SHOOT DEAD AT A LABOR MEETING

Glance Bay Scene of Tragedy Last Night MAY BE TWO DEATHS

Trouble Followed Interruptions by One Connelly Who Had Been Drinking—Wm. Bryant Shot Dead, M. Murphy Seriously Wounded—Man With Gun Gives Himself Up

(Special to Times.) Halifax, N. S., April 25.—A shocking tragedy occurred at Glance Bay late last night near the close of a labor meeting and resulted in the shooting of William Bryant, a miner, and Michael Murphy, Bryant was instantly killed and Murphy is in the hospital with a bullet in his abdomen and spent the entire morning in looking over the harbor, east and west, as well as viewing the properties along the Marsh road, where it has been rumored the railway is acquiring property.

The government promised a subsidy of \$300,000 yearly, on the condition that additional capital to the amount of \$750,000 should be used in Lancashire, but the report says, this capital has not been raised.

PROLOGUE TO THE ISLAND LEGISLATURE

U. S. Consul Culver Reports To Washington

ST. JOHN IS SECOND

Montreal Only Dominion Port Showing Larger Value in Export Business—Consul Forecasts Substantial Growth and Development Here—He Gives Some Figures

The "Daily Consular and Trade Reports" a publication issued by the department of trade and commerce, Washington, U. S. A., contains in its issue of April 19 a very interesting report of trade in New Brunswick. The report dealing with St. John is from the pen of Henry S. Culver, U. S. Consul at this port and it deals very optimistically with the conditions here and forecasts a large and substantial growth and development. St. John is shown as the second port in the Dominion, in the value of its export business.

Following are extracts from the report: "St. John is the chief port of New Brunswick, and ranks next to Montreal in the export trade of Canada. A large share of the lumber and agricultural products of the province, as well as fish, lime, hides, etc., is shipped from this port. It is the winter port of twelve trans-Atlantic steamship lines, and there are numerous steamers engaged in coastwise trade with points in the maritime provinces and the United States, some of which maintain a summer schedule of this port. This means the handling of great quantities of freight here, much of which goes to and comes from the United States by rail and water.

Harbor Improvements: Other Expenditures "So rapidly is this trade increasing that additional harbor facilities are necessary to accommodate the demand made upon the port, and to this end the Dominion government has taken over the former Canso wharf and has begun to extend the harbor on the east side of the city, and will, by dredging and the erection of extensive docks, including a drydock, make this perhaps the most important port of the maritime provinces. 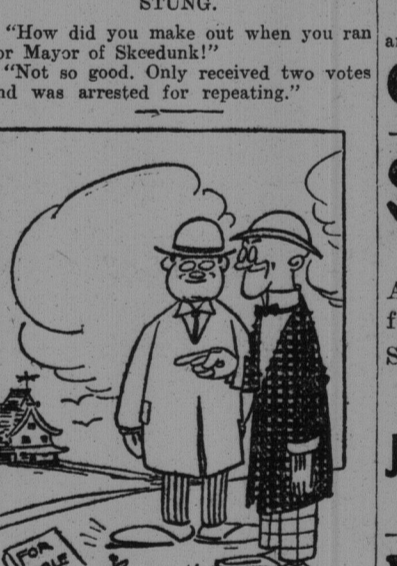

REFUSED SENATORSHIP

Mr. Blackadar of Halifax Preferred Being an Editor, Says Montreal Paper

(Montreal Gazette)

There was yesterday a gentleman at the Windsor who has declined a federal senatorship and the lieutenant-governorship of his native province, for the reason that he considered it a greater honor to direct the policy of the oldest newspaper in Nova Scotia. Charles C. Blackadar, who is the sole proprietor of the Halifax Acadia Recorder, which will be one hundred years old next June has been connected with this journal since the year 1863 or four years before confederation.

Mr. Blackadar's father, Hugh W. Blackadar, who worked in the same printing office with the late Hon. Joseph Howe, was for many years proprietor of the Recorder, which was a reform sheet in the old days, but later on became the journalistic mouthpiece of Sir Charles Tupper, although the Blackadars, after supporting the famous Tupper school bill, are disengaged with the then premier of Nova Scotia on the question of confederation.

Since then the Acadia Recorder has been a staunch Liberal paper, although the proprietor declared last evening that for twenty years and more he has been fighting for or against principles rather than for or against men, and this will be his policy in the future.

Charles Blackadar has never changed the form of the Recorder, as he thinks its readers are too much attached to the blanket sheet, and he states that the paper is just as prosperous as it was a quarter of a century ago. "There are old men in Nova Scotia who have been readers of the Recorder for sixty years, and they are not all Grits," added the Nova Scotia journalist.

HE SEES GREAT EXPANSION HERE

(Continued from page 1.)

The work to be done by the government, the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Pacific railways have purchased large tracts of land adjacent to the two latter properties, building docks and terminal warehouses for facilitating the handling of freight, involving the expenditure of vast sums of money.

The combined work outlined by the government and the two transcontinental railways indicates the expenditure of millions of dollars in the next few years. There are many new private enterprises already commenced, and two new banks have lately been established, making eight in the city. Real estate values are rapidly increasing, and altogether a large and substantial growth and development are anticipated.

A review of trade conditions in New Brunswick is then given and the report then continues:

"The value of the fisheries in the St. John consular district during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1910, was \$1,323,445, a decrease of \$51,347 from the previous year. The principal catches were as follows: Sardines, worth \$851,205; herrings, \$201,013; lobsters \$11,262; clams, etc., \$97,726; pollock, \$88,072; haddock, \$60,119; alewives, \$42,500; and cod, \$31,292.

Foreign Trade: Exports to States

"The imports into this consular district during the ten months ended October 31, 1910, were valued at \$2,462,217, and the exports therefrom \$18,800,512. During the calendar year 1910 the imports and exports amounted to \$8,066,203 and \$30,965,715 respectively.

"The exports from St. John by vessel, during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1910, amounted in value to \$24,030,077, consisting of the principal staple articles: Wheat, \$8,805,999; flour and meal, \$3,075,585; meats, \$2,973,077; lard, \$1,025,423; cheese, \$751,374; lumber, \$1,030,231; and manufactures, \$2,847,531. The total exports from St. John during the calendar year 1910 were valued at \$24,988,510, Montreal \$77,801,459, Halifax \$11,665,743, and Quebec \$5,751,375, thus showing that St. John is the second port in the Dominion.

"The declared value of exports from the St. John consular district to the United States during the calendar year 1910 was \$3,006,663, against \$3,681,973 in 1909.

The publication also contains very interesting and comprehensive reports from Consul Theodosius Boklin, at Campbellton; Consul Michael J. Hendrick, at Moncton; and Consular Agent Byron N. Cull, at Newcastle.
