

 III. A partial eclipse of the moon, October 16th. First contact with shadow, 0h. 41m. A.M. Middle of eclipse, 1h. 36m. A.M. Last contact with shadow, 2h. 31m. A.M. Toronto time. Magnitude of eclipse (Moon's diameter=1), 0.23.
 IV. An annual eclipse of the sun, October 30th, invisible on this continent, except in British Columbia and California.
 Venus will be a morning star till September 20th, afterwards an evening star; at its greatest brilliancy January 10th.
 Jupiter will be a morning star to July 5th, afterwards an evening star.
 Saturn will be a morning star to May 20th, afterwards an evening star.

Important to Owners of Horses.

INFORMATION ON THE NATURE OF HEAVES, BROKEN WIND, CHRONIC COUGH, ETC.

The lungs in horses, as in the human race, are composed of numerous cells which run through every part of that organ. The internal surface of these cells is lined with a very fine, delicate and sensible membrane, on which the minute capillary branches of the pulmonary arteries and veins are copiously ramified, and it is while circulating in the small vessels of this membrane, and there ex-



← DYEING. →

General Remarks.

1ST. SCOURING.—In order that the colors should be uniform, it is necessary to thoroughly cleanse the wool, yarn, or cloth from grease or dirt, by scouring with soft soap and hot water, afterwards rinsing in clear, soft, warm water. When dried it is ready for any ordinary color, but if for any bright color, the goods should be passed through a "sour bath," consisting of enough vinegar or oil of vitriol to make the rinsing water taste sour. The purpose of this is, to destroy all traces of alkali from the soap, which would tend to deaden the shades.

2ND. KETTLES.—They should be large in proportion to the goods, as all the color is equally taken up from a large or small quantity of water, and with plenty of water there is better opportunity of handling and opening the goods, thereby preventing spotting. The Kettle should be of copper or brass, and perfectly clean. Iron is very unsuitable, unless enamelled; if the enamel is broken or worn off in spots it is useless.

3RD. WATER.—The water should be soft and free from soap.

4TH. COLORS.—Black will cover any other color, and any color may be put on a white ground, but generally the color to be made should be darker than that already existing. Scarlet will cover salmon, yellow and orange. Purple will cover light blue, orange and light green. Green will cover blue, yellow, pink, &c. Brown will cover drab, orange, purple and light green.

SCARLET(very superior).—Three ounces of cochineal, three ounces of cream of tartar, and four ounces of solution of tin; powder the cochineal and rub through a bag into blood warm water sufficient to cover the yarn; when it is a little warm put in the cream of tartar, and simmer, then add your solution of tin; your yarn must be wet with clean water; steep it in the dye till the yarn is properly dyed. Dry your yarn before you wash it. This will color three pounds.

WINE COLOR.—One pound of wool, half a pound of red powder, one ounce of madder compound. Soak the powdered wool in warm water all night, mix the madder compound with about half a pint of water (in a glass), and add it to the rest; rinse the wool in warm water and put it in the dye; boil about half an hour; take out the wool and rinse it in cold water. A color almost as fine may be had by using a quarter of a pound of alum, and boiling in the same way.

GREEN.—For five pounds goods use five pounds fustic and eighteen ounces alum. Soak in water until the strength is extracted, put in the goods until of a good yellow color, remove the chips and add extract of indigo in small quantities at a time until the color is satisfactory.

PINK.—For every three pounds of yarn or cloth take three and a half quarts of water, or enough to cover the article you wish to color, two ounces of cochineal, and half an ounce of cream of tartar; steep the cochineal in warm water two hours, or until the strength is entirely extracted, and add the cream of tartar; then wet the cloth in clear water, wring it out and put it in the dye—bring it to a scalding heat, let it remain in a few moments, and it will be finished.

BLACK ON WOOL, SILK OR COTTON.—For every pound of cloth, it will require one ounce of extract of logwood and half an ounce of blue vitriol. Prepare an iron kettle with a sufficient quantity of water to admit the yarn or cloth to be worked in

the dye, without being crowded; bring the water to a scalding heat, then put in the yarn or cloth a few minutes; when it is thoroughly wet, take it out and drain it; in the next place add the blue vitriol, and when dissolved and the water skimmed carefully, put in the material to be colored, and let it remain half an hour at a scalding heat, airing it occasionally; then take it out and rinse it in soft water; the vitriol water may be emptied into a separate vessel, and the extract of logwood dissolved in a sufficient quantity of water, brought to a scalding heat, and skimmed; put in the cloth, keeping the dye in the same temperature, and let it remain half an hour, airing it frequently; then take it out and drain it; add the vitriol water to the dye, and put it in again; let it remain fifteen minutes, airing as before. Cleanse it well. For cotton, add a little common glue.

CRIMSON.—Use one pound of lac dye, together with two ounces of madder compound, to every two pounds of cloth or yarn. Soak the lac dye over night in a brass or copper kettle, then add the compound and stir; then the cloth, and bring your dye slowly to a scalding heat; then vary the time as you wish the color. If dark, let it remain some hours; if not, one hour; then rinse in soft water without soap.

BROWN.—For each pound of wool take a quarter pound of alum and two ounces of cream of tartar, and boil for half an hour. Take half a pound of red powder, quarter pound of fustic, and two ounces of logwood chips; soak these a night in sufficient warm water to cover the wool; take the wool out of the alum water, and boil with the woods for about half an hour. If a dark brown is wanted, add about a tablespoonful of copperas.

MADDER RED.—Take one pound of madder for every two pounds of yarn or cloth; soak the madder in a brass or copper kettle one night in warm water, enough to cover the yarn you wish to color; next morning put in two ounces of madder compound for every pound of madder which you have soaked, then wet your yarn or cloth in clean water, and wring it out in clean water; afterwards put in the dye; now place the kettle over the fire and bring it slowly to a scalding heat, which will take about half an hour; keep it at this heat half an hour if a light red is wanted, and longer if a dark one, the color depending upon the time it remains in the dye. When the color is made, rinse the cloth immediately in cold water; it will then be finished.

YELLOW.—One pound of wool or cloth, three-quarters of a pound of fustic, quarter pound of alum; put all into an earthen vessel and pour on sufficient hot water to cover the wool and keep it warm all night; give it half an hour's boil in a brass kettle, and then rinse in cold water. A much deeper and richer yellow may be had by using turmeric powder instead of fustic, and proceeding in the same manner.

CHEAP BROWN FOR WOOL OR COTTON.—For ten pounds goods, take half pound japonica, one ounce blue vitriol, two ounces dichromate of potash; put the japonica into four gallons of soft water, boil until dissolved, add the blue vitriol and stir well; put in the goods and keep at boiling point for two hours; wring out and put into the solution made with the potash, let it remain for half an hour, then wash in soap suds.

WINE COLOR.—For five pounds goods take one pound of camwood, boil twenty minutes, dip the goods one hour, boil again and dip forty minutes, then darken with one and a half ounces blue

vitriol, and should you wish it darker, add half pound copperas.

PURPLE.—For ten pounds of goods use three-quarters pound alum, one teacup muriate of tin, pulverized cochineal quarter pound, cream of tartar quarter pound. Boil the alum, tin, and cream of tartar for twenty minutes, add the cochineal and boil five minutes; immerse the goods two hours, remove and enter them in a new dye, composed of Brazil wood, three-quarters pound; logwood, one and three-quarters pound; alum, one pound; muriate of tin, two cupfuls, adding a little extract of indigo.

ORANGE.—For ten pounds goods, use sugar of lead half a pound, boil fifteen minutes; when a little cool enter the goods and dip for two hours, wring out, make a fresh dye with bichromate of potash, one pound; madder, one quarter pound; immerse until of the desired shade. The shade may be varied by dipping in lime water.

LIGHT SILVER DRAB.—For five pounds of goods, use one and a half ounces of logwood; alum, one and a half ounces. Boil well, enter the goods and dip for one hour. Grade the color to any desired shade by using equal parts of logwood and alum.

LILAC (for silk).—For one pound of silk use archil, one and a half pounds. Mix it well with the liquor, make it boil quarter of an hour, dip the silk quickly, then let it cool, and wash in soft or river water.

GREEN.—For every pound of yarn or cloth, add three and a half ounces of alum and one pound of fustic; steep to get the strength, but not boil; soak the cloth until it acquires a good yellow color; throw out the chips and add the indigo compound slowly, until you have the desired shade of green. An ounce or more of the compound is required for the above quantity, varied according to the depth of shade.

BLUE.—A splendid blue may be produced in an hour by the following process:—For each pound of wool or cloth take two and a half ounces of alum and one ounce and a half of cream of tartar. Boil these together in a brass or copper kettle for about an hour; now take sufficient warm water to cover the cloth or wool, and color it to the shade you wish with the liquid blue; put the whole into the copper pot and boil it a short time, taking care to keep it stirred; remove the cloth and rinse in clear cold water, and hang it up to dry.

SALMON.—Take one pound of wool, a quarter of a pound of annatto, and a quarter of a pound of soap. Take water sufficient to cover the wool, in which dissolve the annatto and soap; rinse the wool in warm water, put it into the annatto mixture and boil about half an hour. The shade may be made lighter or deeper according to the quantity of annatto used.

PURPLE.—For every pound of yarn or cloth, take two ounces of cudbear, rinse the cloth well in soap suds, then dissolve the cudbear in hot suds (not quite boiling), and soak the cloth till of the required color. The color is brightened by rinsing in alum water.

ORANGE (on cotton).—For one pound, take two ounces sugar of lead and one and a half ounces of bichromate of potash. Dissolve each separately in just enough boiling water to cover the cotton, and dip it alternately from one to the other three times, or until the desired shade is obtained.

BLUE (on cotton).—For one pound take two ounces of copperas, dissolve it in sufficient boiling water, put the cotton in, and let it soak one hour. Dissolve three-quarters of an ounce of prussiate of potash in same quantity of fresh boiling water, and add half an ounce of sulphuric acid (by weight), then dip the cotton alternately from one to the other three times, or until the desired change is obtained, and rinse well with cold water.

GREEN (on cotton).—Dip the cotton colored blue into the orange dye.

PINK (on cotton).—For five pounds, take two pounds of newwood and four ounces solution of tin; put the cotton in and let it remain till the shade suits.

NEW BROWN.—For five pounds, take four ounces bichromate of potash, half pound camwood, and two and a half pounds of fustic. Dissolve the bichromate of potash in boiling water, put the yarn in and boil for one hour, take the yarn out and rinse in cold water; put in enough fresh water, add the woods, then the yarn, and boil for an hour and a half.

DOVE AND SLATE COLORS OF ALL SHADES are made by boiling in an iron vessel a teacupful of black tea with a teaspoonful of copperas and sufficient water. Dilute this till you get the shade wanted.

All fancy colors should be colored in brass or copper vessels, with plenty of soft water, and wet before putting them into the dye.


