OUEBEC, May 1.—Shaken into consciousness from their sleep when Engineer Joseph Gagnon jammed on the brakes, in an effort to save their train from wreck, some hundreds of passengers of the Ocean Limited, Canadian National Railways "Million Dollar" train from Montreal to Halifax, turned out in a pouring rain about one and a quarter miles east of Levis, in what clothes they could hurriedly put on, early this morning, to find that the engineer with their locomotive, and were imprisoned there, while the mail and express cars were derailed. 



Fables On Health

BLISTERS SHOULD BE CARED

BLISTERS on the heels and toes are caused by the foot rubbing against the shoe.

Often they are very painful and may develop into a painful sore. Blood poisoning from a blister is possible, and often is a probable result when the blister is not properly cared for

erly cared for.

An excellent method for remov-An excellent method for removing a blister, especially when it is on the sole of the foot where the skin is thick, is to take a fine white thread and grease it well with boricated or pure vaseline.

Then thread a rather coarse needle and pass it through the blister. Cut the thread on each side and cover the spot under the stocking with a bit of muslin dipped in vaseline.

Next day draw the thread out.

Blisters in the hands, or on the heel, may be pricked with a needle, but be sure the needle is clean.
