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CHEAP POWER MOVING RAPIDLY EASTWARD

J. R. Dargavel, M. L. A., on Hydro Development—South Leads Conservatives Elect Officers.

BROCKVILLE, Feb. 10.—(Special.)—The Conservatives of South Leads held a big meeting to-day at Delta, when officers for the ensuing year were elected. Provincial and Dominion affairs were discussed at considerable length by Geo. Taylor, M.P., Major S. Sharpe, M.P., John R. Dargavel, M.L.A., and J. S. Carstairs, Conservative Organizer.

Mr. Dargavel eulogized the Whitney administration. Touching the government's power policy, he stated that cheap power was moving eastward and that in a comparatively short time the hydro-electric commission would be in a position to supply electricity and other Eastern Ontario municipalities.

Mr. Taylor whacked the Laurier administration generally, and the reciprocity pact in particular. This he characterized as a step in Sir Wilfrid's separatist policy pursued since 1895, whereby Canada was being cut adrift from the motherland.

Major Sharpe delivered a fighting speech which brought applause. He took his audience over a series of recent parliamentary events and touched at some length upon the features of the "Farmers' Bank" which he spoke of as many farmers who were depositors and shareholders, he laid at the door of the finance minister the responsibility for not acting in his official capacity when he was warned of the unsoundness of the institution.

Major Sharpe was particularly outspoken in his opposition to the reciprocity treaty with the United States. He spoke along the lines of fostering imperial ties rather than separation, which would follow reciprocity trade relations with the republic.

On to London instead of Washington should be the slogan of Canadians, he said. "Preferential trade within the empire is the goal to seek," Mr. Carstairs urged effective organization in view of an early general election, which looked probable.

It will be impossible to save the hull of the ship, however, the despatch added.

ASK NEARLY MILLION FOR TORONTO SCHOOLS

Property Estimates Exceed Expenditure of Last Year by Over \$400,000.

Yesterday afternoon the property committee of the board of education met to discuss estimates amounting to over a million dollars. The building committee alone total \$736,000.

The entire draft of estimates, including an expenditure of \$12,000 for technical high schools, \$22,000 for collegial and high schools, and \$192,250 for public schools, was approved, and will be presented before the finance committee at the Tuesday session.

The building account a recommendation was approved calling for 119 additional rooms, this being 19 rooms more than the management committee specified.

An important item in the impressive total of \$736,000 asked for public schools on the building account is \$100,000 for the purchase of new sites and enlargement of present ones.

For repairs, fixtures, etc., the estimate is \$195,250, while \$155,250 was spent last year.

For collegiate institutes and high schools \$33,050 is asked, against \$16,275 spent last year, the increase being chiefly on fittings and apparatus.

Last year the appropriation for the technical high school was \$4070. This year the estimates call for \$12,000, including \$5000 for equipping the new high school of commerce.

A sum of \$6000 is recommended to provide rooms in the schools for the purpose of medical inspection.

To complete the Caledonia-road site it was announced that Mr. Irwin, the owner of land at the corner of Caledonia-road and Ennis-avenue, had accepted the board's offer of \$17 per foot.

The offer of John T. Moore, of a lot of 21x16 1/2, to enlarge the playgrounds of Strathcona School, was approved.

RURAL JOCKERS
ON TOWNSHIP ELECTIONS

Hence Would A. B. Thompson, Centre Simcoe, Elevate Ceremonies to Urban Dignity.

Rural municipal and school trustee election difficulties were discussed by the Ontario Legislature yesterday afternoon.

T. Bradburn, West Peterboro (Con.), moved the second reading of his bill to amend the School Act in the direction of stiffening the conditions of the nomination proceedings.

Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, said that while the present regulations allowed some voters to take the position of school trustees.

Mr. Bradburn, in deference to Hon. Dr. Pyne's views, withdrew his bill. He, however, filed a letter with his bill to amend the Municipal Act, which elicited a few words of commendation from Hon. W. J. Hanna.

The provincial secretary said that Mr. Bradburn's motion contained about half a dozen suggestions which might be considered in the municipal committee. The committee provided that some officer other than the mayor should be qualified to sign de-putations coupons worth of consideration, as it certainly was a big task to sign innumerable deputation coupons several times a year.

Mr. Thompson, Centre Simcoe, moved the second reading of his bill to place township elections on the same basis as other municipalities.

Hon. A. G. MacKay, opposition leader, objected to the bill as too drastic for present conditions in many parts of the province, especially in sparsely settled sections.

Sir James Whitney said that he agreed with his honorable friend, the leader of the opposition, with respect to the bill for what might be very nice in the city and town might be very inconvenient and uncomfortable out in the country.

Mr. Thompson said that he did not intend to force the bill and idea of introducing it upon the rural municipalities, but has brought it in at the request of several municipalities in his riding.

Elections a Joke.

Mr. Thompson did not state it as a fact that nominations were made by practical jokers in Centre Simcoe, but for some reason absentees who, if elected, had not the qualification to sit in council.

Mr. Thompson said that he would introduce the bill with the qualifications put to the unnecessary expense of elections. In one case a man who was away in New Ontario had no property qualifications whatever, was nominated, and an unnecessary election had to be held.

Sir James Whitney said that it was not his intention to propose such a big question as this one. He said that the "hard cases make bad laws." Law-makers were not human, and it was impossible to make a law which would work to perfection absolutely in all cases without exception, but in view of Mr. Thompson's explanation of the bill he would support it on the committee for a consideration of the difficulty complained of.

Rags and Bones Danger.

W. P. Woods, Kingston (Con.), moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Public Health Act. The bill places the control of locations for the storage of rags and bones under the hands of the municipalities. An outbreak of smallpox appeared to be traceable in one instance to the improper storage of infectious matter.

Sir James Whitney said that the bill might be reported upon to see whether or not the municipalities were already covered by the Public Health Act.

Objects to Vet's Fees.

When Hon. J. S. Duff's bill respecting veterinary surgeons was read a second time, Hon. A. G. MacKay repeated the criticism that it raised the witness fee of veterinary experts to five dollars, one dollar in excess of other experts.

The minister of agriculture said that this would all be adjusted as the other statutes were revised.

Several incorporation bills were on the motion of Hon. B. Lucas given their second reading, also Hon. Frank Cochrane's bill to amend the Public Health Act amendment bill was read a second time.

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NO CHANGE IN PULP WOOD POLICY.

Whatever may happen to the reciprocity agreement the effect on the Ontario pulp market will be inappreciable. The government thoroughly realizes the importance of the pulp industry and its retention for the province, and it is also realized that the continuity of a policy is quite as important as the policy itself. Continuity leads to stability, and stability invites confidence, and confidence is the basis of prosperity. In Ontario reciprocity for the pulp industry will rest undisturbed on the continuity of the present policy.

In the immediate application and development of the government's views in this respect in the clay belt and the Rainy River district there is to be found one of the most significant actions taken for the opening up of the northern territory and the encouragement of the settler. The scrub timber, the second growth forest, the unmerchantable and practically worthless lumber products of the district along the National Transcontinental Railway which have been an obstruction to the settler and a liability instead of an asset, will be at once converted into a source of revenue and a means of livelihood during the pioneer year of homesteading.

The mill to be established at Inokoula Falls is likely to be of prime importance to the district in which it will be situated. It is understood that enquiries made of the government exceed in number anything of the sort that has been known before. This indicates a widespread interest among capitalists on both sides of the Atlantic, and the knowledge that the pulp industry in Ontario is settled on a permanent basis and cannot be affected by outside legislation will undoubtedly affect the tenders which are to be received by April 10.

Regarding the debate initiated by Mr. Austen Chamberlain over the pending reciprocity proposals between the Dominion and the United States, it traveled along familiar lines. Tariff reformers and free traders necessarily view them through different colored glasses and that which is practicable under a protection policy is impossible to those approving the present British fiscal system. Without the complication created by the cross action of the peers and the determination of the Nationalists to obtain Irish self-government, the outlook for tariff reform is by no means unhelpful. Indeed, the World thinks it is more certain that ever to come were it reduced to a straight issue. Tariff reform has been delayed, but it will come. The pity of it is that the Dominion Government has not had the patience to wait for a change which would have given Canada a secure place in that stable market she has cultivated with so many pains. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has chosen to sacrifice the substance of Canadian nationalism and prosperity for the satisfaction of United States necessity.

NATIONALITY JEOPARDIZED NOT DESTROYED.

The World says the result of the reciprocity deal if ratified will be to injure Canadian nationality, to gradually substitute American ideas and ideas for British and Canadian ones, and to continentalize us instead of letting us grow into complete and separate nationhood.

But we do not say that this movement will succeed if we fight it by asserting our nationality. It is hard to either destroy the aspirations or to mislead a people bent on national life and organization. The very fighting against the American designs of our neighbors and the unpatriotic free trade efforts of our own misdirected public men and citizens may well be the means of solidifying us more quickly into nationhood and into a distinctive individuality.

PROVINCIAL EXPENDITURES.

Increases in the provincial expenditures move The Globe to an essay on the virtue of economy. Its zeal in appreciation would be more highly appreciated were it not in the annual habit of justifying greater proportional increases on the part of its federal friends. Comparative figures are in themselves of little moment unless their difference is shown to have arisen needlessly and unprofitably. This, in the case of the provincial budget, The Globe has not attempted, and its longing for the restoration of the thirty-two years' regime will scarcely meet with popular sympathy. The memory of that period is probably fragrant to the Globe, but it is anything but fragrant to the public.

RECIPROCITY IN THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Mr. Asquith has easily secured in the first skirmish of the new parliamentary campaign. Contrary to report, the Laborites and Nationalists were solid in their support and gave him a majority of over the hundred. Nothing evidently will be allowed to stand between the coalition majority and the constitutional issue. This is sound political judgment, for the earlier the opposing parties set into grips the better for the country. The time has come to decide once and finally whether a partisan majority in the house of lords, either reformed or unreformed, is to continue rejecting

reforms. The Ontario Tax Reform League is making a good deal of pressure to bear upon Sir James Whitney with a view to securing for the municipalities the right to place the burden of taxation on the land.

It is notorious that even a verandah may not safely be painted before the assessor has passed by. This ought not to be. We should encourage the improvement of property, and not discourage it. Our encouragement to-day is given to the owner of vacant or unimproved land.

JUDGE SLASHED BILLS AGAINST CORR ESTATE

Undertaker's Amount Cut From \$534 to \$129 and Others in Proportion.

According to the judgment handed down by Judge Winchester yesterday, the professional men who were in the posthumous employ of Felix Corr, the miser shoemaker, saw their bills sliced in fractional parts, which service was rendered by the judge without regrets.

He declared that they had "tucked it on." Corr was practically a hermit, and no mourning was hung out anywhere at his death, for he was without friends or relatives in the city.

The undertaker, J. A. Humphrey, corner Mainland and Church streets, entered an account of \$534, which included, among other things, embalming, keeping at the city morgue seven days, a casket, shell and washings, which his note book on the figure of \$129. The casket, which in the bill was placed at \$250, came down the scale to \$50, and all the other items likewise.

Referring to the casket Judge Winchester said: "I consider that \$50 is a large allowance under the circumstances. The man admitted he was 'tucking it on,' meaning increasing the price, as the casket complete would only cost him \$41."

Dr. Norman Allen, who was with the deceased at the time of his death, sent in a bill to the estate for \$50, half of which he claimed for his assistant's suit of clothes, which was ruined for the months, but persistently kept at his work up to the time of his death. 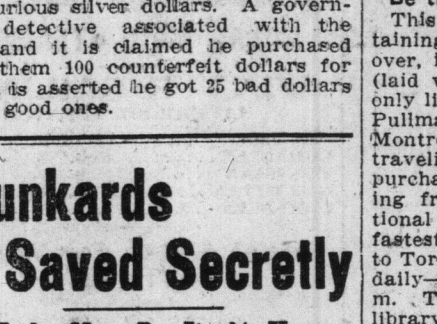

New York Stocks Dull and Prices Slightly Lower

Traders Take No Decided Stand And Stock Market Turns Heavy

Wall Street Turns Into Season of Dull Trading—Steel Statement More Favorable—Lispid Dealings in Toronto Exchange.

World Office, Friday Evening, Feb. 10.—After a strenuous effort in connection with Rio and Sao Paulo to-day these shares ended up almost exactly at last night's prices. The large dealings were the result of floor trading tests, and the supporting interests apparently kept close to the desks so as to prevent scalping and rake-offs. The whole market was listless and showed little evidence of any inspiration. Real buyers were not plentiful, and there was no decided swing to values.

Mackays, Twins and other speculative stocks were exceedingly dull. There was not transaction on the New York market for either Twins or Mackay, and few dealings in either of them on the Toronto Exchange. Investment interest to-day was in the banks. Commerce was wanted in excess of the supply and none of the shares was offered at the desks.

Porto Rico made a further advance and the action of the stock was taken to indicate the early initiation of dividends on this issue. Listed mining shares were considerably firmer. La Rose sold up to 46; Nipissing to 110 and Trehewey was acquired at two points higher than yesterday.

The market is still considered to be in the constructive stage, but the limited amount of outside speculation precludes anything other than slow small advances.

The market continues to broaden and to hear out the theory of those who contend that it is an upward swing that will ultimately carry it to a higher price level. Growth of confidence in a revival of general business is continued by the market sentiment, which is undoubtedly a distinct improvement in general sentiment, and this is being accentuated every day. People are beginning to look forward rather than backward. The belief is also growing that dividend reductions are no longer to be feared, and that changes when they appear will be toward an increase in equity returns.

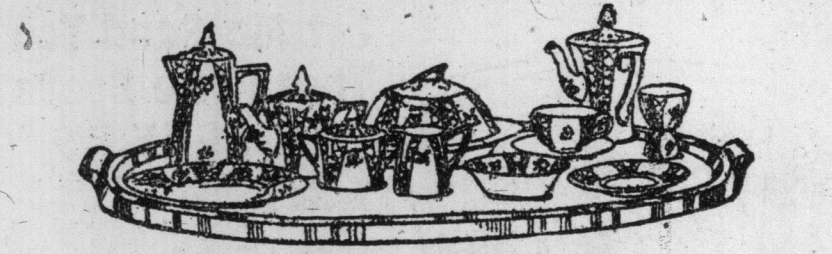

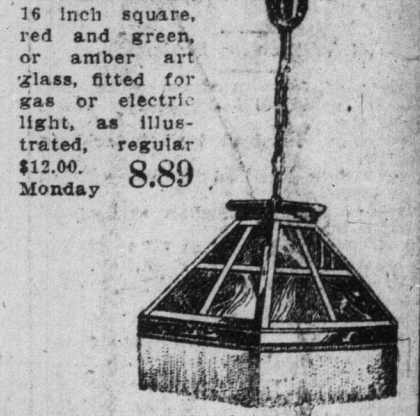
