

FRENCH CHAUFFEURS CONTESTANTS

But Hour of Transit in England Kept Secret.

London, Aug. 30 .- Arrangements are being made for the first automobile race be-tween London and Paris. So far the contest looks like being a match between two automobiles, a 40 horse-power Panhard and an eight horse-power Renault voiturette. The latter is the property of Mr. Dillon C. Willoughby of London, who arranged the

Willoughby of London, who arranged the match.

Two of the most expert French chauffeurs will have charge of the cars. The Panhard will be under the direction of M. Lamberjack, while M. Camiot will steer the Renault. Both drivers have recently been over the various English roads between London and the coast, in order to familiarize themselves with the landmarks. The road race will be started from Paris some day next menth. The exact date is not yet fixed. No difficulty is anticipated on the French side of the Channel, where the laws are not so stringent in regard to fast racing, but in England the case is different. Obstructions in the shape of, local regulations would meet the contestants at every mile under ordinary circumstances. In order to meet these, however, the hour chosen for the contest is one when traffic on country roads is almost nil, so the danger will be correspondingly slight.

Even with this precaution, however, the promoters of the race would be very doantful of its coming off if every county constable along the route were forewarded of the hour when the automobiles might be expected. For this reason the hour of the race will not be made known, except to authorities from whom certain facilities may be required. As a handicap, the 40-horse Panhard will carry three passengers, besides the driver, while the Renault will only carry two in all. 


