is about to be constructed, and alditiounl yards brilt on the south side of the premises. At the hotel 100 persons can sit down to dimer at once.

## THD C. P. R. SJOOK YARDS.

These fine cattle-sheds, which cover over 25 acres of ground, were opened on the 9 th of September, last year, and cost considernbly over $\$ 100,000$. I'hey are admimbly planned, us to rapid facilities for shipment, ns well us sanitary arrangements and conveniences for feeding and watering. The ground being well rased, is thoroughly itrained, and the system of yard and shed drainage is perfect thronghout. The precautions against fire are all that could be desired, hand-gremades being at hana in every stable aud gard, and the corparation hydrants in every wing or block of the eectioned divisions. The ollices, embracing the superintendent's private ollice, general oflice, stock dealers' olfices, etc., are nent and well appointod. Back of the oflices is the senle-house, with a seale which is capable of sustaining a weight of 20 tons, and so wall arrmaged that 25 head of cattle can be accurately weighed erery 3 or 4 seconds. The unloading shoots, about 1150 ft. long, are 31 in number, and are constrieced so as to unload atrain of 31 cars, in $1 \frac{1}{2}$ mins. per ear. 'The feeding yards, adjoining these shonts, ench with a canacity for accommodating 1.40 head, are curered anil open; the open yurds being set aside for field-ruised stock, nud the covered ones for stull-fed. The water tronglts are well arranged with frost-proof pipes, and those for feeding are adapted to eilher moutic or hay. The tic-up stable for select cattle (fior 116 head), and the horse stable, both at the east end, are well ventinated and drained. The hog and sheep pens are similarly well arranged, and aro capable of
holding comfortably nearly ten thousand head. The general feed barn is on the siding, and bas the best possible facjlities for loading and unlonding feed-peas, corn, moulio, oats, and hay-of which it can store nearly 500 tons. The bins are rat-proof, and hold eight te nine tons each. The abbatoir is a half-mile in the rear, and a track on the main line gives divect communication from the north entrance. Th ${ }^{\mathbf{e}}$ company have sufficient spare ground to the north for trebling the sheds whenerer they may be required. Should the corporation open up Ontario St. E., back of MacDonald's factory, which wis mooted some time ago, it would maken fine appronch on the city side, where the commodious new hotel is situate. The fine breadth of the avennes throughout, (the principal one being 22 ft . and the branches 20 ft .) and the excellent numbered arrangement of the various sections, make this one of the finest stock-yards on the American continent, and great credit is due to the Cauadian Pacific Rnilway Co., not only for the completeness of their plans, but, as woll, for the thorough manner in which they bave been worked out. The business would seem to be steadily on the increase, the arerage shipments per month being 295 general stock. During the month of June there were 304 car londs. A stendy though slow development is already apparent. The cattle men, without a siagle exception, have expressed themselves as highly pleased with the company's careful arrangements and thoroughness of detail. The new hotel, which is nearly completed, is a commodious house, well planned for transient boarders, and will no donbt prove a great boon to cattlemen. The yards have been earefully planned and improved on from the finest jards in America, notably the celebrated Jeighton yards, at Boston, Mass., and, taking them altogether, we would say that thay could not bo improved.

## Tlle NEW LIFG INSURANOE AOT.

## Assented to 20 'ha Juhy 1885.

An Act to modify the application of "The Cousolidated lusurance Act, 1877." Whoreas it is expedient to amend "The Consolidated Insumbice Act, 1877 ," with regard to companies trausucting business of lite insuranco under the title of "Co-operative Life Insurance Compunies," "Mutual Benelit Associations," and the like; Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senato and House of Commons of Canada, enacis as fol-forrs:-

1. The word "company" in this Act shall be construed mad interpreted in the same manner as in the Act citod in the preamble; and a penalty imposed for contravention of this act, the nmount whereof is fixed by referenco to any section of the Act aforesaid, shall be recoverable and applicible in like manneras that im[josed by such section, all the provisions whereof shall apply to it and to the offence for which it is imposed.
2. Any company incorporated wilhin Canada, which transucts business of lifo insuranen by promising to pay, on the death of n member of such company, a sum of woney solely from the pioceeds of assessments, or ducs collected or to be collected from the members thereof for that purpose, may, at the diseretion of the Minster of Finance, on report of tho Superintendel t of Insurance, approved by, the Treasury Board, be excmpted from the operation of "the Con-
soliduted Jusurance Act, 1877," and he permitted to transnet. the business of life insurance on the conditions hereinafter specified.
3. Companies to be so exompted shall register their titles or corporate names in the office of the Superintendent of Insurance; they shatl also make attested returns of their comdition and affirs at stel times and in such form. and attested in such manner, as slonll be preseribed by the Minister of Pinance, and the Superintendent of Ingurance shall include such returns in his annual report; and any failure to make such returns, when called for by the Superintendent of Tisurance, shall subject such company, and any officer thereof, to the penalty mentioned in the twenty-sccond section of the Act hereinbefore cited.
4. The registration of a company shall cease to be vilid on the thirty-first day of March in each year, but shall be renewnde from yenr to yenr, in the discretion of the Ninister of Finance.
5. The provisions of this section shall apply to corporations or associations incorporated elsewhere than in Gamadn for the purpose of earrying on the business of life insurance upon the co-operative or assessment plan:
6. Any such corporation or association may be lirensed ly the Minister of Finance to tramenct business in Ganada upon denositing with him fifty thomsand dollars under the provisions of "T/he Consolifuled Insurance Act, 1877, and thereafler shall have the right to transect business so long as it continnes to pay its losses to the full limit named in its certifientes or policies, and has complied with all the rerguirments of the said Act and of this Act and of the Strperintendent of Jnsurance:
7. In admition to anch deposit of fifty thousand dollare, the Minister of Finance, upon the report of the Superintendent of Insurance, approved by the 'Irasary Board, may from time to time require such other and further deposit as may be recommembed in such report and so npproved, to be mule by such companies or depositen with trustees to be named by the Minister of Finance, upon such trusta as shall be determined by the Governor in Council :
8. Denth chaims shall be a first charge on all moneys tealized from asergsments nurl tho de(luction shall be made from any such death claims on any accome whatsoever:
9. No portion of any moneys received from assessments for denth claims shall be used for any expense whatever, and crery notice of hay assessment shall truly specify the canse and parpose thereof:
10. Every application, policy and certificate, isaned or nsed by miy such company in Canadn shall have printed thereon in a conspicuons place, in different colored ink and in goodsized type the following words:-"This associnion is not required by law to maintain the reserve which is required of ordinary life insurance compraites :"
11. Bvery certiliente and policy slanll contain a promise to pay the whole amomet therein mentioned ont of the denils fund of the associntion and out of any moneys realized from nssessments to be made for chat purpose, and every such association shall be bound forthwith nad from time to time to make assessments to rut amount adequate with its other arailable funds to pry all obligntions created und $r$ any sueh certificale or policy without deduction or abatement:
12. The condition embodied in the next preceding sub-section shanll bo inserted in every policy or certilicate issued or delivered to any person insured in Canada.
13. The provisions contained in sub-sections four, fire, sis, seven aud eight of the next preceding section shall also apply to any compmy (nol being such $\Omega$ company, society or association as is referred to in section twelve of this Aet) incorporated in Danada and caryying on the business of life insurance upon the co-operative or assessmont plan.
14. No condition, stipulation or proviso modifying or impairing the effect of any policy of lite insurance issued after the first day of Jannary, one thousand eight humbred nud eighty-six, by any conmpany dofng iusiness within Canada under the atithority of the Parliament of Gamada slall be good or valid unless the same is get out in full on the face or unless the same ig se
back of the policy.
15. No policy or certificnte shall contain or bave endorsed upon it any condition providing that such policy or certificate shall be avoided by reason of any statement contained in the application therefor being untrue, unless such condition is limited to cases in which such slatement is material to the contract.
16. No company slall carry on within Uanada any business of the nature described in the second section of this Act, without being licensed under the Act above cited, or being registered under this Act, and the words "assessment system" shall be printed in lavge type at the head of every policy and every application for the same, and also in every citcular and advertisement issued or userl in Canada: and any director, manager, agent or other ollicer of a company, so doing busincss without being licensed or registered, and any person who transacts any insurance business on behalf of any unlicensed company, and on behalf of any unlicensed company, and
any company neglecting to print the said words as aforesaid, and any director, manager, agent or other officer of a company or any other person transacting business on behalf of such company, circulating or using any policy or application, circular or advertisement, not having the words "nssessment system" printed thereon, as aforesaid, slall be linble to the penalty mentioned in the thirteentls section of the Act bereinbefore cited.
17. In the case of any contract entered into, or any certificate of membership or policy of insurance issued by my company, before the passing of this Act, assessments may be made and collected, and claims paid, and all business connected therewith transacted without any penalty being incurred.
18. In every policy issued by a foreign company licensed under this Act iu favor of $\Omega$ resident of Canada, a clause shall be either embodied thercin or endorsed thereon, to the effect that an action to enforce the obligation of such policy may be validly taken into nny court of competent jurisdiction in the Province wherein the policy holder residesor last resided before bis decease.
12 Neitber "The Consolidated Insurance Act, 1877," nor this Aet shall apply to any society or associntion of persons for frateman, benevolent, industrial or religious purposes, among which purposes shall be tho insurance of the lives of the members thereof exclusively; or to any association for the purpose of life insurance, formed in connection with such society or organization and exclusivels from its members, and insuring the lives of such nembers exclusively:
19. Any society or associntion which is declared by this section to be exempt from the applicntion of "The Consolidated Insurance Act, 1877" and of this Act, may nevertheless apply to the Minister of Finance to be allowed to avail itself of the provisions of this Act, and upon euch application being assented to, such society or associntion shall cease to be so exempt by virtue of this section.

## ANNUAL DIYIDENDS vs. DFFERRED DIVIDEND PERIODS.

## T'o the Editor Jourmal of Commerce.

The bistory of life insurance in the United Stater furnishes much food for reffection. Starting as a distinctive branch of legitimate
insurance about fifty years ago, it has attainad gigantic dimensions, und lins become one of the most important interests in the business world and ceriainly leares a greater impression of grod thon the social nad moral economy than almost any other branch of business enterprise.

Its birth was among uncongenial surroundings. [ts lirst utteminces were received with murked distrust and an alniost unconquerable prejudice prevailed against it. Bigotry, intolerance, majndice, mbeliof and indiference songht to relard its growth and prevent its natural development. Absurd misunderstandinga as to the legitimacy of its mission, created for it powerful cuemies who tried to forbid its popas har aceeptance and attucked it ruthlessly. Its friends were few and fir between, and even as they increased nut multiplied, the of ten mistaken policy of its advocrtes well-nigh threw the strugerling system into the hands of its enemies, mad choked of the growing enthusiasm of its well-wishers and admirers.
For some twenly years or more it was a struggle for life or denth. Thoso who guided the course of this growing institution knerr that in spite of their errors of omission and conmission they were advancing a good worts, and would some diny succed in the evangelization of the roild to an acknowled gment of its prineiples. They were convinced that they cond and would solve the most intricate social and moral problem of the nge. Guided by the purest, noblest and most elevating motives, sceking in a rational mamer to eheck the growis of poverty and distress, deterwined that no discouragements and no failures should permanently check their onward conrse, they have persevered nutil ono by one their worst enemies bave been vonquished.
Birotry has been conquered by enligutened intelligence; intolernuce has been forced to submit to the needs of the public; prejudice has given place to confidence; unbelief bas succumbed to convincing rhetoric and the unanswprable logic of actum experience; success has rewarled the eflorts of those who stood stendfistly by their honest convictions.
Now, when life insurnuce has dwelt for balf a century among nis, its benefits are conceded by alt men of iuteligence. The scientific and beneficient truths upon which it is fonnded aro home triths to us. We regard him who insares not his life for the protection of his dependents as one living on a very low plane of intelligence, and we deem him lacking in mental fores and moral purpose.
Who ean chronicle the ups and downs-- the changes and vieissitudes-the progressions and retrogressions that have been safely passed through before this great end was achieved, He who enn record, and herald to the world, the true history of Life Insurance must indeed lave a facite pen. Nevertheless we hope somo Iny to see the wonderfit growth fitly recorded; rud then, those who have given it the energy of their lives can peruse the pages of the yecord and fight over rgain in imagination-as so many would be willing to do in reality-the batiles they linve so hurdy won.

I have already referred to the errors of omission and commission that helped to retard the growth of the system. Those were ineritable to bystem that was new, untried, distrusted, and always more or less surrounded by an atmorphere of mystery.

The illiberal forms of coniract that exacted an entire furfeiture of all equity in the erent of lapse. The irksome restrictions to resideneo and trarel. The ruling out of occupations that are not regarded now as specially liazardous. These aud many other troublos wrought their uicasure of evil; but none were so fatal as the unrestrained and unscrupulous competition thut threw sixty or serenty companies into the field to scramble over and fight for businong that was not sufficient to support haif of their number. Many companies were started simply becruse the prosperity of the few crented a luit for profit. Not being able to secure busincss except at enomions cost they died for lack of nourishment, involving a comparatively smail
number of persons in loss, but nevertheless throwing a cloud of suspicion and distrust over those that remained. If has taken years of those that remained. Ih has taken years of some lingering mists of doubt hover aromad H.

Fach and eycry one of the many questions that havo been in turas the problems of their day, would bear boing earefally and conscientionsly amalyod, but ome limited space will confine us to the consitieration of one of them only.
We select the guestion of "immediate" or "deforred" dividends.
The unrestrained and ingudicions rush of competition eanser the adopsion of a plan that gumanteed a yenrly distribution of surphas carnings, Those compaties that had been acemstrmed to a tricmaial or quinguemand dividem thonght it best to give way to the demand for annmal necountings and distributions, and-as subsequentexpertence has shown - it was a great misfortume.

Now, afler the lapse of years, the inexpediency of this collse is becoming apparent, and a return to old methods is debated by some, and decided upon by others.

We wish to consider the canses that lend to the ammionment of ammal divilends, und inquire into their wishom orxu-wistom.
It is not many years since the fife Insurance Compries of the Uniled Sintes were earning seven per cent-or eren moreupon their invested assets. Dhey loaned thier ncenmulations in the dearest murkets. They were not ton exacting in the mater of requiring "rritit-edged" security; but were alwoys fairly conseientions in the degree of jentonsy with which they guarded the security of the funds that constituted the pledre of their ability to carry out their contraets to tho lelter.
Such splendid securities as Government Bonds yielded six to seven per cent. First mortgages on Eastern property yiolded seven per cent-and on Westeri proneriy from eight to twelve per eent. Sinte, Conity, and Oity Bonds of hisfly approred issueswere prolitable iuvestments. Railroad Bonds were flucuating and uncertain in their values, but were generally sate and desirnble investments and some. times wonderfilly profitable. With this wide tield of choice it was not dificult to earn a arge surplus over atad above the four or four and a half per cent aceamulation upon the reserve values of poliey' liabilities; and of comsen good fund was atwas on hand fore distribution in the form of manal dividends.

The first blow struck at this era of prosperity, Was when some of the Dastern Slate Legisintures paged haws specifying in precisely what forms of securities theirlife jnsurance and fire Insamace Companies cond invest their funds. Geographicsi limits were also formed that rendered investments in even the choierst of improved Nestern properties unlawful. It constitutes an offence agatinst the law to hold any forms of securities not embraced within the very narrow limits thus fixed. Many choice chanuels of highy rempnerative investments are thus cut off; atid it is tot only the Insurance Gompmies and their policy-bodders that suffer by these restrictions.
The compmatively undeveloped industries of rast sections of the conntry, are to some extent sufferiate by reason ol these cast-iron restrictions. The large Insurance Corporations of the bust would be glat to have pheir moner used by Westerm men if they coukd logally take mortgages on Western properties as ralid and hawill securties-hut they camot do so.
After the sprecifiention of insestments, came the redactions of legal mates of interist; the refunditig of Bonded Debts nt much lower rates of fiterest-so thin at the preseint time it is more dinicult for minsurance Company to onm tive per cant than it formedy was to earn seven or even eight per cent. When reserve linbilities are based ou fomr and a binlf per cent the dilterence between earuing live prer cent gnd seren jer cent means the "wiping out of eighty per cent ot' tian puetion of the dividend tund that is derived from interest earnings of
the reserve." This source of profit was moreover tho grentest-the most leginmate for division-and the most reliable of any of the factors that enter into the gencral computation of surphus.
