NEW CUNARDER AT MONTREAL ON SUNDAY

Montreal, July 28—The new Cunard liner Andania arrived in port yesterday on her maiden voyage from Southampton. Captain Miller today expressed himself as well pleased with the vessel's behaviour on the passenger were unanimous in their appreciation of the accommodations.

Being a fiew ship, no attempt was mader to test the speed of the Andania, and as a dense fing was experienced for three days it would have been impossible. 

After a strenuous but fruitless effort had been made to keep him from going into the water, George Akerley, aged twenty-two, of 288 Brussels street, plunged to his death on Saturday night in the waters of Courtenay Bay, near the foot of Hanover street. 


