## THE LATE WALTER R. FINSON

Of the death of Walter R. Finson, in Bangor, the Commercial says:—  
"A sad tragedy that will bring sorrow to many, occurred Friday forenoon about 8:30 o'clock when Walter R. Finson, for many years a customs official at Vancouver, committed suicide by shooting himself in his room at the residence of his brother, Jerome C. Finson, in Essex street. A revolver was the weapon used."  
"The cause of the act was dependency occasioned by ill health."  
"Mr. Finson was born in Levant sixty-one years ago and for twenty-three years was associated at Vancouver as inspector of customs, resigning two years ago on account of ill health. He had since made his home with his brother. He was a conscientious and obliging official and his many friends among the travelling public will regret to learn of his death."  
"Mr. Finson's wife died nineteen years ago and he leaves two brothers, Jerome C. Finson of this city and James T. Finson of St. Paul, Minn., and a sister, Mrs. William Heugens of this city."  
"The news of the death of Mr. Finson was learned with regret by friends in St. John. He had many friends here. Up to two years ago, when his health began to cause him trouble and ill health he had been a regular visitor to St. John in his run from Vancouver."

## COM. WIGMORE SUBMITS REPORT

Annual Statement of Water and Sewerage Department TO COUNCIL TODAY

Reports Great Improvements To Systems at Lower Costs Than Before—Surplus of \$20,000—Some of the Figures

R. W. Wigmore, commissioner of water and sewerage, submitted his annual report at the meeting of the common council this afternoon. The most important sections of the report are given herewith. The full report contains much valuable information in addition.

Your Worship and Commissioners—  
Gentlemen—  
I hereby submit the fifty-ninth annual report of the water and sewerage department and my third report as commissioner of water and sewerage. The total expenditure has been as follows:

Sewerage Department  
Construction account. \$17,371.13  
Maintenance account. 16,987.74  
Interest and sinking fund. 28,016.73  
Fire Hydrants. 14,071.63  
Grand total. \$82,796.87

The most important construction work was the building of a thirty-six inch masonry sewer along the shore of Marble Cove, a distance of about 1,800 feet, at a cost of \$14,000.

The total cost of new main sewers for 1914 was \$19,009.45; main pipe extensions, maintenance account, \$6,840; construction account \$7,884.43.

Water Reserve Account.  
Following the practice of former years the sum of \$18,066.57 was set apart from last year's surplus for the renewal of old and small water mains. The sum of \$12,283.03 was spent and 7,001 feet of pipe laid from this account, leaving \$5,784.54, plus \$4,297.28 from this year's surplus, for next year's operations.

The water maintenance account shows expenditures of \$189,481.64, including interest \$80,463.07, and sinking fund, \$31,448.53. The receipts were \$209,669.02, including assessment \$169,073.84, meter customers, \$40,230.99, and steamship supplies, \$6,930.36, leaving an unexpended balance of \$20,187.38.

Population Served.  
The estimated population of the city and parishes of Lancaster and Simonds is 62,470, of whom 54,564 are supplied by the city water system with an average daily consumption of 228 gallons per day per consumer on the east side and 292 gallons on the West Side.

Leading Mains.  
No repairs have been effected on either the wood stave pipe or conduits. There were four leaks on the thirty-six inch main, seven leaks on the twenty-four inch main, and ten on the twelve inch main on the East Side; eight of these required pipe renewals. On the West Side there were seven leaks on the twenty-four inch main, all minor repairs.

Distribution Mains.  
Under this head \$683 feet of new extensions were made at a cost of \$6,840. The twelve inch main between Marsh Bridge and One Mile House was thoroughly repaired and in places renewed at a cost of \$1,896.56. This main is used to supply the new sugar refinery.

Service Pipes.  
136 new service pipes were laid at a cost of \$3,998.22.  
One hundred and fifteen service pipes were renewed at a cost of \$2,170.87, over three thousand feet of lead pipe being used.  
Special efforts were made to reduce the enormous waste caused by leaky pipes and defective fittings and also by the habit of allowing water to waste in cold weather. Probably one-fifth of our service pipes are defective, and another and, as an 18-inch stream will waste about 8,000 gallons daily. About one-half of this consumption is wasted by one-fifth of the people. The only remedy seems to be to meter all services commencing at these points defective, and continuing as our finances will allow. I will report further on this matter shortly.

Meters.  
Forty-five new meters were placed and sixteen taken out, nineteen others were exchanged. Total number in use 294.  
Fire Hydrants.  
The expenditure for fire hydrants was \$10,071.55. New hydrants to the number of twenty-nine were installed at a cost of \$8,919.94. Twenty-four were renewed at a cost of \$2,000.62.

Sewerage Maintenance.  
The expenditure for sewerage maintenance was \$19,967. Interest \$19,982; sinking fund, \$5,083.  
Catch Basins.  
Thirteen new inlets costing \$870.45, were added, making the total 1068.  
Sewer Extensions.  
In addition to new sewers chargeable to bond issue sewers were laid from maintenance account in St. John street, Albert street, St. James street, West End, Gregory road and Londonderry avenue, at a cost of \$1,368.58.

General.  
While the foregoing gives a general idea of the work of the department during the year, it does not tell of the splendid co-operation of the employees by which more work has been done at no perceptible increase of cost, notwithstanding that both wages and material have considerably increased. I am pleased to be able to report on this loyal service.

THE WAR NEWS

The great struggle in the Carpathians is still raging, and the Russians are declared to be making steady progress toward the plains of Hungary.

A London cable says that the government may prohibit the sale of spirits that total prohibition is not expected. It is added that more and more evidence is being produced to show that the consumption of spirits is largely responsible for slackness in labor circles in providing munitions of war.

F. B. CARVELL HONORED

The people of the united counties of Carleton-Victoria had an opportunity yesterday to express their feeling in relation to Mr. F. B. Carvell and his career as a public man.

Mr. Carvell's opponent is Mr. J. K. Fleming. Surely it is not necessary to say more to give assurance of the election of Mr. Carvell. Mr. Dugal was at the convention yesterday, and was given the splendid reception which he too deserves at the hands of the people of this province.

Mr. Dugal in the legislature last year declared his willingness to forfeit his seat if he could not prove certain very definite charges against Mr. Fleming, who was then premier of the province. Failure to prove the charges would have driven Mr. Dugal from the house. Mr. Dugal is still in the house, and Mr. Fleming is not; and yet, Mr. Fleming is the federal-toy candidate opposing Mr. Carvell.

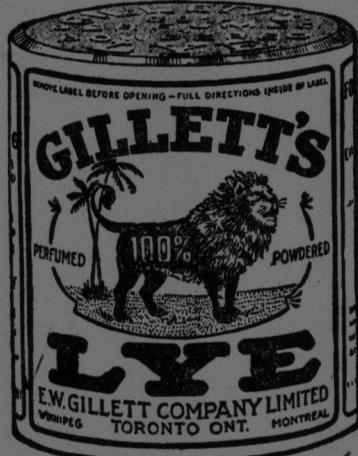
Building operations promise to be fairly active, both in East and West St. John, as well as toward and beyond Coldbrook, during the spring and summer.

## GREAT AIM OF GERMANS IS TO DESTROY LONDON

Hopes For Successful Zeppelin Raid Still Run High

(Cable to Montreal Gazette.)

London, April 5.—A "neutral observer," writing in the Times of his latest visit to Germany, says:

"The Germans are utterly disappointed with their Zeppelins. London, they repeat, must be bombarded. Not all, but a majority of the Germans are glad to hear of the killing of English cities, no matter whether they are women or soldiers; but London is the place they aim at and want to destroy."

"It is fully realized now that the German army will never be able to enter London because they understand at last the impossibility of landing an army. At the end of 1912 Germany possessed more than thirty airships of different models. What the exact number is at present nobody outside the highest military circles knows for certain. I had the other day an interesting conversation with a business man who holds a patent for the manufacture of a special article necessary for Zeppelins. He said: 'Even I do not know the exact number and present strength of Germany's air fleet, but I cannot believe that it has increased since the beginning of the war. On the contrary, I am of the opinion that we have just been able to replace our losses, which have been much greater than were expected. But the coming six months will enable us to build fifteen to eighteen new Zeppelins of a greatly improved model, better armed and able to carry more than two tons of explosives.'

"This air fleet is most likely being built for the purpose of reaching London. That city will not be approached by one or two airships, but by many, and quite regardless of possible losses. If we have not yet made an attempt on London, it is because our Zeppelins needed special improvement, as shown by experiments during the war. It is also of the highest importance to the leaders of the aerial expedition to have before they start an exact knowledge of the meteorological conditions. It has hampered us greatly that English authorities have not sent out any news about the meteorological conditions since the war began."

"If the war lasts another year I should not advise you to remain in London and, if you do, remember my warning. But, personally, I do not think there will be any Zeppelin raids in London before late in the summer."

To equip a ward in Dr. MacLaren's hospital where the New Brunswick wounded will be treated, is surely an object which will appeal to patriotic and generous St. John. The ladies of the Brunswick Chapter, Daughters of the Empire, have decided to undertake to equip a new Brunswick ward in this hospital, and they are asking that subscriptions be sent to the secretary, Mrs. (Dr.) J. H. Allingham, Fairville, or the treasurer, Mrs. Hetherington, Provincial Hospital.  
 The chapter desires to raise \$2,000 for this purpose. It will cost \$50 to provide each bed, and subscribers who feel able to pay for or to help in the purchase of over it. The ward will be known as the New Brunswick ward, and in it most of the wounded soldiers from this province will be received and treated. The campaign this spring and summer will be a very deadly one, and more and more accommodation for wounded men will be needed from week to week.

**SHELL EXPLODED ONLY 15 FEET AWAY**

Fairville Soldier Writes of a Close Call

**TERRIFIC BOMBARDMENT**

George A. Dalzell's Letter From the Front Says the Life is Not By Any Means All Hardship

George A. Dalzell, a British reservist, formerly with the artillery, and now attached to the telephone section on the firing line in France, has written another interesting letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. A. Dalzell, of Prospect street, Fairville. The letter is dated March 21, but no place is mentioned.  
 "I am still in the land of the living," he writes, "and feeling well, though there have been lively times here all of last week, and on at least one occasion I had a close call."  
 "At 5 o'clock on last Sunday the Germans opened a bombardment, using hundreds of guns, and the sight was certainly grand, the whole place alight with bursting shells, accompanied by the roar which is music to the artilleryman. You no doubt will read all about it in the papers, but it was my privilege to see and hear at first hand.  
 "We have been fairly quiet today with the exception of dozens of aeroplanes flying over the town and dropping bombs as a reminder. A few heavy shells were also dropped into the town, and a few odd men killed. One of the aeroplanes flying well up in the air, dropped a bomb at our house which, being painted white and set apart, had proved an attractive mark, but the thrower missed his mark by exactly fifteen feet, the bomb dropping in the garden. There were no casualties.  
 "These bombs make an awful noise, and we could not hear for fully ten minutes after the explosion. I was shaving at the time and nearly cut myself. (What death only fifteen feet away, I suppose it could be called a close shave).  
 "The colonel watched the flight of the bomb all the way down, and when the earth and stones, which had been cast into the air by the force of explosion, had subsided, we all scrambled into the hole looking for curios.  
 "We rose on the eighth week on the firing line, and I like it better every day. Spring weather has now favored us in most respects, the roads are all drying up, so we will soon be advancing and drive the Germans back into their own country.  
 "I have been particularly struck with the tone of your letters since I have been at the front. You say you don't like to think of me lying on the hard, cold ground. Just think for a minute, and you will realize that falling up there is harder than soldiering. What will you say when I tell you we have a spring bed to sleep on, two easy chairs for my use besides a comfortable sofa, an oak cabinet to store my kit and eating utensils in, and best of all a house-like nature, pretty curtains on the windows. Our bill of fare is excellent, including ham and eggs for breakfast, roast beef, vegetables and fixings for dinner, and a supper, along similar lines.  
 "At leisure we play skat and have some music. Of course we are shelled pretty often when out repairing wires or fixing up connections on trees, when the enemy can easily spot you, but we get used to it, and since the Germans rarely hit anyone, why should we worry?"

On last Friday evening a business meeting of the Fairville Baptist Church a vote on the proposed legislation to prohibit the sale of liquor in New Brunswick during the war, was carried unanimously.  
 On Sunday evening special Easter music was rendered, and there was an exceptionally large congregation, the annual secretary to assist in accompanying the people.  
 The liquor matter was again put to the public test by Rev. P. H. Hayward and an enthusiastic standing vote taken in the affirmative. The action of the congregation will be reported to Premier Clarke by Rev. Mr. Hayward. Individual members were also urged to write personal letters to the premier.

 Mrs. Anglin reported that the articles sent by this society to the receiving depot in St. John were most satisfactory. The thoroughness of the work done and attention to detail had been most favorably commented upon. "An effort will be made to increase the output this month."
