GOVT. INTRODUCE A BILL
TO ADD BRANCH LINES
TO PEOPLE'S RAILWAY
Principle of Public Own-
ship is Accepted and Sun-
dry Rumors Are
Dissipated.
W. F. MACLEAN URGES
EXTENSION TO WEST

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—(Special).—The
principle of public ownership was en-
dorsed by the government to-day as a
result of the discussion upon Hon.
George P. Graham's bill to acquire or
lease branch lines in connection with
the Intercolonial Railway. The prin-
ciple was admitted by Mr. Graham, in
that by his proposal will be extended
the ramifications of the government
railways.

This gave an opportunity to W. F.
Maclean (South York), one of the
strongest advocates of public own-
ership of the public utilities in this coun-
try, to put in a plea for still further
extension of the people's system.
"I am an absolute believer in the
public ownership of railways in Can-
ada," said Mr. Maclean. "Therefore, I
believe in this country owning and
maintaining in the highest efficiency
the Intercolonial. I would like to see
it extended and improved.

"I take this measure to be a declara-
tion in favor of the acquisition of local
lines, and that it will mean an end
of the talk and rumors and secret ne-
gotiations said to be under way concern-
ing the handing over of the Inter-
colonial, either to the Canadian Pacific
or the Canadian Northern."
On Business Terms.
"There is a declaration to-day in
favor of the extension of the principle
of government ownership of railways
to the wide extent of taking in all or
most of the local lines in the provinces
where the I. C. R. now runs. But if
they are to be taken in, they must be
taken in on business terms, and on
reasonable values, and when taken in
the roads so acquired, and the I. C. R.
itself, must be administered from the
point of view of business and effi-
ciency, and must be absolutely separa-
ted from politics.

"I believe that if public ownership is
attempted in this country on these
lines, it will succeed, and I hope that
not only will the I. C. R. be widened and
broadened in the extension of rail-
ways, but I think the day is near at hand
when this state owned road, which is
Canada's greatest asset, will be
extended from the Atlantic to the
Pacific.

Should Be Extended.
"I want to see the state-owned road
extended into Ontario, to the
Niagara River, and most of all I wish to see
it extended where there is abundance of
traffic, and where the competition of
such a road would discipline the great
private-owned roads that are in the
west."
"We were told a while ago that it
was very much in the air that the I. C.
R. was to pass into the hands of the
C.P.R.
or the Canadian Northern. Instead
of the disappearance of that road, I
wish to see it extended, its administra-
tion made efficient, and its operations
extended to the west. If there is room
in this country for the extension of
the I. C. R. to the Canadian west, there
should have been room—and there is
to-day room—for the extension of the
state-owned road to the Canadian west.

UNIONIST TARIFF WOULD PLACE DUTIES ON EVERYTHING BUT RAW MATERIALS

Of Simplest Form and Not Strictly Pro-
tective, But Assisting the Home
Producer, and Giving Prefer-
ence to the Colonies.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The Birmingham
Daily Post will to-morrow publish an
article from inspired sources, outlining
the tariff reform which is likely to be
proposed by the Unionist government,
if the Unionists are successful at the
elections, prefacing it with the remark
that the country's financial necessities
are much greater than they were in
1905, when Joseph Chamberlain started
the movement. The article pro-
ceeds:

"It is proposed to establish a general
tariff, placing duties on practically all
goods that are not deemed raw material
with the object, first, of raising revenue;
second, of assisting the home pro-
ducer against foreign competition;
third, of giving preference to colonies;
fourth, of securing better terms from
foreign countries, and finally, of miti-
gating unemployment by encouraging
the home producer.

AUXILIARY STEAM PLANT

B.C. Electric Railway Will Erect a Big
One at Vancouver.
VANCOUVER, Dec. 7.—(Special).—
General Manager Sproule of the B. C.
Electric Railway, on returning from
England to-day, announced that the di-
rectors had passed six million dollars
for expenditures. On large work to be
immediately undertaken for the
erecting of a 2,000-horsepower steam
auxiliary plant in Vancouver.
Nearly all the details of a project for
building a subway between the Inlet
front and the False Creek railway
yards have been worked out by the
local engineering staff of the C.P.R.,
and the work may be started next
year.

LARGEST GAS TANK EXPLODES AND KILLS 27

Others Will Die as Result of
Terrific Conflagration at
Hamburg—Loss Near-
ly Four Millions.

HAMBURG, Germany, Dec. 7.—The
explosion of two gas tanks on the so-
called "Kleine's Gasbrook," on the
Elbe front this afternoon was follow-
ed by an extensive fire and the loss
of many lives.

The explosion was due to a leak in a
new gasometer. Escaping gas entered
the retort house where it came in con-
tact with the fire, causing a terri-
fic explosion. A large number of work-
men were engaged in rebuilding, and
enlarging the plant. Twenty-five of
the men were employed near the gas-
ometer. They disappeared in a mass
of flames which shot up to a great
height.

Firemen with apparatus appeared
quickly on the scene, but they were
unable to approach in large force, owing
to the isolated situation of the es-
tablishment.
Up to a late hour to-night ten men
are reported dead and seventeen miss-
ing. It is almost certain that all of
these are dead. Forty men were dan-
gerously injured, of whom several can-
not recover.

The fire gained rapid headway and
threatened the old gasometer, contain-
ing 50,000 cubic metres of gas. So in-
tense was the heat, and so danger-
ous their position, the fire men were
compelled to draw to a safe distance.
A terrifying explosion soon occurred
and the tower became a mass of
flames, which leaped hundreds of feet
in the air, sending fragments of glow-
ing coke far and wide over the city
streets.

NEW PORT ARTHUR INDUSTRY

Canadian Linen and Paper Company
Will Spend a Lot of Money.
"PORT ARTHUR, Dec. 7.—(Special).—
The city council industrial committee
closed an agreement to-night with the
Canadian Linen and Paper Company,
represented by E. P. Bender, Winni-
peg, Dr. Phar, Winnipeg, H. F. Forrest,
Winnipeg, and Prof. Mayret, Franco,
to locate a new factory here for the
making of linen and paper from flax.
The company gets 50 acres site free,
but no bonus except tax exemption.
It will start May 1, 1910, on the erection
of a \$600,000 plant, and will spend \$250,
000, in five years and employ at least
100 men. The company will use an
entirely new and secret process making
flax into a greatly reduced cost. One
of the principal reasons in coming here
is to get water and air free from alkali.

of London wanted cement for munici-
pal purposes, and the citizens wanted
cement for private purposes, could the
province give the exclusive right to
the cement merchant to supply cement in
London?"
Mr. Gaskin, for the attorney-gener-
al, declared that there was nothing to
prevent any other company from
starting up to supply power in London
and that therefore the ratifying of the
agreement did not constitute an illegal
monopoly.
Chancellor Boyd remarked that if it
was shown that the matter was one for
the legislature and not the Dominion
parliament, then there could be no
question as to the right of the legisla-
ture to ratify the agreement.

PAINLESS SURGERY A FACT

Roumanian Scientist Demonstrates His Discovery in New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Before an audience of distinguished surgeons, Prof. Thomas Jannesco, the Roumanian scientist, to-day demonstrated that painless operations could be performed upon patients while they remained unconscious.

Instead of rendering the patient unconscious with ether, Prof. Jannesco hypodermically injects stovaine into the spine at the same time administering strychnine to strengthen the heart. Three children and a woman were operated upon by local surgeons. The patients watched the operations and conversed with the surgeons while they operated, without feeling the least pain.

Dr. Wm. J. Mayo of Rochester, Minn., was so impressed that he invited the Roumanian scientist to visit the west. Dr. Jannesco accepting.

CRIMINAL SESSIONS OPENED

Judge Winchester Says Perjury is Too Common in Canadian Courts.

The criminal sessions opened yesterday at noon before Judge Winchester and after his honor's address to the jury and the reading of the names of Clerk Evans of those applying for naturalization. The court was adjourned till this morning. The first case to be heard will be the charge against David Epstein for receiving stolen goods.

His honor in addressing the grand jury made reference to the resignation of H. L. Drayton as county crown-attorney in which he praised the work of Mr. Drayton. He congratulated the county on the appointment of James Baird, K.C., who he had no doubt would prove very capable. 'Perjury,' said his honor, 'is becoming much too common, and where you find by the evidence that this has been committed you must deal harshly with it.'

The judge asked the grand jury not to visit the public institutions as they had been visited by several juries this year. There are 35 cases on the list, 16 of which are new ones, the rest having been transferred from former sittings. Clerk Evans read the names of 68 foreigners who have applied for naturalization.

OVERCROWDING EVIL

Can't All Live in Ten Thousand Houses, Says Magistrate.

Overcrowding in a number of Italian boarding houses was the reason given by the medical health department for summoning a number of Italians to the afternoon police court yesterday. There were seven cases altogether, but only the charge against F. Rocco was taken into.

Inspector Robert Johnson swore he had inspected Rocco's house and found three sleeping rooms furnished to accommodate nine people. 'We cannot all sleep in \$10,000 houses,' said Magistrate Kingsford, 'We have got to do the best we can. There are a lot of busybodies who don't understand the realities of life. He'll have to get a hotel like the King Edward.'

BATH ACADEMY BURNED

Fire Broke Out While Pupils Were at Lunch.

BATH, Ont., Dec. 7.—Fire at noon today destroyed the academy. Pupils at lunch discovered the flames, but too late to head them off. A defective furnace is blamed. The building and school contents, including a library worth \$300 were insured for \$3000.

The lodge rooms of the A. O. U. W., I. O. F., C. O. F. and C. O. C. F. were on the upper floors, and all the furnishings are destroyed.

Equalization of Work. As a result of the labor and investigations of Dr. Merchant, inspector of schools for the Ontario department of education, important changes are being made in the direction of an equalization of the work of public school inspectors, by which none of the latter will have more than 100 schools under his charge. SOUZA WINS PLAUDITS

'March King' Delights Two Large Audiences in Massey Hall.

Yesterday afternoon and evening in Massey Hall, John Philip Sousa again proved himself the ingenious 'March King' and the leader of the finest brass and reed concert band in the world. Despite the inclemency of the weather, large and enthusiastic audiences were at both concerts, and Mr. Sousa, as his custom, generously gave the people more than their money's worth by playing to each one of his inimitable marches. He is gifted with first-rate melodic invention and rhythmic originality, but one can easily recognize his marches by a sort of stereotyped harmonization which belongs to all of them.

As to the band itself, it played perfectly, so far as precision, unanimity and dynamic gradations of tone were concerned. But without springs in the personnel of the band, it seems a mistake for Mr. Sousa to attempt such ambitious music as the Prelude and Liebestod from Wagner's 'Tristan and Isolde,' the spiritual quality, the emotional nuances are lost in the brass and reeds. However, what was attempted under the conditions was played in a genuinely masterly manner. And Mr. Sousa is doing a good work in familiarizing untalented music lovers with the works of the great masters.

Tendency of Recent Years is to More Substantial Things for Men Folk.

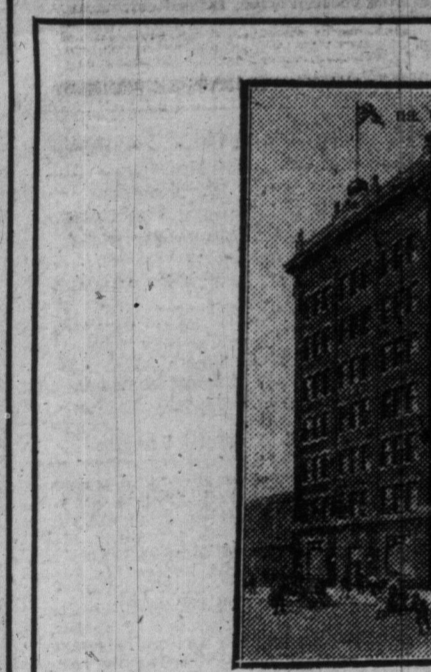
