MR. LAURIER AND PROTECTION.
On the other hand the Liberal party assert as a cardinal principle that in asserting the public revenues by the levying of the duties means of a customs tariff the duties should be imposed simply with the view of collecting the necessary revenue of the country, so as to produce a maximum of revenue, with a minimum of taxation.

The above is an extract from Hon. Mr. Laurier's latest deliverance on the tariff question. It is taken from a letter addressed to Mr. George H. Merritt, dated June 1, 1906. Free trader as they had in England, he trades as they had in Canada, as far as the fiscal condition of the country will permit. Hon. Mr. Blake maintained that the protective principle should be carried out in Canada as far as the raising of the revenue necessary for the country would allow. The tariff was very nearly agreed and the tariff question, Mr. Laurier is anxious to secure the co-operation of the manufacturers in the pending elections, but there would be no consideration whatever for their interests if Mr. Laurier were to apply the principle above quoted to the tariff as it exists to-day. He simply refused to recognize protection in any shape or form. He will not undertake to arrange the tariff of the country as the fiscal necessities of the country will permit. In amending the tariff he will be guided solely by the principle that "the duties should be imposed simply with the view of collecting the necessary revenue of the country." The two parties are still diametrically apart on the tariff question. The government with the tariff based on aggressive, protective principles. If the imposition of a protective duty will establish any industry in this country and give employment to our people, the Conservative government declare it to be their policy to impose such duty. Mr. Laurier is not to be induced by the protective theory in the slightest degree in his proposed re-arrangement of the tariff. The application of Mr. Laurier's purely revenue theory to our tariff would upset half the industries of the country.

But Mr. Laurier goes a step further in his antagonism to protection. He not only will not recognize it in his tariff, but he proposes to carry out a policy of extermination until he gets rid of it altogether. He refers to the "baneful effects" that have been produced by the National Policy, and attributes most of the country's misfortunes to its 18 years' existence. The inference is that he will remove every vestige of so ruinous a policy. We are glad that Mr. Laurier has not declared himself somewhat specifically on the leading question of this election. He will turn a deaf ear to those who seek to create new industries in this country through the instrumentality of the tariff, as in the late Alex. Mackenzie did in 1878. His latest pronouncement means anything, but it certainly goes that far, if not further.

THE AUTOMOBILE AND ARTIFICIAL SLEEP.

The horse will soon become a memory of the past, and the street cars' days seem to be numbered, too. Another sensation in store for us within the next few years is the lighting of our houses and streets with artificial sunlight. Edison has generally told the truth in regard to coming inventions. He foretold that electric light would become a commercial everyday necessity, and his prediction came out all right. We heard of the possibilities of the phonograph, kinetoscope and other inventions long before they were perfected mechanically. We have reason to doubt that the new fluorescent light will displace our electric lights than we had to doubt the possibility of hearing the human voice through a wire for indefinite distances. The production of artificial sunlight is a fact about not to require more than a couple of years to perfect some mechanism that will produce it commercially. When that stage has been reached night in the city will be transformed into day.
