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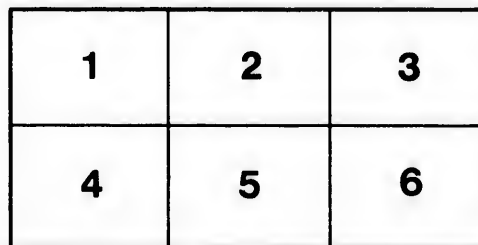
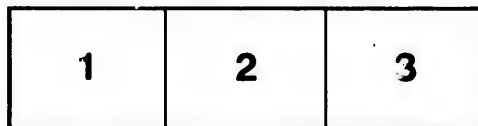
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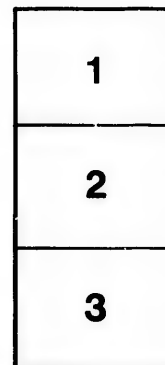

DISTRICT No. 1.—County of Charlotte and its Islands. Inspector, Capt. Pratt, of the Cruiser "Dream."

DISTRICT No. 2.—Counties of Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland. Inspector, R. C. Chipman, Dorchester.

DISTRICT No. 3.—Counties of Albert, St. John, Kings, Queens, Sunbury, York, Carleton and Victoria. Inspector, David Morrow, Oromucto.

Light Houses in Bay of Fundy.

CAPE SABLE, N. S.—Revolving white light on Cape; bright 15s., dark 21s. Latitude 45d. 23m. 19s.; longitude, 65d. 37m. 11s. Octagonal white tower, 53 feet above high water. Visible 12 miles in clear weather.

CAPE SABLE, W. E.—Latitude 43d. 27m. 17s.; longitude 65d. 39m. 10s. The light is fixed white, elevated 42 feet above high water mark, and should be visible from all points seaward 11 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of small size. The lighthouse is a square wooden tower, painted white, and is 36 feet high from its base to vane on the lantern.

Steam Fog Whistle on southern point of Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs, and snow storms, a blast of ten seconds duration each minute, with an interval of fifty seconds between each blast.

SEAL ISLAND, N. S.—South point, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile inland, latitude 43d. 23m. 34s. N.; longitude, 66d. 0m. 52s. W. Fixed white light, white octagonal tower, 98 feet above high water mark. Visible 18 miles. The Blonde Rock lies S. by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from lighthouse. A fog whistle, near lighthouse, during fogs and snowstorms, sounds in each minute a blast of five seconds duration, and after an interval of five seconds, gives another blast of five seconds, with an interval of forty-five seconds.

CAPE FORCHU, N. S.—Flash white light on E. Cape, S point, latitude 43d. 47m. 28s. N. Longitude, 66d. 9m. 21s. W. Light $\frac{1}{2}$ min., dark $\frac{1}{2}$ min. Tower, octagonal, vertical stripes, red and white. Fog whistle on W. side. Sounds in fogs and snow storms 10 seconds in every minute. Visible 18 miles.

CAPE ST. MARY, N. S.—East side of Bay, latitude N. 44d. 14m. 20s.; longitude W. 66d. 12m. 4s. Flash light, alternate red and white, at intervals of 30 seconds. White octagonal tower, 103 feet above high water mark.

BRIAR ISLAND, N. S.—N. W. point, latitude N. 44d. 14m. 57s.; longitude W. 66d. 23m. 30s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Octagonal white lighthouse, 92 feet above high water mark.

Steam Fog Whistle on N. W. of Briar Island, south side of lighthouse, sounds during thick and foggy weather three blasts of 4 seconds duration, with intervals of 4 seconds between them in each minute.

BOAR'S HEAD, N. S.—50 feet from edge of cliff, on S. entrance of Petite Passage; latitude N. 44d. 24m. 16s.; longitude W. 66d. 13m. 0s. Revolving red and white alternately, every minute. Lighthouse white, square, 70 feet above high water mark. Visible 14 miles.

POINT PRIM, N. S.—S. point of entrance to Annapolis Basin; latitude N. 44d. 41m. 17s.; longitude W. 67d. 47m. 20s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Vertical red and white striped square tower, 76 feet above high water mark.

Fog Whistle on Prim Point sounds 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

PORT WILLIAM, N. S.—Marshall Cove, South Shore, latitude N., 44d. 56m. 52s.; longitude W., 65d. 16m. 0s. Two fixed white vertical lights, visible 10 miles, 20 feet apart. White, square, 60 and 57 feet above high water, lantern on top of dwelling, lower light in bow window visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

LIGHT HOUSES.

MARGARETVILLE, N. S.—On extremity of Point, S. shore, latitude N., 45d. 2m. 57s.; longitude W., 65d. 40m. Two red lights, visible 8 miles. Lighthouse, horizontal white and black stripes, square, visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

BLACK ROCK, N. S.—South Shore, latitude N., 45d. 10m. 0s.; longitude W., 64d. 46m. 0s. Fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Square white light-house, 45 feet above high water mark.

Fog Whistle on extreme point of Cape D'Or, on the opposite side of channel from Black Rock; sounds in thick weather twice in each minute, each blast being of 6 seconds duration, with intervals of 24 seconds between.

CAPE ENRAGE, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude N., 44d. 35m. 34s.; longitude 64d. 6m. 55s. Fixed white light, visible 15 miles. White square tower, 120 feet above high water mark.

A Steam Fog Whistle, 150 feet N. E. from lighthouse, sounds during thick weather four seconds in each minute; will probably be heard in calm weather 10 miles, and in stormy weather from three to five miles.

QUACO, N. B.—A new Lighthouse Tower has been erected upon the pitch of the Cape at West Head, Quaco, to replace that on the rock off Quaco. Latitude N., 45d. 19m. 30s.; longitude W., 65d. 32m. 0s. It is a revolving white catoptric light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every 20 seconds. It is elevated about 110 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 10 miles from all points of approach seaward. The building is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower 40 feet high from its base to the vane on the lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached.

This light, which will be a general coast light, as well as a guide to St. Martin's Harbor, is distant 1,200 feet N. W. by W. from the site of the old lighthouse.

A Fog Bell in a framed tower on the lighthouse block strikes every 12 seconds during thick and foggy weather and snow storms. Under favorable circumstances it should be heard two or three miles, and in stormy weather or against the wind about a mile.

The Bell Buoy moored off Quaco Ledges, in the Bay of Fundy, having disappeared from its station, has been temporarily replaced by an iron can buoy painted red.

The Bell Buoy moored off the point of the Lighthouse Ledge, off West Quaco Head, at the entrance of Quaco Harbor, is now in position.

The Spar Buoy moored off the south end of Quaco Shoal in Quaco Harbor has been replaced by an iron can buoy.

ST. MARTIN'S HEAD FOG ALARM.—Latitude N., 45d. 26m. 10s.; longitude W., 65d. 11m. 25s. The Horn, which is located on the summit of the Head, will, during thick weather, sound blasts of 14 seconds duration, with intervals of 48 seconds between the blasts. The engine house is an oblong wooden building with a pitched roof, and is painted white.

GRINDSTONE ISLAND, N. B.—On west part of island, latitude N., 45d. 43s.; longitude W., 64d. 37m. Fixed bright light, visible 12 miles. White square tower, 60 feet above high water.

Fog Syren N. E. of light, sounds four blasts every minute.

CAPE SPENCER, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude N., 45d. 12m. 30s.; longitude W., 65d. 54m. 9s. Revolving red and white alternately, at intervals of 45 seconds. Visible 20 miles. White square building, with tower 207 feet above high water. Partridge Island light by compass N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., northerly distance being 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from light to light.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND, ST. JOHN HARBOR.—Latitude N., 45d. 14m. 20s. longitude W., 66d. 3m. 20s. Fixed white light, visible 17 miles. Tower vertical red and white stripes. 119 feet above high water. Steam Whistle on island sounds for 10 seconds in every minute. A Bell Buoy near east side of Partridge Island Reef.

NEGRO POINT.—On end of Government Breakwater. Latitude 45d. 14m. 25s. Red.

ST. JOHN HARBOR.—End of Bar. Latitude N., 45d. 15m. 10s.; longitude 66d. 3m. 40s. Fixed white light. Visible 10 miles. Lighthouse, vertical black and white stripes, 85 feet above high water.

DIPPER HARBOR.—On the southern point of Campbell's Island, in the County of Saint John. Latitude N., 45d. 5m. 30s.; longitude 66d. 25m. 0s.

The light is fixed white, and elevated 30 feet above high water mark, and is shown from a square red tower, red roof, and will show in Bay S. by W. to S. E., and should be visible 6 miles between these points.

LEPREAUX.—On Point. Latitude N. 45d. 3m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 27m. 39s. Two fixed white lights. Visible 15 miles. 9 yards apart. 81 and 53 feet above high water mark. Tower octagonal, striped horizontally red and white. Fog Whistle on Point in thick weather sounds twice each minute, first giving a blast of five seconds duration with an interval of five seconds; then a blast of five seconds duration, with an interval of 45 seconds to complete the minute.

Split Rock Automatic Buoy has been removed from its former position, to a station near the shore. Latitude N. 45d. 7m. 15s.; longitude W. 66d. 13m. 55s. The buoy is painted black, is moored in 30 fathoms water, and in its present position will serve as a guide into Musquash Harbor.

Musquash Lighthouse bears North, distant $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and Split Rock N. E. from the Buoy.

An Automatic Signal Buoy, sounding a ten inch whistle, in 23 fathoms water, S. S. W. 1 nautical mile of Point Lepreaux Lighthouse, on the New Brunswick coast of the Bay of Fundy. Latitude N. 45d. 2m. 30s.; longitude W. 66d. 27m. 45s. The following bearings are given from the buoy: Split Rock Whistling Buoy, E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.; Head Harbor Lighthouse, W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.; Wolves reef, W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

SOUTH WEST WOLF ISLAND.—On S. E. Point of the Island. Latitude N. 44d. 56m. 30s. longitude W. 66d. 44m. 10s. White revolving light every $\frac{1}{4}$ minutes. Visible 17 to 20 miles. House, white, square, wooden, 111 feet above high water.

BEAVER HARBOR.—Fixed white light. Visible 10 miles. Latitude N. 45d. 3m. 45s.; longitude 66d. 44m. W. Tower, square wooden building, painted white, 45 feet above high water.

BLISS ISLAND.—West end of Island, south side of western entrance to Bliss Harbor. Latitude N. 45d. 1m. 15s. Fixed red light. Visible 12 miles. White square wooden building, 45 feet above high water.

PEA POINT—(L'ETANG).—White lighthouse. Fixed green light. Latitude 45d. 2m. 30s. N.; longitude 66d. 53m. W.

LETETE PASSAGE.—Fog Trumpet on Mascabin Point. Latitude 45d. 2m. 20s. N. longitude 66d. 53m. 30s. W. During thick weather, fogs and snowstorms, the trumpet will sound blasts of seven seconds duration, with intervals of thirty seconds between them. It can be heard two or three miles against, and six to seven with the wind. The building is square, with a coal shed attached, and is painted white.

LUBEC NARROWS LIGHT.—A Lighthouse erected on Mulholland's Point, Campobello Island, on the eastern side of Lubec Narrows, in the County of Charlotte to guide through the Narrows. Latitude N. 44d. 51m. 47s. longitude W. 66d. 58m. 50s. The light is a fixed white, elevated 60 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 13 miles from N. N. E. round by S. to S. S. E. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric of small size. The building is a square wooden tower painted white, surmounted by an iron lantern, and is 44 feet in height from the ground to the vane on the lantern.

HEAD HARBOR (Campobello Island).—North Point. Latitude N. 44d. 57m. 30s.; longitude W. 66d. 53m. 52s. Fixed white light. Visible 13 miles in clear weather. Octagonal tower, white, with red cross, 64 feet above high water.

Fog Trumpet at the North Point of Head Harbor, on the Island of Campobello, in the County of Charlotte. Latitude N. 44d. 57m. 30s.; longitude W. 66d. 53m. 52s. During thick weather, fogs, and snowstorms, the trumpet will sound blasts of 8 seconds duration, with intervals of 35 seconds between them.

SWALLOW TAIL.—On N. E. part of Grand Manan. Fixed white light. Visible 18 miles. Latitude N. 44d. 45m. 48s. longitude W. 66d. 44m. 2s. Lighthouse white octagonal wooden building, 148 feet above high water. A Steam Fog Whistle on extreme N. W. Head of Grand Manan, 80 feet above high water. Sounds in thick weather three blasts of 4 seconds duration in each minute, with an interval of 16 seconds between each blast.

OLD PROPRIETOR LEDGE.—Spindle Beacon, painted red, on S. E. of

Grand Manan Island. Latitude 44d. 13m. 10s. longitude 66d. 40m. 0s. Visible 8 or 10 miles in clear weather.

SOUTH WEST HEAD.—(Grand Manan Light).—Gull Cliff, at the South West Head of Grand Manan Island. Latitude N. 44d. 36m. 0s. longitude W. 66d. 54m. 16s. The light, a revolving catoptric one, makes a complete revolution in two minutes, showing three white flashes and three red flashes with intervals of eclipse of 20 seconds. It is elevated 200 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be visible for a distance of 24 miles. The building consists of a square wooden tower with dwelling attached, painted white, and 43 feet high from base to vane.

GRAND HARBOR.—Fish Fluke Point, on the eastern side of Grand Harbor, Island of Grand Manan. Latitude N. 44d. 40m. 2s. longitude W. 66d. 58m. 5s. The light is a fixed white catoptric, elevated 40 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles from south around by West to northeast. The building is of wood painted white, and consists of a square tower 32 feet high from base of building to base of lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached.

GANNET ROCK.—A fixed and flash light on rock. Visible twelve miles. Latitude 44d. 0m. 38s.; longitude 66d. 47m. 0s. Octagonal tower, striped vertically black and white alternately.

Fixed light, 45 seconds,

— 60 seconds.

A gun will be fired once every hour during the continuance of fog, snowstorm, or other thick weather. Dangerous rocks extend 4 miles eastward of lighthouse.

MACHIAS ISLAND.—On Island two lights, W. by N. ½ E., and E. by S. ½ S., and 56½ yards apart. Fixed white, can be seen 15 miles in clear weather. House white. 58 feet E. and 54 feet W. from high water.

MOOSE-A-BEG.—(Am.)—On Mistake Island, west entry to Bay of Fundy. Flash white light, 30 seconds interval. House brick, whitewashed. 65 feet above high water. Latitude N. 44d. 28m. 27s. longitude W. 67d. 31m. 55s.

PETITE MANAN.—South side of Island. Fixed white, varied by white flashes. Time between flashes 2 minutes. Visible 17 miles. Tower, grey granite, natural color. Latitude N. 45d. 22m. 2s. Longitude W. 66d. 5m. 51s.

A Fog Whistle giving two blasts of 5 seconds each per minute. Interval between blasts 8 seconds and 42 seconds.

LITTLE RIVER.—On an island at the entrance of the river. A fixed white light varied by flashes every 90 seconds, 40 feet above high water, visible 11 miles.

RICHBUCTO HEAD LIGHT.—This is a fixed white light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet from base to vane, painted white, and stands in latitude 46d. 39m. 40s. N.; longitude 64d. 43m. 30s. W. of Greenwich.

RICHBUCTO HARBOR RANGE LIGHTS.—Two range light towers, erected by the Government of Canada close to the present day-beacons upon the South Beach, at the entrance of the Richibucto River, Kent Co., N. B. The front building is on the outside of the bank. It is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower, painted white, 33 feet high to vane on lantern, with dwelling attached. Latitude N. 46d. 42m. 45s.; longitude W. 64d. 46m. 10s. The light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 40 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles. The back tower is distant W. by S. ½ S. 306 feet from the front one. It is an open framed square tower, 43 feet high to vane on lantern, and is also painted white. The light is fixed red, catoptric, elevated 44 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles. Those two lights are intended to replace the day-beacons, and in one lead through the channel over the bar at the mouth of the river.

RESTIGOUCHE RIVER RANGE LIGHTS.—The buildings are all square towers, built of wood, painted white, they are 22 feet in height from base to top of ventilator, and shows fixed white catoptric lights.

1. Dalhousie Range Lights, Restigouche County, New Brunswick.—The front tower is placed on the public wharf. The light is elevated 24 feet

above high water mark. Latitude N. 48d. 4m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 22m. 20s. The back tower is placed on Montgomery Island. The light is elevated 27 feet above high water mark.

2. Campbellton Range Lights, Restigouche County, New Brunswick.—The front tower is placed on a pier beside the railway wharf; the light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark. Latitude N. 48d. 0m. 50s.; longitude W. 66d. 39m. 40s. The back tower is placed on Mr. Moffat's wharf. The light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark.

HAY ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.—Two Range Lights have been erected upon Hay Island, Miramichi Bay, Northumberland County, N. B., to enable vessels, in seeking shelter, to clear the point of the shoal off the east end of the island. Latitude N. 47d. 14m. 19s.; longitude W. 65d. 3m. 40s. The front light is fixed white catoptric, exhibited from a lantern hoisted on a mast 15 feet high. It is elevated 23 feet above high water, and should be visible 10 miles. At the base of the mast is a small shed painted red. The back light is distant 210 feet from the front one. It is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 20 feet above high water, and should be visible 11 miles. The building is a square wooden tower, 21 feet high from base to vane, and is painted white.

BUCTOUCHE RANGE LIGHTS.—Two Range Lights, erected upon Dixon's Point, on the south side of Buctouche Harbor, Kent County, N. B., to guide vessels into Buctouche Harbor. The front building is situated on the Point near the water's edge, and close to the previously existing front beacon. Latitude N. 46d. 27m. 40s.; longitude W. 64d. 38m. 50s. The light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 36 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 11 miles in the direction of the range. The tower is a square wooden one, 30 feet high from the base to the vane on the top of the lantern, and is painted white. The back range light is distant 1,050 feet N. W. by W. from the front one; the building is similar, 34 feet high, and shows a light also similar, elevated 41 feet above high water, and visible 12 miles.

Two Range Lights, erected upon Church or Indian Point, on the north side of Buctouche Harbor, in the County of Kent, N. B. The front light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 23 feet above high water mark, and should be visible nine miles in line of range. Latitude N. 46d. 29m. 35s.; longitude W. 64d. 40m. 30s. It is situated close to the road which runs along the shore from Buctouche Village to Church or Indian Point. The back range light building is 1,940 N. N. W. ¼ W. from the front one. The light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 53 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles in the direction of the range. Both buildings are small square towers, 23 feet high from the ground to the tops of the roof, painted white with red roofs. The two lights in range lead into the harbor through the deepest channel, clear of all obstructions, from the line of range from the Dixon's Point Lights to the point where the channel turns abruptly to the westward to enter the Buctouche River.

FOX ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.—The Beacon Lights on the north-west end of Fox Island, Miramichi Bay, N. B., have been moved, and a third light added, and the lights as now arranged are in operation. All show fixed white lights, which should be visible 8 miles, from lanterns hoisted on mast. At the base of each mast is a shed painted white.

One of the lights is situated within 100 feet of the most northerly point of island. It is elevated 50 feet above high water mark, and has a post 40 feet high. Latitude N. 48d. 8m. 5s.; longitude W. 65d. 2m. 20s.

The second light is distant 1,051 feet S. E. ¼ S. from the first named, and will be 46 feet above high water mark, with a post 38 feet high.

The third light is distant 953 feet S. W. from the first named, and will be 36 feet above water mark, with a post 28 feet high.

The first and second in line range N. W. ¼ W, into the old Horseshoe Channel.

The first and third in line range N. E. through Portage Island Channel.

The second and third in line range W. by N., leading to the upper buoy of Horseshoe Shoal.

CAPE JOURIMAIN, STRAITS OF NORTHUMBERLAND.—Latitude 46d. 10m. 0s. N.; longitude 63d. 51m. 0s. W. Visible from all points of approach from S. E. around by N. to W. The lighthouse is an octagonal wooden

pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the lighthouse.

GOOSE LAKE, MISCOU ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.—A revolving white light, elevated 40 feet above high water, and showing a flash every minute, is exhibited at this lighthouse, and is seen at a distance of upwards of ten miles. The lighting apparatus has two faces, and makes a complete revolution every two minutes. The tower is a square wooden building, 28 feet high, with a dwelling attached, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

HERON ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.—This light is a fixed white light, elevated 66 feet above high water, is visible from all points seaward, and in clear weather is seen at a distance of 12 miles. The tower is a square wooden building 20 feet high, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

CARAQUET ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.—Square tower on keeper's dwelling. White.

MISCOU FOG WHISTLE.—A Steam Fog Whistle has been erected on Miscou Island, at the entrance of the Bay des Chaleurs. The whistle is sounded twice in each minute.

SHEDIAC BEACON LIGHT.—Two lights on Point du Chene wharf, in the harbor of Shediac. Latitude 46d. 14m. 20s. N.; longitude 64d. 31m. 0s. W.

POINT ESCUMINAC LIGHT.—This lighthouse is situated in Miramichi Bay. North latitude 47d. 4m. 30s.; west longitude 64d. 50m. 30s. It is a fixed bright light, elevated 70 feet above high water. A third order French dioptric lighting apparatus has been placed on this tower, which is visible for 25 miles.

BAY DU VIN ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.—Two range lights are erected on the west end of Bay Du Vin Island, Miramichi Bay, County of Northumberland, N. B., to enable vessels, seeking shelter, to clear the point of the shoal lying off the island. The front light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 30 feet above high water mark, and should be visible in line of range 10 miles. Latitude N. 47d. 5m. 20s.; longitude W. 65d. 7m. 5s. The back light is distant 1,123 feet easterly from the front one. It is also fixed white, catoptric, is elevated 42 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 11 miles. Both lights are hoisted on masts, with sheds painted red at their bases; the front mast being 25 feet and the back one 30 feet above the ground.

MISCOU ISLAND LIGHT.—This lighthouse is situated on Birch Point. North latitude 48d. 1m. 0s.; west longitude 64d. 50m. 33s. It is a fixed red light, elevated 79 feet above high water.

MIRAMICHI RIVER.—Lighthouse on Portage Island. Fixed white light, elevated — feet above high water.

Two beacon lights on Preston's beach, about five miles above Escuminac Light. Two beacon lights on Oak Point. Two beacon lights at Grant's. Fixed white lights. Visible 10 miles.

Lighthouse at Shippegan Gully has been removed from Taylor's Island on the southwest of Alexander's Point, on the northeast point of the entrance to the Gully. Latitude N. 45d. 43m. 30s.; longitude W. 64d. 39m. 25s. The light is a fixed white catoptric light, elevated 23 feet above high water, and should be visible 11 miles from all points seaward. The tower consists, as heretofore, of a square wooden building, 30 feet high from base to vane on lantern, painted white. A small light, consisting of a lantern, hoisted on a pole, to show also a fixed white light has been established 434 feet S. W. by W. from the main light. It is elevated 22 feet above high water, and should be seen 9 miles in the direction of the range. The two lights range with the buoy on the outside of the bar at the entrance of the Gully.

Time for Going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Time Ball.

The Time Ball on Northern Tower of the Custom House building will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sundays excepted at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full height; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer, keeping correct Greenwich time, should then show 5h 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a chronometer may be ascertained no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at St. John should compare their Chronometers with the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45d. 10m. 42s. North; Longitude in time 4h. 24m. 15s. West of Greenwich.

Any shipmaster entering this port, keeping a meteorological register, who may be desirous of having the accuracy of their barometers verified, can do so by comparison at the Observatory, Customs building.

Double wagon, or other vehicle for hauling purposes, with horse-load and one man, such load not to exceed four thousand pounds weight, 12 cents; same as last mentioned without load, 12 cents; if load over prescribed weight, in any case, an added rate for every additional one hundred pounds weight of one cent. Barrel, 2 cents; bag, containing 2 bushels, 2 cents; firkin, keg, or box of like size, 1 cent; cask of lime, 4 cents; pipe, hogshead or puncheon, 15 cents; for every fifty pounds weight, and not exceeding one hundred pounds weight, of iron, steel, or other article, not hereinafter enumerated, 1 cent; if above one hundred pounds weight, for each additional fifty pounds weight, 1 cent. All other things and articles not hereinafter enumerated, to be in proportion to the foregoing scale of rates.

No load of greater weight than four tons weight, including the vehicle on which the load is carried, shall be permitted to go upon the floats or approaches to the ferry, or upon any ferry boat; and there shall be no privilege for the carriage, by ferry, of any weight greater than four tons in any load.

"Mean Time" is that shown by a well-regulated clock, and differs from "Apparent Time," or that exhibited by a Sun-dial by what is known as "The Equation of Time." When the Sun is *Slow* this is to be subtracted from "Mean (or Clock) Time," and when the Sun is *Fast*, to be added to "Mean Time" to get the "Apparent Time."

TABLE FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

This table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near he truth as to be seldom found to fail.

The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

LETTER CARRIERS' DELIVERY.

Letters and Papers for this delivery should be addressed to STREET and NUMBER.

Change of Residence should be promptly notified to the Postmaster in WRITING.

Two deliveries daily, commencing at 8 a. m. and 3 45 p. m.

All letters mailed at the St. John Post Office within fifteen minutes of the hour fixed for morning and evening deliveries will be dispatched by such deliveries.

Letters not bearing the name and number of street, addressed to parties whose address may be known to the Carriers, will be delivered by them.

STREET LETTER BOXES.

The Street and Hotel Letter Boxes in the Cities of St. John and Portland are visited daily (Sunday excepted) at 12.00 noon, and

Flower Pots and Bariole Ware, Spittoons, St. John, N. B.

(Saturday excepted) at 10.30 p. m.; also in the business parts of the city at 3.00 p. m., daily, (Sunday excepted).

MERCHANTS' BOXES.

Rent of small box \$4, and of large box \$6 a year.

Though every effort will be made in sorting letters, to place them in the boxes, when the party addressed is known to have a box, the Postmaster does not hold himself responsible for this always being done; the primary rules being that all letters bearing the number of the house and name of street go there by letter carrier.

An order to place in a box letters belonging to another person than the owner of the box cannot be recognized, unless such letters are addressed to the care of the box or its owner.

Box holders would facilitate the work of sorting by requesting correspondents to add the box number to the address of their letters.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

FIRST CLASS MATTER.

Post Cards.—Dominion and United States, 1c. Great Britain and other Postal Union Countries, 2c. *Reply Post Cards for use within the Dominion will be issued at two cents each.* Canadian one cent Post Cards can be forwarded to the United Kingdom if a 1c. Postage Stamp be affixed.

Drop Letters.—City, (including districts heretofore known as Carleton, Portland, and Indiantown.) 2c. per ounce.

Mail Letters.—From one place in Canada to another, and between Canada and the United States, 3c. per ounce; between Canada and Newfoundland, and between Canada and Great Britain, 5c. per half oz

Insufficiently paid letters, from one place in Canada to another, on which at least a partial prepayment has been made, are forwarded charged with double the deficient postage.

Letters addressed to places in the United States must be prepaid one full rate (3 cents), otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Legal and Commercial Papers.—The postage on Legal and Commercial Papers for the United States, Great Britain and all Foreign Postal Union countries, where the letter rate does not exceed 5 cents per half ounce, is 5 cents for the first 10 ounces or less, and 1 cent for each additional 2 ounces. For countries where the 10 cent per half ounce letter rate rules, the charge is 5 cents for the first 4 ounces, and 2 cents for each additional 2 ounces. These papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter or Parcel Post rates; but Deeds and Insurance Policies are permitted to be sent at the Book Post rate of 1 cent per 2 ounces.

SECOND CLASS MATTER.

Canadian Newspapers, &c.—Newspapers and Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, when issued not less frequently than once a month, and posted from the office of publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, resident elsewhere than at the place of publication, are FREE; but copies addressed to Great Britain, and all specimen copies, as well as all publications issued less frequently than once a month are required to be prepaid at the rate of 1 cent per pound, or fraction of a pound.

Local Newspapers and Periodicals, *not exceeding one ounce in weight*, are eligible for City delivery by Letter Carriers on the prepayment by stamp of $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each; when exceeding 1 ounce, and less than 4 ounces, prepayment by stamp of 1 cent will be necessary.

THIRD CLASS MATTER.

Transient Newspapers, &c.—On all Transient Newspapers and Periodicals, addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals *published not less frequently than once a month*, and weighing *less than one ounce*, may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one-half cent each. Newspapers for the United Kingdom must be prepaid 1c. for each 2 oz.

Newspapers and Periodicals, published in the United Kingdom, and brought by mail to Canadian booksellers or News Agent, may be re-mailed by such Booksellers or News Agents, free of postage.

Miscellaneous and Book Packets.—The rate of postage upon all Newspapers and Periodicals posted for destinations in Canada or Newfoundland, not otherwise provided for, and on Books, Pamphlets, Occasional Publications, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, and other matter wholly in print, is 1 cent per 4 ounces or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamp or stamped postband or wrapper; but when posted for destination in the United States, Great Britain, and all European countries, the rate is 1 cent per 2 ounces.

Upon all Book and Newspaper Manuscript, Printers' Proof Sheets, whether corrected or not, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, when not on glass or in cases containing glass, Sheet Music, whether printed or written, Militia, Statute Labor, Municipal and School Returns, or other documents of like nature--and on all other miscellaneous matter transmissible by post not otherwise provided for--the rate of postage when addressed to places in Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain and any European country, is 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, to be paid by postage stamp or stamped postband or wrapper.

No package must exceed 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth. Limit of weight for Canada, Newfoundland, Great Britain or United States is 5 lbs.; for other Postal Union countries, 4 lbs.

Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions or Grafts can only be sent to the United States at Fifth Class matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

Patterns and Samples.—Patterns and samples of merchandize not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 oz. weight, properly labelled, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible as such.

Patterns and Samples for the United States, 1 cent per 2 oz., the initial prepayment being 2c. Limit of weight 8 oz.; size 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width and depth.

Packets of Patterns or Samples, addressed to any place in Canada, can be registered on affixing thereto registration stamps of the value of 5 cents, in addition to postage stamps representing ordinary postage rate, provided such packets be presented for registration.

The limit of weight to Great Britain, France, Germany, and all other

countries in Europe, is eight ounces—postage 2 cents for the first 4 oz., and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz.

No article liable to Customs duty can be sent as a sample or pattern to a postal Union country.

FOURTH CLASS MATTER.

Parcels.—Closed parcels may be sent to places in Canada, the United Kingdom and Newfoundland. They should be plainly addressed, and there should be no correspondence enclosed.

Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6 cents per 4 oz. They must not exceed 5 pounds in weight, nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, and the sender's name should be written on the lower left hand corner. They may be registered for a fee of 5 cents.

Parcels for the United Kingdom and Newfoundland, when sent from the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and Northwest Territories, must be prepaid 25 cents per lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. A Customs Declaration of the contents and value of each parcel must be filled up at the Post Office by the sender. Parcels for the United Kingdom are forwarded by Canadian Contract Steamers only; and parcels for Newfoundland are sent to Halifax for dispatch by steamer.

FIFTH CLASS MATTER.

Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage 1 cent per ounce or fraction of an ounce. Limit of weight 4 pounds; size, 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. Matter claiming to be Fifth Class *must be open to inspection*, and there must be no correspondence enclosed. Packages of 5th Class Matter may be sent to the United States for the same prepayment as is required within the Dominion, but the contents will be liable to Custom inspection and collection of duty in the United States. Sealed tins containing fish, lobsters, vegetables, meats, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent as 5th Class matter within the Dominion, but no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. Liquids, oils and fatty substances may be sent to places in Canada and the United States as 5th Class if put up in accordance with the rules referring to such articles in the Canada Postal Guide for 1889, page xv. Information can be obtained at the Post Office.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters to places within the Dominion or U. S. will be forwarded without any additional charge if returned promptly to the Post Office.

Letters sent to or received from a country of the Postal Union, and afterwards re-directed to any place in Canada, or to a country in the Postal Union, will be forwarded even if taken out of the office and re-addressed; but if re-addressed to a place where there is a higher rate of postage, the difference of postage will be chargeable.

REGISTERED MATTER.

All class 8 of matter addressed to places in Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain or any Postal Union country, may be registered for a fee of 5 cents for each article in addition to the postage; and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union.

Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor; on no account must it be drop-

ped into a letter box. The registration fee should be paid by registration stamp.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any Postal Union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of five cents.

Registered articles cannot be forwarded unless the postage and registration fee are paid in full.

Registration stamps cannot be accepted in prepayment of postage.

All letters for Registration should be posted 30 minutes before the hour of closing Mails.

Registered Letter Stamps of the denomination of 5 cents, may be obtained at the usual places.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Any business in connection with depositing and withdrawing money from the Post Office Savings Bank can be transacted at this office, but arrangements have not as yet been made for the opening of new accounts.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.

Any explosive substance, glass, liquid, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of Parcel Post rates.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union countries except the United States.

IMPORTANT.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

SALE OF POSTAGE STAMPS.

Any person, other than a postmaster, who engages in the sale of Postage Stamps or Stamped Envelope, without being duly licensed by the Postmaster General, is liable, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, to a penalty of \$40 for each offence.

USEFUL HINTS.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office except either by Money Order or Registered Letter.

Make complaints and inquiries in writing.

Envelopes closed and simply clipped at the ends cannot be forwarded by Book Post.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of mis-sent or delayed letters.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full confidence.

Have a letter box on your office door.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered, unless addressed in care of a resident, or to some box in the Post Office.

POST BANDS AND STAMPED ENVELOPES.

One cent post bands for newspaper or book packet wrappers, and one and three cent stamped envelopes are issued by the Department,

and may be had at the stamp vendors at a trifle above their face value.

MUTILATED STAMPS.

Letters having mutilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not, will be sent to the Postmaster-General for his adjudication.

MONEY ORDER SERVICE.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible; if sent by letter it should always be registered.

Money orders issued and paid from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Commission on Money Orders.—On Money Orders drawn by any Money Order Office in Canada on any other Money Order Office in the Dominion is as follows: If not exceeding \$4, 2c.; over \$4 and not exceeding \$10, 5c.; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 10c.; over \$20 and not exceeding \$40, 20c.; over \$40 and not exceeding \$60, 30c.; over \$60 and not exceeding \$80, 40c.; over \$80 and not exceeding \$100, 50c.

No single Money Order, payable in the Dominion of Canada, can be issued for more than \$100; but as many of \$100 each may be given as the remitter requires.

The other countries and British Colonies upon which Money Orders are granted are distinguished by an *Asterisk* (*) in the Foreign Postal Table; the rates of commission in all cases being as follows: If not exceeding \$10, 10c.; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 20c.; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 30c.; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, 40c.; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, 50c.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES INSPECTION.

The Weight and Measures Act provides that two gallons shall be a peck and eight gallons a bushel, and that after January 1st, 1886, in contracts for the sale and delivery of any of the under-mentioned articles, the bushel shall be determined by weight, unless conveniences for weighing are not available, or unless a bushel by measure is specially agreed on in writing, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows: Wheat, 60 pounds; Indian corn, 56 pounds; rye, 56 pounds; peas, beans, and clover seed, 60 pounds; barley, timothy seed and buckwheat, 48 pounds; malt, 36 pounds; oats, 34 pounds; flaxseed, 50 pounds; hempseed, 44 pounds; blue grass seed, 14 pounds; castor beans, 40 pounds; potatoes, turnips, carrots, parsnips, beets and onions, 60 pounds; bituminous coal, 70 pounds. Power is also given to the Governor-in-Council to specify the weight of other articles equivalent to a bushel. Violations of the foregoing provisions subject the offender to a penalty not exceeding \$25 for the first offence and not exceeding \$50 for each subsequent offence.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS.

1. All apples packed in Canada for sale by the barrel shall be packed in good and strong barrels of seasoned wood made as nearly cylindrical as may be; the staves of such barrels shall be twenty-seven inches in length from Croe to Croe, with heads from sixteen and one-half to seventeen inches in diameter; and such barrels shall be sufficiently hooped with a lining hoop within the chimes, the whole well secured by nails.

2. Every person who offers or exposes apples for sale by the barrel, otherwise than in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five cents for each barrel of apples so offered or exposed for sale.
