MONTREAL, July 27—An increase of \$11,114,314.19 or 296.99 per cent. in net earnings for the first six months of 1926, as compared with the same Canadian National Railways for the period January 1st to June 30th, 1926, issued today. This statement also shows the highest grass for any first half year since consolidated system figures were set up in June, 1922, and the highest gross and net for any June since that time.

For the half year ending June 30, 1926 gross earnings were \$120,989,009, as against \$105,543,743 in the first half of 1925, an increase of \$15,445,265 or 14.63 per cent. Operating expenses in the 1926 period were \$106,132,347.48 as compared with \$101,801,397.17 in the first half of 1925. Net earnings for the first half of 1926, were \$14,856,660.52 as against \$3,742,345.83 during the corresponding period of 1925.

For Installment Plan, Says President DAVID MAGEE, president of the Retail Merchants' Associa-

tion, says he has read with interest The Times-Star symposium of discussions of the present system of civic assessment and the obervations upon taxation matters generally made by officials and citizens interviewed. The whole thing has been educational to the public at large, but Mr. Magee figures only the surface is scratched yet. A concerted movement might now ensue through co-operation of citizen bodies and the method of collecting taxes be brought up-to-date. This should insure a clean-up of each year's levy and prevent the accumulating load of bad accounts, which he thinks is due in a very large measure to old-fashioned methods.

CASE IS STRENGTHENED

SINCE the R. M. A. suggested installment taxes, scores of loyal, SINCE the R. M. A. suggested installment taxes, scores of loyal, reputable citizens have volunteered evidence that strengthens the case for the plaintiff. Many a man taxed from \$50 upwards could pay the levy at stated periods, while it would be a distinct hardship, perhaps an imposibility, to demand it of him at once. He is forced to accept the penalty of added interest and constable's fees as well as to bear the ignominy of enforced collection. There is no inviolate law in such matters. Cities must keep pace with the times, especially with the money conditions that dominate commerce and private purse. It is sheer stubbornness and short-sightedness to argue otherwise, he said.



Bootleggers Must Pay Income SETLEMENT MADE Tax, Declares Privy Council IN OILFIELD SCRAP

ONDON, July 27.—Bootleggers must pay Deminion income tax, the same as persons engaged in lawful business, according to the decision of the judicial committee of the Privy Council, given today in the appeal of the Canadian Minister of Finance against the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of Cecil R. Smith, of Widsor, Ont. The appeal was allowed and the respondent, Cecil R.

Smith, was ordered to pay the costs of the appeal. Their Lordships, in giving judgment on the appeal from the Supreme Court's declaration that income received from illicit transactions, such as bootlegging, is not subject to the Federal income tax, state that they find no valid reason for holding that the Dominion Parliament intended to exclude such dealers from the operation of the income tax. They state that this is particularly the case as such exclusion would result in increasing the burden of taxation on those people throughout Canada who are engaged in lawful business.

PHINNEY SAYS N. S. BEARING UNFAIR SHARE OF C.

Case For Lower Rail N. S. Claims Rates Presented To Duncan Commission

HALIFAX, N. S., July 26—Continuing the presentation of Nove Scotia's case before the Royal Commission investigating the situation of the Maritime Provinces within the Canadian Confederation, Lieut.-Col. E. C. Phinney today reviewed the claims of the province with respect to Federal grants and debt allowances, western lands, and boundary extensions, and introduced the subject of railway fraight rates.

Lieut.-Col. Phinney confined his arguments this afternoon to an outline of what the province would lay before the commission to support its claim that Nova Scotia had not benefited in the matter of transportation facilities as had been expected under railway agreements, entered into and that the province was bearing an unfair share of the burdens that should be carried by the entire Canadian National System as a whole.

The case would show, he said, that traffic had been diverted from the natural north and south course to an artificial east and west route and that artificial rails would have to be set up to George Buckley of Model Farm offset the resultant situation.

S. RATES REFERRED TO. The trans-continental railways traressed Canada, he pointed out, with standard rates covering the entire continent, and special treatment to suit the special requirements of certain localities impossible of application. He referred to the United States which had no trans-continental railways. With the country traversed by smaller groups linked up to form a whole, special rates were possible to certain localities.

CROW'S NEST RATES.

The Crow's Nest pass rates were based on demands of the grain growers of the west for rates that were really below the cost of transportation. In that connection he pointed out that the Atlantic Region was bearing the entire cost of terminal maintenance and, he added, it was a fact that the Atlantic Region terminal maintenance was the most expensive of any terminal facilities maintained by the entire system. The cost should not be entirely borne by the Atlantic Region, inasmuch as it penalized that region for the circumstance of being the terminal.

Sir Andrew asked for the exact cost of terminal facilities and was advised that the figures were the property of the railways and could not be made public.

Regarding the Moncton staff, Lt.-Col.
