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AGARIANS AGAINST CORPORATIONS

Mr. Clarke's Effort to Have Toronto Protected Against Possible Exactions Falls.

Ottawa, April 28.—The hold that the big corporations have upon the House of Commons was illustrated to a nicety in the Chamber this afternoon, when only 18 members out of 92 were found to support the demand of the municipality of Toronto to be protected against the possible exactions of the Toronto and Niagara Power Co.

The House went into committee on the bill to incorporate the Toronto and Niagara Power Co., and Mr. E. F. Clarke moved his amendment to clause 11 of the bill to make it clear that the company cannot discriminate against individuals or municipalities in supplying electricity for light, power or heat.

Mr. Clarke, in support of his amendment, said that the gentlemen who are applying for the incorporation of the Toronto Electric Railway and Light Company, the franchise of which Light Company had some time yet to run, but which was a valuable franchise when it came to the city.

Archibald Campbell said the bill had received careful attention by the Private Bills Committee, before which the same amendments were proposed but it was not thought to be in the public interest that they should be adopted.

Hon. James Sutherland agreed with Mr. Campbell, and said if any such amendments were adopted, they would be imposed by a general act applicable to all companies.

Mr. Oiler for the People. E. F. Oiler said that this entirely fallacious argument against making exceptions in special cases was the chief argument reported to the committee of every move made in parliament to protect the public interest.

Even Archibald Campbell Sees No Need to Afford Farmers Effective Protection.

Ottawa, April 28.—In the house this afternoon, Mr. Leonard (Conservative, Laval), moved: "That it is greatly in the interests of the market gardeners and the farmers that the duties on our Canadian garden products be so adjusted as to guarantee the Canadian farmer an effective protection against foreign competition."

Mr. Leonard, speaking in French, made a strong plea to protect, suggesting that the tariff be changed from ad valorem to specific, and pointing out that the tariff in Canada was much lower than in the United States.

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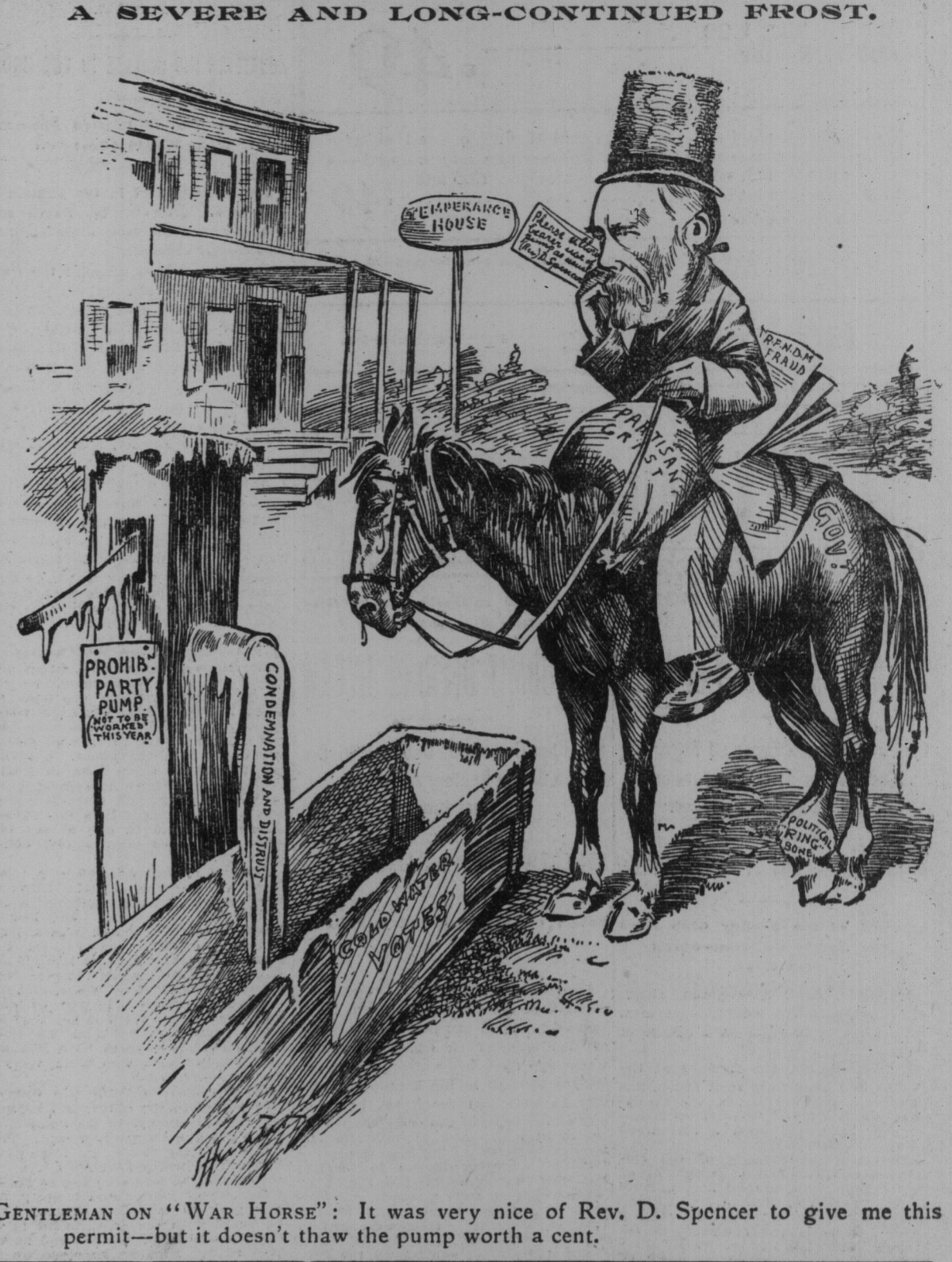

A QUESTION OF DIGNITY. Why do physicians and lawyers consider it infra dig to advertise? This question has long constituted a poser to the ordinary layman.

Why should not the young doctor or barrister, struggling to establish a practice, be able to advertise his profession without any more loss of dignity than the merchant who advertises by making known his wares thru the public prints?

No doubt the professional man's attitude towards the press is based upon a very high conception of his calling. His views were recently voiced by a doctor thus:

"The services of the professional man are not paid for in dollars and cents. The lawyer who serves an estate and rescues from poverty a family for several generations—the physician who saves your child from death—can these services be ethically for so much per hour?"

To the lay mind, however, the sense of dignity or professional etiquette, which insists on such extreme conservatism as is now characteristic of the legal and medical fraternities, is false, or to say the least of it, unwise.

Surely the laborer is worthy of his hire, and the professional man should be allowed to advertise, if by so doing will help him to make an honest living. Even Hippocrates himself, if he lived in these days of competition, would admit this much.

THE CORONATION GIRL. The coronation, we are told, is to introduce a new type of girl—or rather it is to re-introduce a very charming old type.

For some years society has been devoid of the ingenuite. This generation of girls in England, as well as on this continent, springs from the status of school miss direct into woman-of-the-world hood. Our up-to-date maid, some people think, goes to extremes in freedom of dress, speech and conduct, and vies too much with matrons in the leadership of society.

But this dashing modern girl is to be toned down; she is to be relegated to a back seat at the English court; she is to be taught to be less exuberant in manner, to curtsy and to defer to her elders in conversation.

In short, it is promised that we shall have returned to "the old-fashioned 'sweet-simplicity' type of girl, who will blush, cultivate reserve of manner and conversation and wear simple gowns."

An American writer predicts that this sweet coronation maiden is to do a lot of important work and to become the prevailing type in Canada and the United States.

From the man's standpoint the jaunty independent girl makes a jolly good comrade, but the average bachelor, it is said, would probably prefer the sweet and simple maiden for a wife.

So, while we're sorry in a way to lose the cake-walk girl, perhaps we shall find the minut-maiden quite refreshing.

"THE SLEEPING EMPIRE BEYOND." The Minneapolis Journal has gathered together some interesting facts in regard to Western Canada, "the land of the warm, wet, western wind and the far-fung, fenceless prairie," which the late American Consul Taylor at Winnipeg called "the sleeping empire beyond."

A contemporary observes that in Manitoba and Assiniboia alone there are 60,000,000 acres of rich arable land, which could easily support a population of 6,000,000 with a present population of only 320,000. Much of this land formerly sold for \$3 an acre, but owing to the present immigration the price for favored sections has gone up to \$5 and sometimes \$15 an acre. Even \$50 an acre has been offered for choice lands in Southern Manitoba. The soil of this land is so deep that its fertility is almost inexhaustible.

THE PULP SCANDALS. Will The Globe tell the voters of Ontario, now about to cast their ballots, why the pulp limits were not put up at public auction, as the timber limits are put up? That is the way that the Liberals of other days favored. 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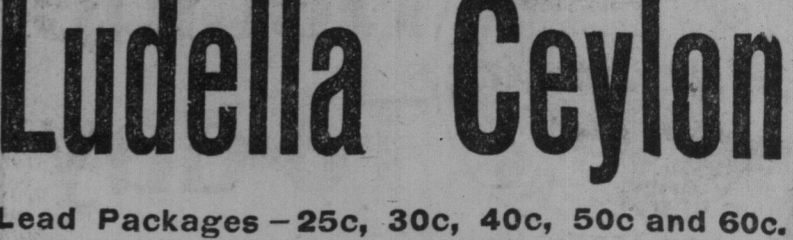
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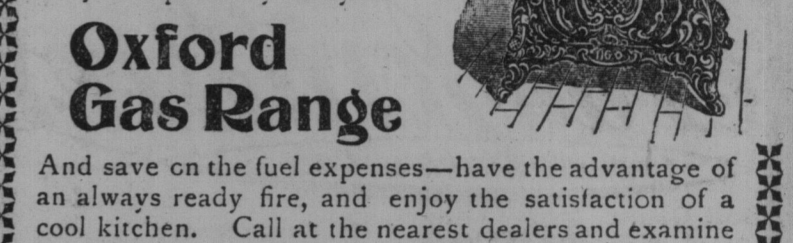

The Steamer Frithjof Will Depart From Tromsø on July 1.

UNDER DIRECTION OF W. S. CHAMP

It is believed that the America is Fast in the Ice Near Alger Island.

New York, April 28.—Plans for the auxiliary Baldwin-Stegier expedition to Polar regions have been completed.

The steamer Frithjof, which, with the America, conveyed the Baldwin party to Franz Josef Land, has been chartered for the work, and will depart from Tromsø on July 1.

The expedition will be directed by W. S. Champ, secretary to William Stegier, who will sail for Europe on the steamer Cymric on May 23.

The remainder of the party will leave on the steamer Pretoria on June 7. Mr. Champ and all of his assistants have had experience in Arctic regions.

CLAIMS ARTICLES WERE TRUE: Great Interest Taken in a Libel Suit Against Lord Truth.

London, April 28.—More interest than usually attaches to libel suits against Henry Labouchere was witnessed in a case before the King's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice today, in which Lord Suffield was the plaintiff.

Lord Suffield, who is permanent Lord in waiting to the King, claimed damages for articles published in Labouchere's newspaper, Truth, one article alleging that a club of which Lord Suffield was president, was "an impudent and transparent humbug," and that the council of the club and others connected with it were "a line of figureheads" on the front page of city prospectuses.

One of Truth's accusations was that Lord Suffield was "knowingly president of a swindle." The defendant admitted the publication, claimed that the statements and facts contained in the articles were true, and that the comment was fair.

SLAVE TRADING IS REVIVED MATTERS AT THE CITY HALL

Terrible Tragedy Believed to Be in Progress in the Congo Free State.

POWERS EXPECTED TO INVESTIGATE

Are Exchanging Notes With a View to Summoning a European Congress.

London, April 28.—It is reliably reported in London that notes are being exchanged between the great powers respecting a European congress to inquire into the administration of the Congo Free State. Whatever the outcome of the Socialist agitation in Belgium for a wider suffrage, no one need be surprised if the frivolous Leopold is called to account before long for tolerating shocking wickedness in the African dominion intrusted to his sway.

Re-establish Slave Trade.
Europe organized the Congo Free State principally to restate the slave trade in central Africa, and the convention which adopted the organic law for the territory expressly reserved to the contracting powers the right to intervene in certain conditions.

Evidence is Strong.
If recent reports from the Congo are reliable the ivory and rubber concessionaires have been committing or tolerating frightful atrocities. It is feared that behind the curtain which hides Central Africa from the view of the civilized world a terrible tragedy is in progress. Alarming rumors of punitive expeditions by Belgian and French colonels have reached Berlin and London. The missionaries here publish advices from missionaries in the region concerned that indicate a re-establishment of the slave trade by white traders under peculiarly cruel conditions.

The evidence is cumulative and strong, and the British religious community is amazed at details of outrages perpetrated by those whose duty it is to repress outrage.

"How has this been going on?" asks Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, a leading Methodist editor, "and will Lord Salisbury take steps to invite the earliest attention of the powers to a crime against civilization?"

King Leopold is directly responsible for the administration of the Congo Free State, and a congress to call him to book may be an event of the early future. The welfare of 30,000,000 blacks is involved.

STAPLE COMMODITIES.

Sir Richard Cartwright Introduced a Bill Making Some Changes.

Ottawa, April 28.—After routine in the house to-day, Sir R. Cartwright introduced a bill to amend the act respecting staple commodities. It adds the word "dealer" to the persons liable under the act, and deals with penalties to be inflicted in case of violation. It also amends the description of the goods, and adds "binder twine" to the list of articles dealt with by the act.

Sir Richard's bill substituted for the Chinese Immigration Act Amendment Bill a resolution to authorize a change in the proportion of the proceeds of the Chinese poll tax to be given to British Columbia.

TROOPER DRURY DEAD.
Ottawa, April 28.—The Militia Department has received word that Trooper Joseph Drury of the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles, who was killed by the Chinese at Klerkordop on April 24, Drury comes from Maple Creek, N. W. T.
