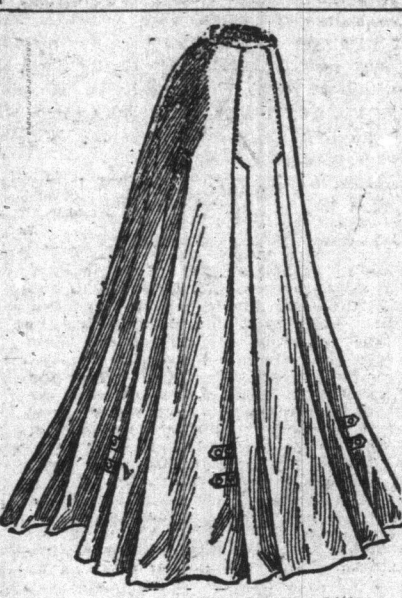

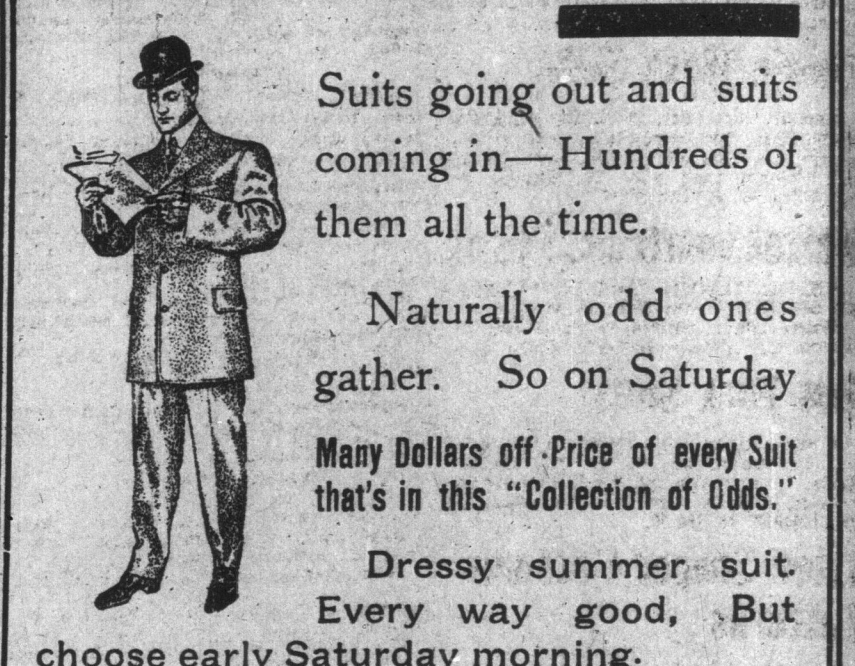

OMNIVOROUS EXPRESS COS. BIG MOUTHFULS OF FRUIT

Express Rates From Local Ontario Points to Toronto Higher Than Freight Rates to Liverpool—The Fruit Men Are Discriminated Against.

Public ownership of the country's utilities is being pushed along fast by the grasping operations of publicly-operated franchisees. The people would be content with private management of these, if there was any limit to the wants of the soulless corporations, or any regard for the shipper's rights maintained.

Express Rapaciousness. The fruit-growing industry has been greatly hampered by the unfair advantage taken of it by the railroad and express companies by the fact that their rates usually take half, and some times nearly all, of the proceeds derived from the sale of their produce.

On examining freight rates, we find that the rate on four from Forest to Liverpool is 38 cents per cwt., while the rate on apples to Winnipeg is 55 cents for a haul of less than half the distance.

The express rate on fruit from Forest to Toronto, a distance of 148 miles, is 70 cents per cwt., or nearly twice as great as the carload freight rates on the same route.

What consumer here could possibly expect to build up a trade in Winnipeg with an express rate of 51 per cwt.?

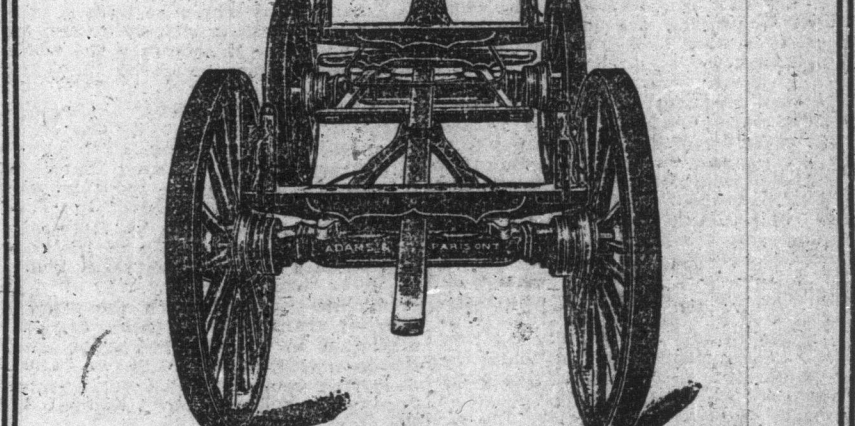

TELEPHONES ON FARM RAISE RURAL REVENUES

What Has Been Done in United States Can Be Done in Better Favored Canada.

The advent of the telephone into the farm house means much to everybody. Not only will the farmers receive much better social communication, but the financial aspect of their introduction demands their installation. At sundry times past these farming pages have referred to the benefits to be derived. But The New York Sun had a recent summary of their usefulness to the United States farmer. All this is applicable to Canada, and if the numerous farm homes of this country were impressed with their usefulness they would clamor for each independent telephone association to get its lines into every home. The Bell Company was fighting in season and out of season to maintain control of the phone service of this country, but they will only give a decent rate where they are forced to do so, and so all tempting offers should not be accepted if such acceptance binds the person to a time contract. Uxbridge Town is among the many towns of Canada now in the fight, and the monopoly are striving hard to keep the Bell Company. New York Sun speaks about the spread of independent telephony as follows:

The spread of what is known as independent telephony, which followed the running out of the fundamental telephone patterns in the United States, had many striking developments, but none more remarkable than those which have given every farmer in the land the chance of an up-to-date telephone, and thus put himself in direct touch with the outer world. The ubiquitous trolley, running out into the rural regions from the nearest urban centres, has done much to change the conditions of rural and agricultural life; but over and above all, the telephone is proving the instrumentality of what is, as a matter of fact, a new civilization.

Only those who have traveled of late thru the rural parts of the great Middle States and of those in the Northwest can have the remotest idea of the manner in which the telephone is being made available and cheap, the farmer has seized upon it with avidity, and connected himself up with some co-operative system in his own neighborhood, or again, with bolder effort, has pushed out and joined his own line with the network of some adjoining village. This co-operative principle has in this way received a new and striking exemplification, while the economic outcomes, even at a telephone stage are so wide-reaching that it is hard to determine just where the effects of this change will stop.

It is estimated that during the last five years telephones have been put into nearly half a million rural homes. The farmer finds that with the telephone he can market his produce on the market, selling his produce or live stock when quotations are the most favorable.

How it Saves.

By sparing himself and his help useless trips back and forth for purpose of delivering his products or of ascertaining the status of the market, he now saves a vast amount of time in the course of the year. When he is assured by information over the telephone that he can sell to advantage he loads up his wagon, and not till then.

An illustrating advantage of keeping in telephone touch with the market, a recent incident in transactions in broom corn in Illinois is related. A prospective rise in the market was preceded by great activity on the part of the brokers.

Buyers from the outside began to clean up the broom corn at \$60 a ton, when a telephone message called up the farmers on his system and told them the market was rapidly rising. The result was that before the season ended they got \$240 a ton for their crop. One farmer reports that in addition to getting nearly double the usual work out of his teams, thru their being saved futile trips to market, he has been enabled to do away with the hire of two men, as he could spend more time on his farm and save the diminished output of the hands at work in his absence.

Victoria Harbor Lumber Co. Buys Out Cook Bros.

Two million dollars is the price paid by the Victoria Harbor Lumber Co. for the limits and mills of the Cook & Bros. Lumber Co. Ltd.

The business will be run by the purchasers as a separate concern and the government will be asked to allow a change of name, probably to the Waldie Bros. Co. Ltd.

The old shareholders, who were also directors, were G. W. Cook, president; Morrisburg; G. E. Cook, vice-president; Toronto; Mrs. E. M. Casgrain, Montreal; Miss S. P. Cook, Morrisburg; Mrs. E. M. Cook, Toronto; Hon. J. P. B. Casgrain, Montreal.

The new shareholders and directors are: John Waldie, chairman of the board, Toronto; F. N. Waldie, president, Toronto; R. S. Waldie, vice-president, Toronto; W. S. Waldie and G. F. Waldie, Toronto; C. G. Mariani, Oakville.

The capital of the company is \$1,200,000.

The limits of the Cook Lumber Co. comprise 218 square miles; 50 square miles are on an Indian reservation controlled by the Dominion government. The transfer carries with it the right to cut timber on the limits. The mill is at Sprague, on the Soo branch of the C.P.R., 30 miles west of Sudbury. It has a capacity of 30,000,000 feet a year.

One of the mills of Toronto was the interested bank in the sale.

UNIONISTS TO FIGHT IT.

Will Hold Mass Meeting Opposing Home Rule Bill.

LONDON, May 9.—The Unionists have arranged for a great meeting of protest against the Irish Bill, to be held in Queen Hall, June 12. A. J. Balfour will preside, and he will be supported by all the leaders of his party.

The Dublin fate of Mr. Birrell's Irish Bill is regarded here as depending entirely on the attitude taken by the proposed National Convention, and while there is nobody able to predict, there is no doubt that the Nationalists, rank and file, are deeply disappointed in the proposed measure, and it will require all John E. Redmond's influence to obtain from the conference a resolution in its favor.

It is reported that some of Mr. Redmond's followers threatened to resign if the bill was accepted. But the vote was, to a great extent, smoothed over on condition that efforts would be made to secure a modification of the measure and it is believed that with the exception of Timothy Healy, who expressed great regret at being obliged to oppose a bill introduced by a friendly minister, and William O'Brien, Nationalist member for Cork, whose attitude is doubtful, the party as a whole will accept the bill.

FIVE OUT OF SEVEN.

Working Conditions Being Restored at Crow's Nest Pass.

G. G. S. Lindsey, general manager of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. Ltd., received the following telegram from the mines yesterday:

"Michael men starting work this morning. Understand Cannon and Luskbeck mines still idle. All others working."

The dispatch indicates that in five out of seven collieries where the strike existed the men have resumed work.

CHANGES IN BISLEY TEAM.

OTTAWA, May 9.—Two Ottawans will join the Canadian team to Bisley, Pte. J. S. Stevenson of the 43d Regiment taking the place of Major Remie of the O.R., Toronto, who cannot go, and Sergt. W. A. Smith of the Governor-General's Foot Guards will make it possible to take a place on the team.

Badly Burned by Acid.

TWEED, May 9.—George Hercombe, an employee of the Ontario Powder Works here, was dangerously hurt while filling a drum of acid into the store house at the works. The drum burst, and the acid went over his body, burning him badly. His recovery is doubtful.

Morocco City Captured.

TANGER, May 9.—Sumner of serious trouble Morocco City have come in here from native sources.

It is declared the powerful Rahnma tribes have seized the town and given all foreign residents orders to leave within a fortnight.

Burned to Death.

ROCHESTER, May 9.—Edward Reuben, single, aged 30, was burned to death today at Manchester by the high yard. In pulling the headlight on an engine he spilled the oil on his clothes, which caught fire.

Traveler Sent Up for Trial.

Robert W. Robinson, a traveler for the Vogue Tailoring Co., was sent up for trial by Magistrate Denison yesterday on a charge of stealing \$4, given him by a customer to be delivered to the firm.

COBALT Mining Stocks Are Easier on Increased Offerings --- COBALT

MORE STOCK ON MARKET AND PRICES ARE EASIER

Traders Are Still Enabled to Dominate the Transactions in Most Issues.

World Office, Thursday Evening, May 9. The mining markets were largely in the hands of traders again to-day and prices move irregularly. The weakness of the other securities encouraged sales of the Cobalt stocks, but the support was sufficiently good to take the declines without causing any immediate short side of the market. The stock market was generally quiet, but this was an added incentive to work for a general decline. The only issue which showed any special individuality was Cleveland, which encountered good buying and was advanced three points above yesterday. Traders, Foster, Peterson Lake and Silver Queen were sold lower, but the offerings were by no means free around the low prices. The markets were quite dull at the close and not firm.

SURPLUS IN MACHINERY.

Mines Put Money Into Plant instead of Dividends. James A. McWilliam, the Standard Stock Exchange mining broker, says in his regular weekly market letter: "The immense amount of modern machinery going into Cobalt and Larder Lake country at the present moment is one of the most hopeful signs that big interests have for the ultimate destiny of these silver and gold camps. At the moment, instead of paying dividends to a speculating public, the promoters of the various mines are investing the surplus funds of the corporations in up-to-date machinery, instead of trying to mine with the old-time horse and windlass, as soon as this machinery is generally installed the public may look for quick movements of an upward kind in the legitimate mining shares. In a few days Beaver Consolidated will be actively dealt in, and with such good news behind this proposition it would appear to be an excellent purchase for much higher prices. The Beaver property is being developed with all the haste that is compatible with good mining."

FRISCO LOSSES AMOUNT TO MANY MILLIONS

National Board of Underwriters Give Detailed Figures at Meeting Held in New York.

NEW YORK, N.Y., May 9.—The San Francisco conflagration of April, 1906, swept away, not only every dollar of profit previously made by the insurance companies, but of underwriting since 1860, but cost them \$75,706,174 besides, according to a statement made by President George W. Burchell of the national board of underwriters at the annual meeting of that organization here to-day. President Burchell said carefully compiled figures showed the total property loss by the catastrophe had been in round numbers \$850,000,000. The loss to 242 insurance companies was \$155,008,630, and in addition to this, there was a large amount of reinsurance in foreign companies, which would make the total loss to insurance companies throughout the world between \$220,000,000 and \$285,000,000.

"The severe test on the insurance interests can only be appreciated by the companies themselves," said President Burchell, "and it is remarkable that so few of them were compelled to retire from business. After the extent of the loss, amounting to a billion dollars, and a number of these insurance companies went into liquidation, and many more after the Boston fire the following year, whereas only 20—and a number of these are now returned—were reported to have gone out of business after the San Francisco fire, notwithstanding the extent of the loss, amounting to a billion dollars as large as the aggregate of all the great conflagrations in the United States for the last 50 years."
