Spooled Baskets

PUBLIC NOTICE

In any spools. An ordinary willow basket with a wooden base about ten inches in diameter, is the foundation; the sides of the basket are about three to four inches in height. The willow of which the sides are woven is carefully taken off the uprights, which are about an inches or inch and a half apart, furnish just the right holders for spools, says an exchange. The willow sides below these uprights are covered by tying about them a wide piece of soft silk or satin ribbon. This not only gives a pretty finish, but together with the spools on the uprights, quite conceals the willow foundation of the basket. A piece of cardboard cut to fit the bottom of the basket is covered with silk to match the ribbon. The whole makes a basket quite as artistic and pretty as it is useful.



United States Senate Debating Have Seen Wonderful Progress From Whether to Strike a Blow

Whether to Strike a Blow for World Peace.

Washington, March 5—Four hours debate in the senate today seemed to indicate that the pending arbitration treaties with England and France probably would be ratified late tomorrow. The ratification will be the consummation of what many statesmen view as the first great move toward universal peace. The target for the opponents of the treaties is the much discussed Clause 3 of Amicle 3. Some senators hold that this section delegates the treatymaking powers of the senate to a joint high commission. Around this clause ranges the running fire of amendments, ratifications, resolutions and the real fight upon the treaties themselves.

Senator Lodge stated tonight that he expected a vote tomorrow and while the vote on the committee amendment proposing to strike out Clause 3 from the treaties probably would be close, he believed that the treaties, unamended, would be ratified with his resolution.


