FIRST AID WORK

Ottawa, Feb. 26.—The Duke of Devonshire, who presided at the annual meeting of the St. John Ambulance Association, has become patron, succeeding H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, During the last year the association has instructed more than 10,000 people in first aid and home nursing, and also taught more than 100,000 Canadian soldiers what to do in case of injuries. In almost every province, school teachers are required to qualify in first aid and in the mining districts this also applies to those in charge. 

Today these same British regiments are fighting with a push and vigor that is wearing down the German wall before them."



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


