**Tucket Estate Wins.**

The action brought by the trustees of the Tucket estate against R. B. Simpson to recover possession of one share of Hamilton Jockey Club stock, was this afternoon decided by Justice Britton in favor of the plaintiffs. The defendant claimed that the stock, which is now worth about \$2000 a share, was bought by him in 1906 for \$40. The plaintiffs alleged that the stock was transferred to the defendant on demand of J. F. Hellmuth, K.C., of Toronto, for the plaintiff's use and George T. Black, K.C., for the defendant, argued the case.

Among the colored delegates to the ecumenical conference who have recently arrived and will participate in the discussions are: Prof. S. G. A. King, M.A., of Toronto, who will speak on the laymen's movement at the session this morning.

Prof. D. D. Jordan of the A. M. E. Church will speak at this evening's session, on special work of young people in the church.

Hon. John C. Daney, ex-recorder of deeds, will preside at one of the sessions Saturday. Bishop L. J. Coppin of the A. M. E. Church will address the conference Monday afternoon on the pace of the religious press in modern life.

Among the colored delegates to figure in the proceedings of the conference were Bishop C. H. Phillips of the C. M. E. Church, who is one of the secretaries; Rev. W. D. Chappelle of Allen's University, Columbia, S.C., who is a member of the business committee; Rev. L. M. March of the A. M. E. Church, who will address the conference Monday afternoon on the pace of the religious press in modern life.

Rev. D. J. H. Bray, president of the Miles Memorial College at Birmingham, Ala., and one of the foremost colored delegates to the ecumenical conference. At one of the sessions of the conference Dr. Bray delivered a notable address on "Methodism and a Joyous Religion." In the States Dr. Bray holds considerable influence and is prominent in the C. M. E. Church, under whose auspices is the Miles Memorial College.

**ELECTRIC TRUST BROKEN**  
Sweeping Decree Entered in United States Circuit Court.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—By the sweeping decree entered in the United States circuit court at Toledo to-day, the backbone of the so-called electrical trust was broken and in the judgment of Attorney-General Wickersham, the government was empowered to break up the trust and to control the prices of incandescent lamps. The important principle was laid down, according to the attorney-general, that once a lamp sold to a manufacturer the price at which it is resold by a dealer or jobber must be open to free competition.

**NO SHAKE UP IN CABINET**  
**PREMIER IS EMPHATIC**

"Fabrications" is Term Applied to Persistent Rumors—Aggressive Policy for Northern Ontario.

A story was published in an evening paper yesterday to the effect that R. K. Ganey, M.L.A., would likely be taken into the Ontario cabinet as minister of a new department, which is to be known as the department of colonization and labor.

When Sir James Whitney saw the article yesterday afternoon, he got into a decidedly serious frame of mind, and made an announcement to the newspaper. Here is what the premier said:

"I am very sorry to notice the statements made in the newspapers with reference to changes to be made in the cabinet. There is no foundation for them whatever, and no suggestion has been made to this effect. The same thing has been set afloat from time to time for the past few years, and there never has been any foundation for them. I am bold enough to say that I believe they have simply been fabrications."

Before Sir James had made this statement, it was surmised that if Mr. Ganey did get a portfolio, his deputy minister would in all probability be C. C. James, C.M.G., the present deputy minister of agriculture.

It is practically assured that the Ontario government, in conjunction with the government at Ottawa, will immediately adopt progressive measures for the opening up and settlement of New Ontario. Yesterday afternoon it was said that R. K. Ganey, M.L.A., was at present up in the north country gathering information and statistics about the different districts and their adaptability for a great influx of settlers.

**TAFT SLATED FOR DEFEAT**  
**SAYS GOVERNOR WALLACE**

California's Lieutenant Governor Deplores Weakness of Republican Party.

"President Wm. H. Taft of the United States, will be renominated next year and defeated," said Lieutenant-Governor A. J. Wallace of California to a World man at the King Edward last evening. Mr. Wallace, as a Republican, deplored the situation confronting his party as it means temporary release of government control and he fears serious complications will arise in the financial world with the resumption of a Democratic administration.

Mr. Wallace was born and educated in Canada, having graduated from Victoria University. He left for the States in 1873. He went through the recent strenuous campaign with Governor Hiram W. Johnson, who advocated twenty reform amendments to the state constitution of California.

Mr. Wallace is a member of the California bar, and has held various offices, including that of county clerk and justice of the peace. He is a member of the California State Bar Association and the California State Bar.

**THE WESTERN CROP**  
Work of Threshing is Proceeding Rapidly—Big Traffic for Railways.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 12.—With the return of fine weather, great headway has been made with the crop. For the first few days little threshing could be done as the grain was too wet, but now all over the west the work is proceeding rapidly, with the result that the railways are moving vast quantities of all kinds of grain.

On Oct. 10, the Canadian Northern moved 418,000 bushels of grain, and yesterday the amount totalled 408,000 bushels. This is a record for this year as far as the Canadian Northern Railway is concerned.

The movement is getting heavier each day and this total will likely be beaten in the next week, as the farmers are now able to move their wheat from the fields to the elevators, and as the rain held the railways up for some time, the supply of cars through the west is large and is sufficient for the present, at least.

THE LIBERAL PARTY IN THE PROVINCE

What is the matter with the Liberal party in Ontario? One reason, that it has no newspaper voice other than the Corporation organs, The Globe, The Star, The Hamilton Times, The London Advertiser, have all persistently fought the hydro-electric policy of the government and the rights of the people.

The Liberals would be better off if they had one little weekly paper that offered a progressive lead than with forty big papers that were out to choir-form all new ideas and good policy.

Until Liberals get such a paper they had better read The World. A great many of them do.

Hon. A. G. MacKay has spoken with too great precipitation. Unkind people may think that his statement in The Globe yesterday had been prepared weeks ago and was lying in The Globe's pigeon-hole waiting for Sir James Whitney's announcement.

But this is clearly not the case, and we will look for something more to the point, with a little less mere grouch over the issues of the last session of the legislature.

It is only childlike to talk about the date of the election. Of course it is the usual thing to do, but the usual thing has never done any party any good, and it never will.

The people are remarkably well satisfied with the price of the school books. They know that they pay 49 cents for them, and no more, and that they used to pay twice as much, and it would be well for Mr. MacKay to go into the question of production before making any rash statements.

He is on firmer ground when he speaks of the scarcity of teachers. He ought to know the reason. The Ontario Government is turning out plenty of teachers, but the Ontario farmers will not pay the salaries necessary to keep them in the province.

Double and treble the salaries are paid out west, and naturally the teachers go there. Will Mr. MacKay propose a tax on the rural districts to pay the teachers a higher wage?

Mr. MacKay takes the side of the corporations, as usual, against the hydro-electric power project. He endeavors to show that because Bracebridge has to pay a little more for the power, the province would be very much better off without any power at all.

Mr. MacKay will do anything, apparently, rather than propose a progressive and original program. There is nothing in his pronouncement about government ownership of any kind; nor about trunk lines for telephone companies, such as are now being formed all over the province; nor about tax reform; nor about over-capitalization and stock-watering generally; nor about civil service reform; nor, indeed, anything that might cheer the heart of a young Liberal who has given up in disgust trying to warm himself at the embers of The Globe's cold hearthstone.


