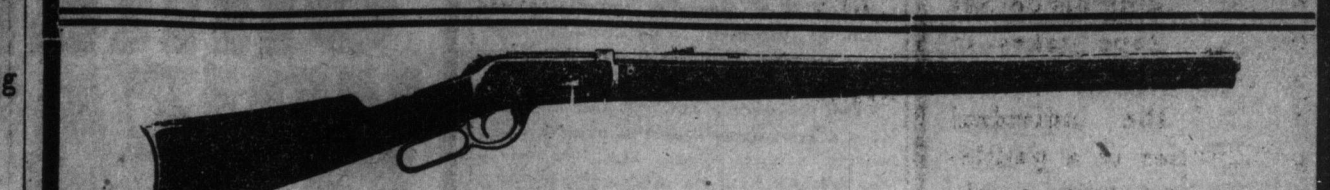

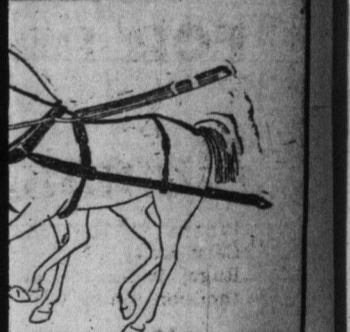

As is well-known, there are three important power companies on the Canadian side at Niagara Falls, which are freely known as the Canadian, the Ontario, and the Electrical Development Company.

The World is glad to see the admirable article on public ownership printed in last night's Toronto Star. The Star gives this policy to the Liberal party and prophesies that it will be a declaration of war on the ownership in sea and out of sea, which it will perform excellent public service, even if it does not achieve power.

But while this utterance of The Star is gladly welcomed by the advocates of public ownership, will The Star be kind enough to give the people the names of the men who own and control the newspaper that makes it? What relationship do the proprietors of The Star bear to those aggressive corporations which are the known and declared foes of public ownership? Is The Star sincere in advocating a strenuous adherence to public ownership, or is it merely playing a part in a game prepared by its masters, whose only idea of public service is opportunity for personal gain?

Such a declaration as The Star's makes good reading, and as a contribution to the growing cause of public ownership it may have no small effect. But such an utterance should bear on its face proof positive of its origin, and until The Star makes good its absolute adherence to the policy of public ownership by supporting it in specific cases, the public will be loath to believe it is anything else than a plastic tool in the hands of corporations to whom the advent of public ownership spells discomfiture.

Mr. Shepherd places his loss at \$5000, with \$3500 insurance. Wetmore carried an insurance of \$500 on his dwelling and contents. His loss is \$2000.

Kills Fellow Lunatic. Warsaw, Sept. 7.—An inmate of the Asylum for the Insane at Gorakalyria, near here, secured an ax yesterday and killed several of his fellow lunatics before he was overpowered.

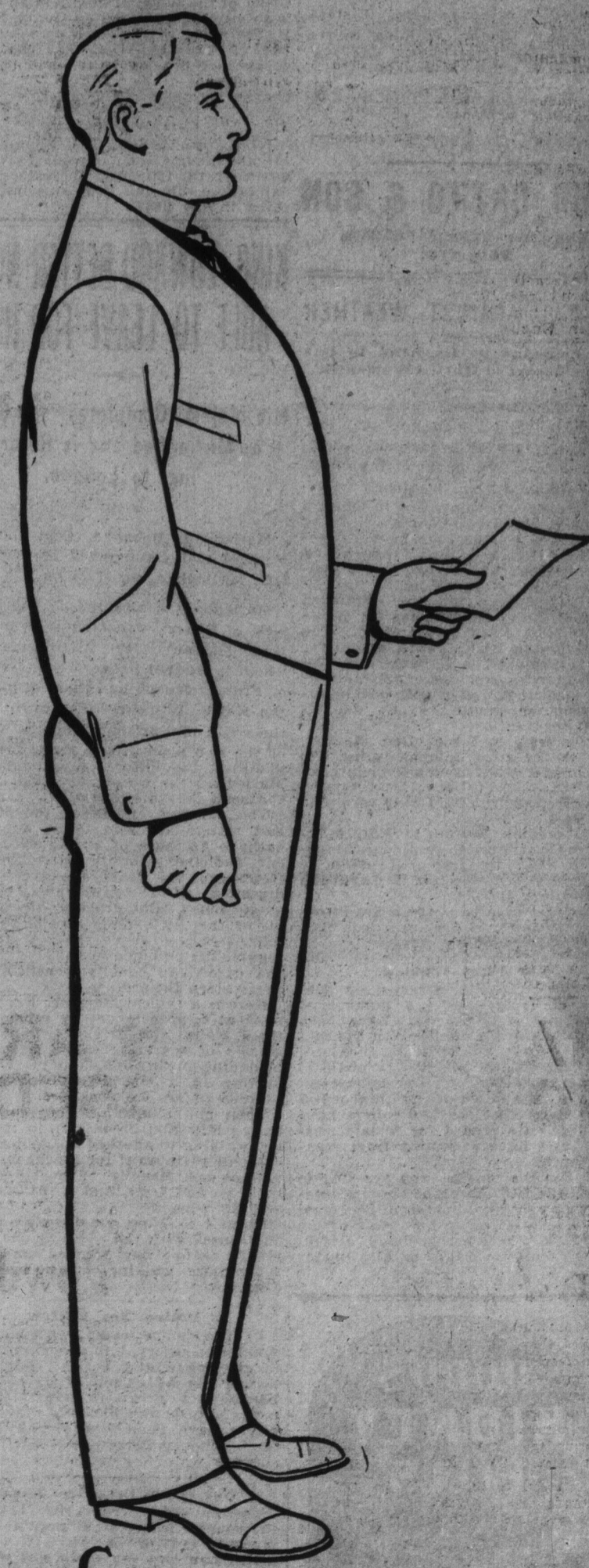

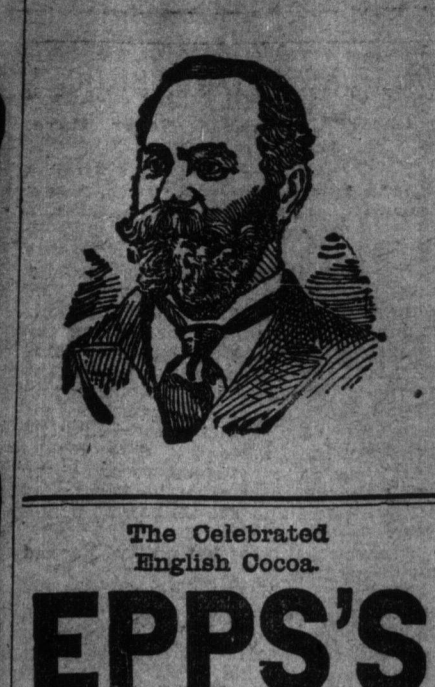
