THE LIFE OF D'ARTAGNAN

Paris, Feb. 23.—With a whole garretful of umbrellas, literally hundreds of them, representing many periods and nationalities, to serve as "material," a Frenchman named Ferrand is about to write an exhaustive history of the "gamps" as they call it in England, or the "parapluie," to give it its French name from the earliest known period to the present time.

In this costume Miss Farrar sang with a volume of tone absolutely artistic in view of the requirements of the music. It was not a subdued singer that the audience heard, but one of lusty voice. Miss Farrar is not always as careful as she might be.

Samuel Maxwell, John Maxwell, Hugh Lenihan and Benjamin Riley, all carpenters, swore that they worked with Nealsen up till five o'clock and that he was perfectly sober.

In summing up the evidence His Honor said that Sergeant Baxter had an excellent reputation in police circles, and that, from what he had heard, was always willing to give a man a chance, and therefore must have had some good cause to lock Nealsen up. However, in this case, he continued, I will render a Scotch verdict, and allow Nealsen to go free on condition that he behaves in future.

The case against Mayer Whitman, charged with having liquor for sale in his house in Mill street was to have come up this morning, but was adjourned until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock when judgment will be given. Israel Gorder will be recalled to give evidence. Four coachmen, John Glyn, Arthur Love, Maurice Gervin and William Gibson were also before the court. Dennis Murphy, a coachman, testified that all four were beyond the stand on the night in question. There were others who were not reported. He himself was standing far inside the wall then Gervin, His Honor told the four that they were liable to a \$20 fine, but on their promising not to violate the law in the future they were cautioned and allowed to go. J. A. Barry appeared for the prosecution.

Three prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined 88 each and one other got off with a \$4 fine. Thomas Marr, arrested some days ago on charges of being drunk and disorderly in the Ottawa Hotel was fined \$8 or two months in jail. The fine was allowed to stand. May Tanley, charged with keeping a house of ill repute in City Road and also with having stolen \$5 and a watch from Henry Burchill of St. Martins, was brought into court and was further remanded.

THE MILLIONS LEFT BY WILLIAM CARSON

He Remembered Old Days in New Brunswick and There Are Beneficiaries Here

A California paper has the following report of the will of William Carson, a millionaire lumberman, formerly of New Brunswick: "No estimate of the total value of the dead lumberman's estate is obtainable from the instrument, which provided for \$200,000 to go to the daughter and three sons, and a quarter of a million to be distributed to charities, churches, friends and distant relatives of Humboldt county and New Brunswick, his old home, and old employees of his lumber camps. Among the latter is a legacy of \$1,000 to Peter Kym, magazine writer, who was once employed by Carson. The remainder of the estate is to be shared among his children, Mrs. R. J. Tyson and W. W. Carson of San Francisco, and J. M. Carson and Sumner Carson of Eureka. The value of the estate has been variously placed at from \$15,000,000 to \$40,000,000.

For building a new Episcopal church in Eureka \$20,000 is provided; to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of San Francisco, \$5,000; to the California Women's Hospital of San Francisco, \$5,000; to the Florence Crittenton Home of San Francisco, \$5,000; to the Protestant Orphan Asylum of San Francisco, \$5,000; to the trustees and vestry of the Episcopal church of Sacramento, \$10,000; and to the Episcopal church of Elmaville, New Brunswick, \$2,500.
