Desperate Efforts of The Germans at Rheims Fail

Deliberate Destruction of Fame 1 Cathedral Which Was Housing Red Cross Workers — Terrific Hand to Hand **Fighting**

Chalons-Sur-Marne, via Paris, Sept.

21—The Germans continued bombarding the buildings of Rheims yesterday and last night. The crumbling walls are all that are left of the thirteenth century cathedral, the most remarkable example that was left of early-Gothic architecture. In addition to the cathedral, the museum, the hospitals and the city hall, were partly destroyed. Several inhabitants of the city were killed.

In spite of the bombardment and their repeated attacks upon it, the Germans have been unable to take Rheims, which they evidently desire so as to have command of the railways leading to Charleville, Verdun and Chalons. The allies have repulsed the German attacks and made several impetuous counter movements in which their infantry charged.

London, Sept. 20, 9.45 p. m.—One of the fiercest battles of all times which has been raging across northern France for a week past remains undecided. The two great armies which have been fighting for a month, with few, if any, intermissions, have dug themselves into entrenchments on rivers and mountain ranges on a front reaching from the Oise to the Meuse and thence southeastward along the Franco-German frontier.

Artillery duels such as never have been seen before are being carried on with the hope of compelling the evacuation of the strongly held positions, with occasional success to the opposing sides, while the infantry, in the face of a galling fire, have charged right up to the guns, only to make their opponents give way slightly, or to be repulsed with great losses.

The fighting has been fiercest on the allies' left, which lies on the right bank of the River Oise, in the vicinity of Rheims, the famous cathedral of which has been set afire by German shells, and between that town and the Argonne ridge it has been give and take all the time.





Russian Official Statement Settles Question of Who is to Blame For War

London, Sept. 21-On the subject of the Russian official orange book on the diplomatic antecedents of the war, tion with the official papers issued by the British foreign office, the publication completes the chain of evidence fixing irrevocably upon Germany and

fixing irrevocably upon Germany and Austria the responsibility for the outbreak of the war.

The despatches given prove, says the paper, that Russia made efforts to avert the conflict by finding a formula satisfactory to Austria and acceptable to Servia, On July 18, it is stated, Sergius Sazanoff, Russian minister of foreign affairs, instructed the Russian ambassador at Rome to urge Italy to use her influence with Austria in favor of peace.
